## Reflection from Our Parish Life Coordinator

Beloved: I remind you to stir into flame the gift of God that you have through the imposition of my hands. For God did not give us a spirit of cowardice but rather of power and love...Take as your norm the sound words that you heard from me, in the faith and love that are in Christ Jesus. Guard this rich trust with the hope of the Holy Spirit that dwells within us.

As part of All Things New we are moving into the phase of hearing proposals for how our planning area, which is essentially North City, will be restructured and how we could be affected. We will hear multiple proposals and we will be asked for our feedback. l'd like us to consider how we want to show up, individually and as a parish, to these listening sessions.

It feels safe to assume that most of us have some amount of skepticism, concern, or even anger about the perceived process and potential outcomes of All Things New. It has been tempting for me to show up with my brow furrowed, my jaw clenched and arms folded or to show up ready for battle.

But Paul's letter to Timothy invites a different posture. St. Paul is reminding Timothy - and us - to stir into flame the gift of God that you (each of us) have. We are invited to listen and respond with a spirit of power and love, trusting that the Holy Spirit dwells within us.

For me, that looks like showing up with my hands open, leaning in to listen carefully, remaining grounded in a place of love, and speaking boldly, trusting that the Holy Spirit dwells within me. What might it look like for you?

College Church's listening sessions will happen on consecutive Saturdays, October 22 and 29 from 9 to I lam. The October 22 session will be in the Ballroom, the October 29 session will be at Aquinas Institute of Theology, 23 S Spring Ave. Parishioners can choose which session to attend (the sessions will be identical). ## The State of Identification Documents in Missouri

As the Birth Certificate and Identification Program continues to grow, a core group of parishioners and community leaders have come together to envision ways to bring this essential service beyond the walls of College Church, into more organizations across St. Louis and throughout the whole state. Lessons learned from the experience of the

Mobile Outreach Coordinator from August 202I-July 2022 have informed a new strategy aimed at regional access to government issued identification.
Our weekly Tuesday onsite programming remains an essential need and will continue under the leadership of Outreach Coordinator, Jasmine Brown. As new Regional Access Coordinator, I have continued to develop training and support materials to share with partner organizations in St. Louis and across the state of Missouri who are interested in starting similar state ID and birth certificate assistance programming. The relationships built through our regional access efforts, in addition to the recent passage of a photo ID requirement for voting in Missouri, have galvanized all kinds of groups statewide.

Since the beginning of August, the College Church Outreach Program has held nearly a dozen sessions to train at least II8 people across the state of Missouri. Fifty eight people are committed to meeting more regularly to continue developing their programs, as well as make regional connections. In our first monthly meeting we had thirty energized individuals present. These individuals represent 68 different organizations from every corner of the state. We are excited to see these efforts grow so that we can work toward a state where everyone has access to the official identification they need, regardless of income level, housing status, geographic location, or any other factor.


On November 13th, we have a big opportunity to celebrate Fr. Dan and continue to demonstrate the abundance we experience as a parish. This year our annual fundraiser is called "A Decade of Dan!" We will gather at I2 noon at I8Rails, a new venue at the Foundry, to eat, drink and be merry! There will be musical performances by some of our very talented musicians, and lots of ways to celebrate memories of our time with Fr. Dan.

## Antiracism at College Church

At College Church, antiracism is an expression of our recognition that all are created in the image of God. As such, we respond-personally and collectively- to the call to identify, and to actively challenge, structures and systems that devalue people on the basis of race, and to practice restoration in the pursuit of justice.

## The Clavius Project: Building Minds. Cultivating Community

The Clavius Project began at Saint Louis University High School (SLUH) in 2014 as a collaboration among students, faculty, and staff to bring Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM) to city Catholic schools. Named after Christopher Clavius, a German Jesuit mathematician and astronomer who was responsible for the Gregorian Calendar, the Clavius Project trains, mentors, and inspires urban middle school kids in STEM. The SLUH Robotics Club had a history of partnering with city middle schools, while also seeking opportunities to engage via activities like summer camps, and in areas such as student financial aid, curriculum development, and parental involvement. But as participation in programming grew to include 50 St . Louis area schools, the size of the project exceeded the capacity of SLUH to operate it unaided.

On April 30, 2022, the SLUH Clavius Project announced an exciting new partnership with Saint Louis University (SLU), made possible by a $\$ 600,000$ grant from the Thomas R. Schilli Foundation. The Schilli Foundation was established in 2021 to support local Jesuit schools and their partners in providing collaborative, integrated, and coordinated educational opportunities. The announcement was made at the 8th Annual SLUH Clavius Project Robotics Jamboree, which included students from 28 schools throughout the region.

The Clavius Project will be housed in SLU's new Center for Ignatian Service, which is located in the College of Philosophy and Letters. Starting this fall semester, the Center will offer a new cross-disciplinary minor focused on project-based, service learning that challenges students to help support underserved areas while fostering a lifelong commitment to service.

During this pilot year, the project has identified several schools that will serve as the focus of their students' work; these include Marian Academy, Sister Thea Bowman Catholic School, St. Cecilia School and Academy, St. Louis Catholic Academy, and Loyola Academy. Jeff Pitts, director of the Clavius Project and a former Anheuser-Busch engineer, said, "The partnership with St. Louis University and the grant from the Schilli Foundation will sustain the program and provide opportunities to many more students who wouldn't otherwise have access to robotics, coding, and STEM programming."

## A Review of Horse by Bridget Brennan

 I was attracted to the book, Horse, because of the stature of the author, Geraldine Brooks. She is a very strong, in depth, historical author. Horse did not disappoint.

Horse is an historical (fiction) account of racism during the Civil War period. I bracket fiction because some of the characters are historical and some fictional but representative of the people who lived during that era. Included in Horse is a parallel story of today's racism.

The Civil War component is developed around the character, Lexington, an actual race horse who was very successful at the track and later as a stallion whose offspring were sold for hefty prices. Lexington was owned by a white man but was groomed, trained, and handled by slaves. Jarret, a young boy when we meet him, learns the trade from his father, who has actually bought his own freedom and is saving to buy his son's freedom. However, before he has enough money to buy Jarret's freedom, Jarret is sold along with Lexington to another white man who is part of the racing industry. So part of Horse is Jarret's journey; his struggles and survival during the Civil War and his freedom post-Civil War. Jarret represents the many enslaved people who held fast and with cunning, courage, and a bit of luck survived the Civil War and made choices to market their skills to ensure their freedom thereafter. Jarret's life was not easy, but his talent with training horses, especially Lexington, spared him some of the most cruel and savage treatment that many other slaves endured.

The contemporary parallel story of racism occurs in Washington, DC, where fictional Theo, a graduate of Yale University, currently a graduate student in equestrian art at Georgetown University, develops a friendship with one of the Smithsonian staff who is an expert in equestrian art. The thread that sews these two parallel stories together is that the particular piece of equestrian art that Theo is researching is none other than Lexington whom we met in the Civil War story. You need to read the book to see how the contemporary story plays out.

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A couple of sidebars from the story: I had never heard of equestrian art; I found that intriguing. I learned a lot more about the training, grooming, and the business of horse racing. It's a big business. Was then, is now.

The above are just snippets. You need to read the story to review the horrors of slavery. And to be reminded that racism is still way too prevalent in 2022. In my naivete I kept thinking each generation would be less racist. As a child I would meet people who were racist and bigoted. But I thought that would change as we moved towards-if not integration-at least more exposure to people of different races and cultures. But that is not the fact. And we know that. And it is heartbreaking. Yet, we keep on trying each in our own small way.

The extensive SFX Antiracism team coordinated by Winnie Sullivan and Lisa Burks and a host of parishioners are moving us forward. As a faith community we are being called-and will continue to be called-to speak up, speak out, and to embrace the changes that will unfold in our North Deanery with All Things New. As a faith community we will have the opportunity and the grace to welcome people whose church has been closed. And we will be stretched to grow and change and maybe even be transformed!

## History Highlights: SFX School Days

A recent history highlight looked back at Xavier High School for girls, which was opened by the parish on the campus of St. Louis University in 1932. College Church parishioners familiar with the high school offered some additional historical details, which we are eager to share. The religious community under whose administration the high school operated was the Sisters of Charity of the Blessed Virgin Mary of Dubuque, lowa—better known as the BVMs-some of whose members continue to work in St. Louis today. Also of interest, relative to the history of parish-based schools, is the fact that just west of the building that housed the high school (3733 West Pine) was St. Francis Xavier Elementary School, which offered a kindergarten through eighth grade curriculum. ## All Things New

All Things New is the Archdiocesan planning process to develop evangelizing and vibrant parishes throughout the Archdiocese. Many parishioners completed the Disciple Maker Index during Lent. In late summer and September, priests, deacons, parish life coordinators, and parish leadership gathered to hear some proposed models for parish reconfiguration.

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## Faithful Citizenship: Your Vote Matters

With a new voting law in effect, House Bill 1878, the newly formed SFX Advocacy Committee wants to ensure that College Church parishioners and our wider community can access the ballot this November and beyond. Visit sfxstl.org/advocacy or see a Voting Access Ambassador after Masses to learn more.

One of the most harmful aspects of HB1878 is the new requirement to produce a nonexpired photo ID in order to vote, which will greatly impact many Missourians who cannot readily obtain a State ID. These are the people that come to our parish's weekly Outreach Program for help with birth certificates and Missouri State IDs. Leading up to the November election, we will share reflections from volunteers connected to our ID and Birth Certificate Program. Rebecca Cunningham, a current SLU medical student and former program volunteer, shared this:


Over the years as a parishioner at College Church, I have participated in various committees regarding voting rights and, in speaking with Missourians, have been struck by questions and statements such as "Isn't it easy to get an ID? If I can do it, anyone can do it." For many of us in this parish, obtaining a nonexpired photo ID may seem like a minute task. However, multiple barriers exist that make obtaining a photo ID a challenge for many of our community members. While I had heard these challenges enumerated over the years, such as cost or lost documents due to dangerous social situations, I did not fully grasp the frustration of such challenges untill had the opportunity to serve as a volunteer at the SFX Outreach Program in 2020. In the midst of the pandemic, many guests would venture to the College Church ballroom for help obtaining IDs and birth certificates, a program which serves only a small percentage of the population in Missouri. I frequently heard from guests that they needed an ID or birth certificate for work or social services and shared in their frustration when more barriers would appear that would prevent them from quickly obtaining a photo ID. Now, Missouri House Bill 1878 requires a non-expired photo ID to vote, which will limit the voting eligibility of many Missourians. As Catholics, we are called to care for the vulnerable; therefore, we must be aware and advocate for those who are adversely impacted by this bill, such as those who attend our Outreach program.

[^0]:    Anointing of the Sick
    Healing was one of the central aspects of the ministry of Jesus. He was moved with care and compassion for each of the people who sought his assistance. The church extends this ministry of Jesus into our time and place through visitation of the sick, bringing communion to those in institutions and who are homebound, and through the sacrament of Anointing of the Sick. Today, we will celebrate the sacrament communally at each of our Sunday liturgies. Communal celebrations allow the whole community to express their connection to the sick and help overcome any sense of isolation. It allows us to focus our prayer for them, express our support, and affirm their dignity as our sisters and brothers in Christ. Following the homily, all who have a serious illness, who are preparing for surgery, or who are experiencing the challenges of advancing age are invited to receive the sacrament. The rite begins with intercessory prayers for those who wish to be anointed. All who are near them are invited to hold their hand, touch their shoulder or extend a hand toward them.

    For the anointing they will be invited to step out into the aisle and stay by their pew. The priest will come to them. Those who are unable to stand should raise their hand as the priest comes down the aisle. He will anoint you on your forehead and the palms of your hands with the words:

    Through this holy anointing may the Lord in his love and mercy help you with the grace of the Holy Spirit. Amen May the Lord who frees you from sin, save you and raise you up. Amen
