

# **Reflection from Our Parish Life Coordinator**

As part of All Things New we are moving into the phase of hearing proposals for how our planning area, which is essentially North City, will be restructured and how we could be affected. We will hear multiple proposals and we will be asked for our feedback. I'd like us to consider how we want to show up, individually and as a parish, to these listening sessions.

It feels safe to assume that most of us have some amount of skepticism, concern, or even anger about the perceived process and potential outcomes of All Things New. It has been tempting for me to show up with my brow furrowed, my jaw clenched and arms folded or to show up ready for battle.

But Paul's letter to Timothy invites a different posture. St. Paul is reminding Timothy - and us - to stir into flame the gift of God that you (each of us) have. We are invited to listen and respond with a spirit of power and love, trusting that the Holy Spirit dwells within us.

For me, that looks like showing up with my hands open, leaning in to listen carefully, remaining grounded in a place of love, and speaking boldly, trusting that the Holy Spirit dwells within me. What might it look like for you?

College Church's listening sessions will happen on consecutive Saturdays, October 22 and 29 from 9 to I Iam. The October 22 session will be in the Ballroom, the October 29 session will be at Aquinas Institute of Theology, 23 S Spring Ave. Parishioners can choose which session to attend (the sessions will be identical). ### **College Church to Celebrate Family Mass**

Sunday, Oct. 30, College Church will hold its first Family Mass. Children from the Youth Faith Formation program will have significant roles in the 10:30 liturgy. Students will serve as lectors, gift bearers, ushers, cross bearer and musicians. The seventh-grade class wrote the Mass petitions. Ideally there will be Family Masses throughout the academic year with the next scheduled for Nov. 20, the feast of Christ the King.

Formerly each YFF class had its own class Mass in the downstairs chapel. When the chapel was replaced by classrooms that no longer was a possibility, but with the advent of Family Masses students will again fill leadership roles in the Sunday Mass.

#### The State of Identification Documents in Missouri


As the Birth Certificate and Identification Program continues to grow, a core group of parishioners and community leaders have come together to envision ways to bring this essential service beyond the walls of College Church, into more organizations across St. Louis and throughout the whole state. Lessons learned from the experience of the Mobile Outreach Coordinator from August 2021-July 2022 have informed a new strategy aimed at regional access to government issued identification.



Our weekly Tuesday onsite programming remains an essential need and will continue under the leadership of Outreach Coordinator, Jasmine Brown. As new Regional Access Coordinator, I have continued to develop training and support materials to share with partner organizations in St. Louis and across the state of Missouri who are interested in starting similar state ID and birth certificate assistance programming. The relationships built through our regional access efforts, in addition to the recent passage of a photo ID requirement for voting in Missouri, have galvanized all kinds of groups statewide.

Since the beginning of August, the College Church Outreach Program has held nearly a dozen sessions to train at least 118 people across the state of Missouri. Fifty eight people are committed to meeting more regularly to continue developing their

programs, as well as make regional connections. In our first monthly meeting we had thirty energized individuals present. These individuals represent 68 different organizations from every corner of the state. We are excited to see these efforts grow so that we can work toward a state where everyone has access to the official identification they need, regardless of income level, housing status, geographic location, or any other factor.

As such, we respond—personally and collectively— to the call to identify, and to actively challenge, structures and systems that devalue people on the basis of race, and to practice restoration in the pursuit of justice.

Making a Place at the Table (and on the Walls) for All

In children's literature, there is the phrase "mirrors, windows, and sliding glass doors," coined by Dr. Rudine Sims Bishop in 1990. This refers to the reader being able to see into—and even walk into—different worlds created by the author. If the book and reader match in a special way, then the story might also be a mirror, reflecting the experiences of the reader. When children can't find a book that serves as a mirror for their lives, they "learn a powerful lesson about how they are devalued in society," and children from the dominant social or racial groups lose an opportunity to "glimpse into the lives and experiences of others." (Institute for Humane Education). *Everyone* loses out.

As a former teacher and mother of two-a Black son and a white daughter-I have always loved seeking out diverse children's books, but it is strange and disturbing to me that I never questioned the lack of diversity in the religious imagery I saw in the Church. Until a few years ago, my vision of heaven and the Church was whitewashed, inspired by the pale Precious Moments dolls I collected as a child, the Warner Sallman Head of Christ that was displayed prominently in my grandparents' home, the angels of Renaissance paintings I saw in art history books, and the countless images I have seen over the years in religious education materials, stained glass windows, Sunday bulletins, etc. My own default image of the divine was NOT diverse; I had to purposefully invoke it. WHY? Because whiteness in religious imagery was nearly all I had ever seen. When I first had the realization. I felt horrified. but I also knew that the more evil sin would be to do nothing about it.

I don't want either of my children—or any other children of our parish—to experience the sins of omission in imagination that I have had to confess. Whom we see and whom we don't see in religious imagery makes a statement about whom our faith values. The arts—music, theatre, dance, the written word, visual art—are an extremely powerful tool that express language, creativity, culture, emotion, and humanity. If our art is an incomplete representation of the divine, then our vision of the divine is incomplete, creating a grave risk that whom we see as God's creation will be limited. I do not want to throw out all the Renaissance art! But I am eager to invite in all the

images we have been missing so we can see through those windows, walk through those doors, and look into those mirrors.

Sister Marie Chin, with the Sisters of Mercy of Jamaica, wrote a beautiful prayer that helps us appeal to God to forgive us for our sins of exclusion. "Creator of all races and ethnicities, help us to see that a diverse community is the way to deepen our lives and to know you more deeply. Guide us to see that entering into a vital and just relationship with others who are different from us is the way to make ourselves whole. Guard us from fear of the other, from the fear that our own security is threatened if we become truly willing to make a place at the table for all..."

At College Church, over the past few years, Thi Nguyen and I have been working together on a Liturgy and Spirituality subcommittee of our Antiracism Team. Making changes has been a gradual, prayerful process concurrent with—and made more meaningful by—our parish racial history review. One place we have had an influence is in our permanent Atria classrooms. For those we have purchased beautiful poster size images by artist Laura James, and, in recent years, our dedicated catechists have become ever more thoughtful about the



materials they present, such as using a variety of skin tone colors of clay for human figures.

Thi and I are in the process of collaborating with a group of College

Church parishioners to select images for a Wall of Saints in the Parish Center hallway, representing a diverse selection of gender, era, patronage, and racial and cultural origin; we are particularly interested in the often concealed stories of these holy people from whom we can learn, as Sister Chin says, to enter into a vital and just relationship ...to make ourselves whole. We have the support of the parish leadership for future large-scale projects in the next few years and are gradually building the capacity to do so— through engaging with ministry members; considering what we need to do to prepare spaces, such as the vestibule, that will honor larger-scale pieces; sourcing art with a responsible and antiracist lens; and seeking out artists of color whose lives and work we can

celebrate. We welcome parishioners with passion or expertise in design and the visual arts, as well as those with an enthusiastic desire to learn and participate with us, to join hearts and hands with us and truly *make place at the table*— and on the walls—for all at College Church.

#### **Reflection on the Racial Justice Vigils**

As the Racial Justice Vigils conclude for the winter months, we share this reflection from one of the regular participants.

I found the killing of George Floyd on May 25, 2020, a terribly saddening and angering occurrence that pointed to centuries-old patterns, rooted in racism and demeaning attitudes toward African-Americans. Such patterns have also been part of the history of St. Louis, in which I have lived for 70 years. Those who gathered to pray after Mr. Floyd's death decided to continue praying in front of the College Church every Tuesday night, to ask God to heal the racism and its wounds that still plague us. Our presence kept before us and all those driving by this issue and the continued suffering that we need to work to eliminate. We shared readings and spent time in silence, reflecting on the struggle for racial justice and praying to God for assistance. I appreciated much being with several members of the College Church community, many of whom were veterans in the struggle for justice for decades and who faithfully showed up weekly. Our group was very diverse, black and white, men and women, lay and religious, all of us sharing a common concern and commitment. It was inspiring when several of those driving by honked and waved to express solidarity. Others expressed hostility in several ways. Some of our number held "Black Lives Matter" signs, and they screamed at us that "all lives matter"—and they do, it is just that for centuries, as George Floyd's murder demonstrated, Black lives haven't mattered as much as they deserve to. I was touched at how the veterans of the pursuit of justice absorbed these demonstrations of hostility peacefully, not screaming back, continuing to pray and silently hold their signs. Racial justice can only be won by acting on its behalf, as well as by depending on God who alone changes hearts.


#### **Meeting of Widows and Widowers**

#### Faithful Citizenship: Your Vote Matters

With a new voting law in effect, House Bill 1878, the newly formed SFX Advocacy Committee wants to ensure that College Church parishioners and our wider community can access the ballot this November and beyond. Visit sfxstl.org/advocacy or see a Voting Access Ambassador after Masses to learn more.

One of the most harmful aspects of HB1878 is the new requirement to produce a nonexpired photo ID in order to vote, which will greatly impact many Missourians who cannot readily obtain a State ID. These are the people that come to our parish's weekly Outreach Program for help with birth certificates and Missouri State IDs. Leading up to the November election, we will share reflections from volunteers connected to our ID and Birth Certificate Program. Rebecca Cunningham, a current SLU medical student and former program volunteer, shared this:



Over the years as a parishioner at College Church, I have participated in various committees regarding voting rights and, in speaking with Missourians, have been struck by questions and statements such as "Isn't it easy to get an ID? If I can do it, anyone can do it." For many of us in this parish, obtaining a nonexpired photo ID may seem like a minute task. However, multiple barriers exist that make obtaining a photo ID a challenge for many of our community members. While I had heard these challenges enumerated over the years, such as cost or lost documents due to dangerous social situations, I did not fully grasp the frustration of such challenges until I had the opportunity to serve as a volunteer at the SFX Outreach Program in 2020. In the midst of the pandemic, many guests would venture to the College Church ballroom for help obtaining IDs and birth certificates, a program which serves only a small percentage of the population in Missouri. I frequently heard from guests that they needed an ID or birth certificate for work or social services and shared in their frustration when more barriers would appear that would prevent them from quickly obtaining a photo ID. Now,

Missouri House Bill 1878 requires a non-expired photo ID to vote, which will limit the voting eligibility of many Missourians. As Catholics, we are called to care for the vulnerable; therefore, we must be aware and advocate for those who are adversely impacted by this bill, such as those who attend our Outreach program.
