Living Our Faith: Meet Maureen

Living my faith: When we were newly married, Dave and I helped with the Marriage Prep program and continued this work after we joined the parish. I also served on the Antiracism Team for a few years as it formed and began its work. Most recently, I helped create and began leading

the 7th grade Religious Education Ephesians program. You may see me most Sundays at the 10:30 Mass in my blue Ephesians t-shirt with "How Wide, How Long, How Deep" on the back, reflecting our guiding scripture and prayer for the 7th grade year: Ephesians 3:16-18.

Why I'm involved: My faith has ebbed and flowed through some dry times and some rich times. The parish has been a steady presence for my kids when I was struggling with my faith. It's been amazing to watch them grow here, from being the littlest ones in our arms, then the tiny ones coming back from Atrium time during Mass, ready for hugs, all the way to proclaiming readings at Mass as teens. College Church has also been a place where I have felt God stir in my heart during Mass, homilies and music when I needed it. I've felt God's patient presence while I've grown, and have recognized the invitation to be a partner in God's unfolding work in this community. I consider my time with the 7th graders and my Ephesians team to be sacred work: proclaiming each week that we are loved by God no matter what.

Thirty years ago, witnessing a deep and unmet regional need, our parish created the region's first ID and Birth Certificate Program. Still today, Christ's call for compassion to those in need of this special service remains great.


In 2022, College Church helped 3,705 people, including children, from 100 ZIP codes obtain 3,111 birth certificates and 2,636 Missouri State IDs.

As you look at those numbers, ponder this: a recent survey indicated the top two reasons our guests came to us were the basic needs to establish a home and get a job. Basic human needs. According to the same survey, almost one-third of those guests had been living without identification for more than a year — and trying unsuccessfully for the same amount of time to regain them.

The Social Ministry Christmas Appeal continues this weekend. The second collection at Masses this weekend will go to Social Ministry. The impact of our ID and birth certificate program is clear as we celebrate our 30th anniversary. Each Tuesday, before the doors open to serve our guests, our volunteers gather in prayer — and the following, from Saint Theresa of Avila, could not be more appropriate. Join us as we reflect on the infinite possibilities born of faith:

"May there be peace within. May you trust God that you are exactly where you are meant to be. May you not forget the infinite possibilities that are born of faith. May you use those gifts that you have received, and pass on the love that has been given to you. May you be content knowing you are a child of God. Let this presence settle into our bones and allow your soul the freedom to sing, dance, praise and love. It is there — for each and every one of us."

Antiracism at College Church

At College Church, antiracism is an expression of our recognition that all are created in the image of God. As such, we respond—personally and collectively— to the call to identify, and to actively challenge, structures and systems that devalue people on the basis of race, and to practice restoration in the pursuit of justice.

Introduction

Entering the holiday season, and sharing the article that follows on the festival of Chanukah—the Festival of Lights—we must begin by acknowledging that our world is troubled. The Middle East is war-torn; our own nation, by extension, is beset with strife; and the conflict in Ukraine grinds on. Confronting these realities calls to mind a practice that members of our parish antiracism groups engage in before every meeting—a recitation of agreements, guidelines that set the tone and define expectations when grappling with issues that are often painful and always complicated. Those guidelines urge us to reject either/or—the binary—and to embrace both/and, realizing the importance of listening with a frame of justice to the full story in all of its complexity; they encourage us to act from a place of forgiveness. Chanukah commemorates the miracle of light, a small amount of oil providing immeasurable illumination, and a rededication to ideals. As we prepare for our own experience of Light breaking into human history, may we each, in our own way, be the oil that fuels peace.

Celebrating Chanukah

Our Jewish sisters and brothers are currently participating in the Festival of Chanukah. That Hebrew word means "dedication," and celebrates the rededication of the Temple. In the second century BCE, Syrian-Greeks ruled the Holy Land and tried to force Jewish people to accept Greek culture and beliefs. Against all odds, a small band of Jews led by Judas Maccabeus reclaimed the Temple in Jerusalem. But when they tried to light the Temple's Menorah (candelabra) only a single cruet of olive oil had not been contaminated by the Greeks. They lit the Menorah anyway, and miraculously that small supply of oil lasted for eight days. The festival of Chanukah was instituted to commemorate this miracle.

In the Jewish calendar Chanukah is a minor celebration compared to the major feasts of Passover and Rosh Hashanah or Jewish New Year. Although sometimes spelled Hanukkah, it is pronounced with a guttural "kh" sound: kha-nu-kah. The centerpiece of the festival is the Menorah. Every household displays one in their front window. Special blessings are recited, and traditional songs are sung as each night an additional candle is lit until all eight are glowing on the final night. Thus,

Chanukah is also known as the Festival of Lights.

Since the festival lasts eight days, there are plenty of opportunities to eat! Jewish people have lived all over the



world and adopted foods from many countries. In America, Jewish food usually comes from the "Ashkenazi" tradition of Eastern Europe. That's where bagels, borscht, brisket, smoked fish, stuffed cabbage, and latkes originated. Jews from Spain and Portugal are called "Sephardic," and their cuisine includes a spicier diet using cumin, turmeric, cardamom, cilantro, fresh mint, saffron, and cinnamon, with rice taking the place of potatoes.

A typical Chanukah meal might start with matzoh ball soup, followed by brisket or roasted chicken as the main course with latkes on the side. Any food fried in oil can symbolize the miracle of the oil – the most famous is the "latke" or potato pancake. The meal may conclude with savory jelly doughnuts and children are usually given chocolate and other sweets.

In 2023, Chanukah started at sunset this past Thursday, December 7 and continues throughout this coming week until sunset on Friday, December 15.

Philip Berrigan - Lifelong Commitment to Justice, Nonviolence, and Peace

Philip Francis Berrigan, remembered this month on the anniversary of his death, was an American anti-war activist and Catholic priest. He engaged in nonviolent protests in the cause of racial justice, peace, and nuclear disarmament. In his lifetime, he spent nearly 11 years in jail or prison for more than 100 acts of civil disobedience. Berrigan wrote several books about his experiences in prison and his support for the anti-war movement. His actions were compelled by his Christian faith and he challenged us to examine the responsibility we all share for poverty, violence, and war.

In 1943, Philip Berrigan was drafted and served combat duty in World War II. He was deeply affected by the racism he observed during boot camp in the South and his exposure to the violence of war.

After his military service, he entered the Josephite Fathers Seminary-a religious society of priests dedicated to serving Americans of African descent. He served as a teacher at a Black



Catholic high school and earned a degree at Xavier University-a Black Catholic institution. Berrigan became active in the Civil Rights movement, preaching and marching for desegregation and participating in sit-ins and bus boycotts. He was ordained a priest in 1955.

Wholly committed to peace and nonviolence, Father Berrigan also protested the war in Vietnam and the use of nuclear weapons. He took radical steps to bring attention to these causes. One of the most widely known events took place in 1968 when Philip, his brother Daniel Berrigan, SI, and seven other Catholic activists entered the Selective Service office in Catonsville, Maryland, seized hundreds of draft files and, using homemade napalm similar to what was then being dropped on Vietnamese villages, burned them in the parking lot. He also helped to organize incidents that involved entering facilities that housed nuclear weapons, hammering on those weapons, pouring blood on documents, and offering prayers for peace. Berrigan called such protests "Plowshares actions," after the biblical description of nations turning swords into plowshares. Since then, there have been over seventy Plowshares actions against weapons of war around the world.

Philip Berrigan's final Plowshares action was in December 1999, when he and others banged on warplanes in an anti-war protest at the Warfield Air National Guard Base in Baltimore. He was convicted of malicious destruction of property and sentenced to thirty months in prison. Released in 2001, Philip Berrigan died of cancer a year later. His wife, Elizabeth, remained active in Plowshares

actions through 2018 and was imprisoned until 2020. She now lives in New York. The work for peace continues with their children, Frida, Kate, and Jerry, and many others who are dedicated to justice and peace.

Significant Figures in Racial History

Archie Moore – born on December 13, 1913, into great poverty in Benoit, Mississippi. Moore's father deserted the family, so his mother sent Archie to live with her uncle and aunt in St. Louis where he attended Lincoln High School. As an adult Moore became the longest-reigning World Light Heavyweight Boxing Champion of all time (10) years). After retiring, he coached Muhammed Ali and George Foreman. He also was involved in civil rights work.

David Ruggles - died December 16, 1849. Born free, Ruggles became the country's first full time Black activist. He organized the New York Committee of Vigilance, an abolitionist organization that battled slave catchers, kidnappers, and slave traders — and aided hundreds of self-liberated people. Among those he helped was Frederick Douglass, with whom Ruggles formed a close friendship.
