FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK



Easter is late this liturgical year which means Lent starts late as well. So, we have a larger than normal chunk of Ordinary Time this winter. This is a great gift because the second reading at mass is from the last part of Paul's First Letter to the Corinthians.

I Corinthians is my favorite letter in the Pauline corpus. He is trying to sort out the struggles, challenges, and poor choices of the Christian community at Corinth. And he is attempting to do this from afar via mail. A daunting task to say the least.

The letter is Paul at his most pastoral as he seeks to instruct, clarify, encourage, reconcile, admonish, and nurture the church he founded. There are two themes we will encounter from now until Lent: the gifts of the Spirit given to all, and the community's life in the Resurrection of Christ. Both had been questioned by some Corinthians. Paul responds by stressing the diversity of gifts individuals are given come from the one Spirit. It is a brilliant statement of the fundamental unity we share in the midst of diversity.

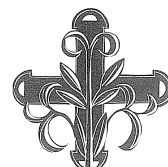

A Call to Discernment

Our leadership transition is a watershed moment in the history of our parish, and one that calls for new forms of engagement. Pope Francis has reminded us that we should be a Church whose members, clergy and laity both, are discerning our direction; a Church in which each person’s potential is recognized and their contributions fully valued; a Church in which we all participate fully.

To that end, we are inviting everyone to consider attending a house meeting. The purpose of these gatherings is two-fold:

- Build community by meeting in small groups.
 - Share our desires and concerns for our parish and ourselves as we become a more synodal church.
- We hope by meeting as small groups, we can begin to be the Church we hope to become--one in which our lay members take an active role in discernment about our future.

Prayer for the Synod on Synodality

Every session of the Second Vatican Council began with the prayer *Adsumus Sancte Spiritus*, the first word of the Latin original meaning, “We stand before You, Holy Spirit,” which has been historically used at Councils, Synods and other Church gatherings for hundreds of years, being attributed to Saint Isidore of Seville (c. 560 - 4 April 636). As we are called to embrace this synodal path of the Synod 2021-2023, this prayer invites the Holy Spirit to operate within us so that we may be a community and a people of grace. For the Synod 2021-2023, we propose to use this simplified version, so that any group or liturgical assembly can pray more easily.

We stand before You, Holy Spirit, as we gather together in Your name.

With You alone to guide us, make Yourself at home in our hearts;

Teach us the way we must go and how we are to pursue it.

We are weak and sinful; do not let us promote disorder.

Do not let ignorance lead us down the wrong path nor partiality influence our actions.

Let us find in You our unity so that we may journey together to eternal life and not stray from the way of truth and what is right.

All this we ask of You, who are at work in every place and time, in the communion of the Father and the Son, forever and ever.

Amen.

Reflections on Synodality

An explanation of synodality that speaks to me is “walking together.” I imagine all of us, our whole parish, as companions on a journey. We, each and every one of us, open our hearts to hear God’s will, and we all have the courage to share with the community where and how we hear God calling us to go. We also listen to each other, recognizing that each one of us is receiving God’s call. This dialogue—the sharing and listening—is our discernment process, and through it we together see our path to growing closer to God. We are not sheep, unthinkingly following a shepherd. Instead, we are each co-responsible for finding the righteous path so we can travel it together.



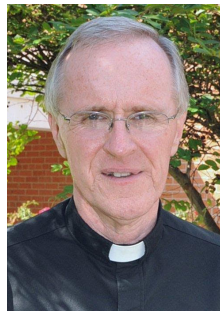

Antiracism at College Church Ignatian Spirituality and Antiracism: A Call to Conversion

Next month College Church will be hosting a speaker series that will help us explore the gifts of Ignatian Spirituality in the transformational work of antiracism. Speakers from around the U.S. will share their unique perspectives and experiences with grounding the work of racial justice in the teaching and practices of St. Ignatius. This event, supported by a grant from the Jesuit Central and Southern Province, is part of the celebration of the Ignatian Year. Please plan to join us through Zoom on February 9, 16, and 23 from 7:30 to 9:00 pm CST for this series of consequential and thought-provoking presentations. One of our speakers will be Father Thomas Clark, S.J., who celebrated five decades as a Jesuit in 2021. A native of Boston, he entered the Society of Jesus in 1971 after graduating from Boston College High School. His pastoral assignments have included secondary education, hospital chaplain, chaplain to an HIV clinic and pastor to two parishes. Over the years he has taken an interest in traditionally underserved populations, tailoring his education and ministry with and for Black Catholic communities.

From 1991 to 2005, he served as pastor of St. Francis de Sales Parish – St. Philip Parish in Boston (Roxbury), Massachusetts and since 2006 pastor of Immaculate Conception in Baton Rouge, Louisiana. There is no cost for participation.

“Thirty-five of my 40 years as a priest have been in ministry with Black Catholics. That experience has been an amazing grace in my life which has increased my faith and trust, grounded my hope and taught me to love and be loved.”

Father Clark received his undergraduate degree from Fordham University in New York, a Master of Divinity from Weston School of Theology in Cambridge, Massachusetts, a masters in Hispanic literature from New York University and a master’s degree in Black Catholic Studies from Xavier University in Louisiana.

“The time is always right to do what is right.” Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.

Since 1983, the third Monday in January has been designated as a federal holiday in honor of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., making him the first modern private citizen to receive this distinction. His leadership and legacy have come to be synonymous with civil rights, social justice, and nonviolent social change - all of which came from his call and commitment as a preacher and pastor. A fourth generation Baptist minister, Dr. King became the pastor at Dexter Avenue Baptist Church in Montgomery, Alabama at age 25, a position he resigned when the responsibilities of national leadership did not allow enough time to care for the spiritual needs of his congregation. He then directed his pastoral service throughout the country with a commitment to “redeem the soul of a nation.”

We know his efforts ushered in the end of legalized racial segregation. His example continues to inspire and challenge us to put our Christian love into action in service of others, and to work for equity for all of God’s children.

Antiracism at College Church

Our Racial Equity Review: Lessons from the Past

On Monday, December 20, members of the SFX Racial Equity Review Team gathered with representatives from Crossroads Antiracism and Training Organization to share a retrospective of College Church history. Crossroads tasked the review team to undertake the historical analysis— providing some evaluative questions to be addressed during the course of it—in order to: 1) explore the ways in which the parish, from its very beginning, had caused, participated in, and/or preserved systemic oppression, and 2) to elevate instances of resistance to such oppression. The expectation was that knowledge of our history would inform and guide the equity review process, helping to identify aspects of present-day parish life where change is most needed.



College Church at 9th & Washington

A subset of review team members formed a history committee to conduct the needed research and compile the historical data. It immediately became clear that, because of the age of our parish—nearly two hundred years old—its history is intimately interwoven with that of the City of St. Louis, the Archdiocese of St. Louis, the Society of Jesus (Jesuits), and St. Louis University. Consequently, any consideration of parish history requires inclusion of the details of that much broader history that forms its context.

During the presentation, members of the history committee reiterated the purpose and value of the historical analysis, described the process by which the information was collected, offered a summary of the findings to date, and spent time specifically responding to the questions that Crossroads had posed. During a period of small group discussion, review team members talked through why it’s important to know the history of the parish, which of the historical findings were most striking, and how the history can be used to lead us toward the goal of becoming an antiracist church.




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
