Antiracism at College Church

At College Church, antiracism is an expression of our recognition that all are created in the image of God. As such, we respond—personally and collectively—to the call to identify, and to actively challenge, structures and systems that devalue people on the basis of race, and to practice restoration in the pursuit of justice.

A Reflection on the Feast of the Epiphany



As we celebrate today's Feast of the Epiphany, we stop to reflect on the extraordinary events described in the second chapter of Matthew's Gospel. For centuries Christians have marked this encounter between the magi and the Holy Family as revelation of Jesus as the King of the Jews. What can we learn through this intriguing story that may guide our own path—including our personal journey of antiracism?

We might begin with a theme within the narrative that emphasizes the magi **seeking** the child Jesus. Their astronomical observations heralded a significant event, and they were compelled to act—to search for the source of the prophetic signs. Not content to wait and see how history may unfold, they set out to encounter, bear witness, and honor the God of the Hebrews at work in the world.

The journey was long and there were risks. While we do not know from what land they traveled, Matthew tells us that when the magi left, they “departed for their own country by another way.” We presume “that other country” required travel of some distance. Crossing the desert in ancient Palestine carried its own dangers and, sensing threat of harm from Herod, they did not return to share their findings.

The magi did not get it right the first time. Their path did not lead directly to Jesus. Before arriving in Bethlehem, the magi were in Jerusalem asking where they might find the newborn king. They had more to learn.

Clearly, **they did not succeed alone.** Scripture does not tell the precise number of magi, but we know there was more than one. Over time, the story of three men who each presented one of the gifts of gold, frankincense, and

myrrh became tradition. Their arduous journey most likely required the assistance of servants and, perhaps, soldiers for protection. Furthermore, it was Herod and the knowledge of the chief priests and scribes that directed the magi to Bethlehem.

The arrival of the magi in Jerusalem **disrupted the status quo** and threatened the existing balance of power. Scripture is clear that the news delivered by the magi was not welcomed by Herod and others in the city. Fear of challenge to their power led them to conspire to eliminate that threat.

Finally, the magi **used the gifts, skills, and resources** they possessed to reveal the truth. Whether in fact they were scientists or soothsayers, the magi employed their unique abilities to recognize and revere the presence of God in the world.

We too are seeking the Kingdom of Jesus. We are called to act in ways that reveal God's saving love in our world. The sin of racism is a barrier to realizing this “kin-dom”—this community where all know we are beloved and belong. And so, we pursue the long journey of racial justice—hoping and fearing how the experience will transform us. How will our relationships be impacted? Who will accompany us on our pilgrimage? Like the magi, we have no clearly marked path to the destination we desire. Having never experienced a fully inclusive community, we are challenged in navigating toward it. Although we follow the signs, we still take some wrong turns, make mistakes, and require further direction. We have need of all of our companions to continue to make our way. God's Holy Spirit sustains and grows our efforts through the unique gifts each person has to contribute. In this way, we all gain courage to recognize and reject the systems that perpetuate racism and discover new ways of bringing God's Kingdom into being.

A New Year's Invitation

The arrival of the new year brings new possibilities—a chance to grow, to change, to try something new, to act upon the thing you've been wanting to do but didn't have either the time or the energy to pursue it. For those of you who've been curious about, wanted to learn more, or have considered getting involved in the

array of racial justice activities at College Church, now is the time! While evidence of the spirit of antiracism can be seen throughout the parish, two main parish organizations coordinate and sponsor these activities:

Racism and Reconciliation Committee

Following close upon the tragedy of Michael Brown's death in 2014, a group of parishioners—most of whom had been active in the parish's Social Ministry Commission—came together to form the Racism and Reconciliation Committee. While its members seek to deepen their own awareness and understanding of racism and the structural components of our society that preserve it, this committee has served as the primary outward-facing vehicle for the parish's antiracism efforts. It provides opportunities, for those within the parish and beyond, for education on topics related to racism; its members bear witness to the existence of structural racism with racial justice vigils; it plans activities to celebrate the contributions of black Catholics; and it offers forums—frequently in collaboration with our neighboring parish, St. Alphonsus Liguori (Rock) Church—for cross-racial dialogue. Among its recurring programs is the Lenten Racial Justice Journey, which extends the invitation to pray the Examen after daily engaging carefully curated materials (articles, videos, and podcasts) on the theme of racial justice.

The Antiracism Team

By 2018, parish leadership sensed a need to direct a more focused scrutiny on the structure, services, culture, and environment of the College Church toward the goal of becoming an antiracist congregation. The lessons of the Ferguson uprising were sinking in, only to be compounded later by the lessons of 2020 and the serial killing of unarmed African Americans around the nation. To undertake this internal institutional appraisal, the parish created an Antiracism Team. With the assistance of the Crossroads Antiracism Training Organization, focus groups were organized to assess parishioners' views and experiences relative to racism. Members of the Antiracism Team underwent training, offered by Crossroads, designed to dismantle racism and made use of a self-evaluative tool to enable the process of change. As a consequence of that training, antiracism was incorporated as a priority into the parish strategic plan. Members of the Antiracism Team have undertaken a parish racial equity review, the purpose of which is to evaluate every aspect of our parish life toward the goal of reflecting equity in our ways of being church. Evidence of these intentions include our recent parish history presentations and the work to ensure that

our sacred imagery is culturally inclusive. By these and other means we hope to answer the call to fully live the Gospel as a multicultural, antiracist, and faith-filled community.

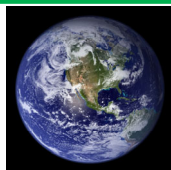
Support Groups

The status of recycling by the St. Louis City Refuse Department at this time is questionable. But some things are clear:

Plastic grocery bags, bubble wrap, resealable food storage bags, and other sorts of plastic bags and film do NOT go into recycling bins anywhere. Instead these items should go to NexTrex plastic bag and film recycling via the brown bins at the grocery store (e.g., Schnucks, Dierbergs, etc.). Check out <https://nextrex.com/view/educate> for further information and the specific kinds of items NexTrex accepts and makes into composite decks and benches. Cursor down that page to More Than Just Plastic Bags Are Recyclable. This even includes ice bags, wood pellet bags, salt bags.

The Operation Brightside Recycling Center, operated by Earth Circle Recycling, at 1660 Kingshighway is no longer in operation as of Nov. 30, 2022.

One type of item that unequivocally can and should be recycled is ABCs, that is, Aluminum Beverage Containers. Inside Climate News provides an informative article “Want to Help Reduce PFC Emissions? Recycle Those Aluminum Cans.” (<https://tinyurl.com/eecbd395>) The moral of the story is when you purchase beverages in stores, if possible, buy those in aluminum containers. Then, do what you can to be sure those Aluminum Beverage Containers (ABCs) get recycled. First, be sure they are emptied of liquid. Keep ABCs separate from trash and other possible recyclables. If it is feasible for you to do so, squash the ABCs so they take up less space for the same weight. You can then take ABCs to a metal recycler yourself (Try googling aluminum recycling near me). Or leave your ABCs in a bag on a fence post for the Alley Pickers.
