FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK



Thanksgiving and the start of Advent share a weekend nearly every year. That is not, of course, deliberate. Advent has been around a little bit longer. It is worth pondering, however, this happy coincidence.

The national holiday is rooted in a sense of gratitude. It is the one day of the year when Americans together to give thanks. This communal action is focused especially on our family and friends. I consider Thanksgiving weekend a kind of unspoken celebration of the ties that bind. It is a ritualized way of recognizing the connections that provide meaning to our lives.

Gratitude is essential to our Christian faith. The recognition of God's abundant blessings poured out on all creation is fundamental to us. The Advent season focuses our gratitude on the gift of Emmanuel, God with us. The God who makes all things new has come among us and will come again. We live our lives with a sense of joy and thankfulness because of this truth. Discipleship requires a profound sense of gratitude.

A good way to begin Advent is to allow Thanksgiving to linger in our hearts and minds. The celebration has ended, and the food is probably all gone by now. What remains is the sense of all that we have received out of love. The recognition of how blessed we are is perfect for entering Advent.

Our Leadership Transition: Becoming a more Synodal Church

A Call to Discernment

The transition in our leadership is a watershed moment in the history of our parish, and one that calls for new forms of engagement. Pope Francis has reminded us that we should be a Church whose members, clergy and laity both, are discerning our direction; a Church in which each person's potential is recognized and their contributions fully valued; a Church in which we all participate fully.

To that end, we are inviting everyone to consider attending a house meeting. In these meetings, we want to talk in more detail about what the transition means or may mean, to hear your honest reactions, and to gather input on how you and other parishioners can guide College Church through this transition. We hope by meeting as small groups, we can begin to be the Church we hope to become—one in which our lay members take an active role in discernment about our future.

Welcoming Divinity Amongst Us: The ‘Son of Man’ Texts in the Gospels

The faith and the tradition of the Church, our Creeds, in the homilies we hear at Mass, all of these have proclaimed Jesus as the Son of God. Yet, when we return to the Gospels, we discover that the manner in which Jesus spoke of himself most frequently was as ‘Son of Man.’ In this Advent season Scripture study, we will look at how the ‘Son of Man’ was understood in apocalyptic literature, and how this apocalyptic ‘Son of Man’ informs how Jesus was received in the Gospel narratives. Was the ‘Son of Man’ a comment on Jesus’s humanity? Or was it a revelation of his divinity?


The first meeting of this Scripture study will be this Sunday, November 28, in the ballroom after the 10:30 am Mass.

Antiracism at College Church Black Catholic History Month 2021 Celebrating Contemporary Black Catholic Leaders

In 1990, the National Black Catholic Clergy Caucus of the United States met at Fordham University in New York and voted to designate November as Black Catholic History Month. Since its inception, Black Catholic History Month has been celebrated throughout the country and is recognized by the United States Council of Catholic Bishops.

This year, in addition to honoring the black ancestors of our faith through a rotation of posters that will be displayed for Masses each weekend, College Church will recognize some of the black Catholic leaders of our present day.

A special series of "Parish and Community" video interviews will highlight the contributions of Black Catholic leaders in the St. Louis area. M. Shawn Copeland

*Theology must learn to see in the dark.

M. Shawn Copeland

M. Shawn Copeland is an African American Catholic Theologian and Professor Emerita of Boston College where she taught systematic theology to undergraduate and graduate students. Although recently retired from academic life, she remains active in speaking and writing about Black Catholic Theology, exploring issues of race, gender, poverty, and oppression. In her recent address, "Black Lives Matter as Public Theology," at the 31st annual meeting of the Black Catholic Theological Symposium she spoke about "using critique, organizing, advocacy, protest, and love to fight for the lives and survival, flourishing and beauty of Black human beings."



Dr. Copeland's advocacy for Black Catholic spirituality began well before her university career. She lived much of her early life as a nun with the Adrian Dominican Sisters, serving as the Executive Director of the National Black Sisters' Conference for several years. She holds the honor of having served as the first African American and first African American woman President of the Catholic Theological Society of America (2001-2005). With a national and international reputation for her scholarship, M. Shawn Copeland has been the recipient of many accolades, including the Catholic Theological Society of America's highest honor: the John Courtney Murray Award which she received in 2018.

A prolific writer, she is the author of 13 books and numerous articles. The 2010 publication of "Enfleshing Freedom: Body, Race, and Being" is considered seminal work.

Dr. Copeland continues to share her knowledge as she writes for both popular and professional publications, and she speaks at conferences throughout the world. She enriches our understanding of God and what it means to be human.

Creole People in Catholic History

In honor of National Black Catholic History Month, we would like to highlight an ethnic group that is often overshadowed in our culture. And although they are overlooked by some cultures, they have made a significant impact on history, and still do to this very day.

Creoles are a predominantly Catholic ethnic group of mixed lineages, ranging from African/African American, French, Spanish and Indigenous American. In the United States, people of Creole descent live mostly in Louisiana and Mississippi.

Due to their location in the US, Creole people were heavily influenced by the Ursuline Sisters and the Sisters of the Sacred Heart of Jesus. Some Creole descendants were free people of color while others were descendants of enslaved Africans.

Because of the slave trade, Creole people reside in other countries or territories as well, including Belize, home of our sister parish, St. Peter Claver; French Guiana; Grenada; Guadalupe; Guyana; Haiti; Martinique; St. Lucia; St. Martin; and Cape Verde.

Although both Creoles and Cajuns can be from Louisiana, the ethnic groups aren't interchangeable. While Creoles have an African background, Cajuns have Acadian ancestors. Acadians are an ethnic group that settled in Louisiana, following their expulsion from Canada as a consequence of having resisted British rule and having aligned with Native American tribes during the French and Indian War.

Some notable people of Creole descent include Sidney Poitier; Phylicia Rashad and Debbie Allen; Jon Batiste; Alexandre Dumas; Sheila Escovedo "Sheila E"; Branford and Wynton Marsalis; Kate Chopin, St. Louis native; CC Sabathia; and Bryant and Greg Gumble.

Hiding in Plain Sight: The Reality of Everyday Racism

As our country and our communities continue to confront racial inequity and social injustice, we often find ourselves asking, "How did we get here?" "What keeps us from making greater progress?" We know that racism is a barrier to fully living the call of the Gospel, and we seek ways to remove all that separates us from the Beloved Community God intends for us. As individuals and as a parish, we search for ways to make that a reality.

The Antiracism Team at College Church is hosting the last session in our virtual series of awareness sessions designed to open our eyes, minds, and hearts ever wider; to help us more fully understand how racism persists; and to guide us on the path to creating greater equity and justice. Participants will share prayer, benefit from the expertise of a guest speaker, and exchange perspectives in small groups. Please join us as we seek to provide a space in which to listen, reflect, and learn to increase our individual and collective awareness of how systemic racism continues to permeate our societal structures and influence our daily interactions. There will be time for questions and answers, and participants will receive resources to aid in continuing the journey.



1) Offertory is behind budget 15% and behind the prior year 25%.

2) Restricted revenue slightly under budget due to fewer maintenance fund donations than expected. Restricted revenue was higher than the prior year due to more Social Ministry and Anti-Racism program donations.

3) Program fees were over budget and the prior year due to higher than anticipated Catechesis of the Good Shepherd and youth formation registration fees. This increase will be offset in future periods with increased expenses for the yearlong CGS Catechist Training.

4) Grant revenue was ahead of budget and the prior year due to receipt of more grant funds for Social Ministry outreach.

5) Other revenue is ahead of budget and the prior year due to Ignite Campaign donations (gala donations) being received earlier than budgeted or received in the prior year. This is offset when comparing the current year to the prior year by lower wedding and ballroom rentals in the current year.

6) Personnel costs is under budget due to openings in several budgeted positions.
