Rejoice!

"Rejoice in the Lord always; again I say, rejoice."



This weekend we celebrate the Third Sunday in Advent, also known as Gaudete Sunday. Guadete means "Rejoice!" And it's a good reminder.

Although Advent and Lent are both penitential seasons, focused on preparing ourselves for the joyful coming of the Lord on Christmas and Easter, these seasons are "interrupted" by these special Sundays: Gaudete in Advent and Laetare in Lent. Both words mean "Rejoice!"

These Sundays of rejoicing, these pink splashes in a sea of purple, make me think of a tension that can often be present in our faith. This is the tension between being penitential and being joyful.

Penitential seasons are a reminder that we still have work to do. That is true in a variety of ways. We are not perfect. Our society, our world, and our Church are not perfect. We must be able to recognize those imperfections, name them, and work to do something about them. This is how we "prepare the way for the Lord" in our hearts and our world. We also recognize that we are wonderfully made in the image and likeness of God. When God made everything in the first creation story from Genesis, God declared it all to be good.

These are not conflicting realities. We are called to recognize the light and the shadows. The beauty and the imperfections. If we spend all of our time looking at the imperfections, we can lose hope and develop a warped view of the world and ourselves. If we avoid the imperfections, we can develop a sense of pride and miss the opportunity to grow.

This Sunday, let's take time to rejoice. Let's take time to recognize the beauty, graces, and gifts in our lives and rejoice in the Lord. May our rejoicing fill us with the hope that we need to continue the work of preparing the way of the Lord

Living Our Faith: Meet Becky

An SFX parishioner since: 1978. I had just returned to St. Louis after graduating from college and came to College Church for Mass. I was struck by the spirit and beauty of the Choir and the music. And I clearly saw the intentional design of the parish and its approach to our faith. I wanted to be a part of that. I joined the parish, and the Choir and singing have been a part of my life at SFX ever since. They've helped me make connections and deepen my faith.

Living my faith: One day at Mass I heard a lector delivering the scripture with real attention and meaning. I thought, I could do that, and became a lector myself. Eventually, I also became an Extraordinary Minister. In the early 1980s, when I was a young mother, I became a rotating Religious Education teacher which was the first version of our Youth Faith

Formation program. I've also been part of a group of environmentally sensitive parishioners who started The Circle of Creation Committee, SFX's effort to teach and advocate for environmental justice.

From participation in Hot Stuff/Cool Stuff to anti-racism initiatives to three parish-sponsored trips to rebuild houses in the wake of Hurricane Katrina, my involvement at College Church has been a profound and active experience.

Why I'm involved: Over the years we've been blessed to have phenomenal leaders and role models such as Fathers Len Kraus, Charlie Bouchard and John Kavanaugh. They were amazing priests and gifted speakers who moved us and spoke the truth out loud, but they did more than preach. They challenged us to understand the spirit of our Catholic faith and put it into action. At our Midtown location, College Church brings us close to the poor and those in need. Our Birth Certificate and ID program and Xavier Winter Inn make a real difference.

Three words that describe SFX: Spirited, Intentional, Active

My neighborhood: My husband, Ken, and I have lived in Webster Groves for 38 years. It's been a wonderful home for us and it's where we raised our three, now-grown daughters, Katie, Maggie and Erin. (Note: College Church was matchmaker for Ken and Becky. They met during the recording sessions for the album, Lord of Light, produced by St. Louis Jesuits.)

Fun facts: After receiving a Ph.D. from SLU in Marriage and Family Therapy, I've worked since 1991 with hundreds of clients through my private practice in Richmond Heights. I've also been an adjunct professor at Lindenwood and Webster Universities, a tribunal court expert for the Archdiocese and a psychotherapist at numerous parochial, private and public schools.

I have been certified to lead team-building programs for groups that have included elementary students as well as first-year medical and business school students. We did mobile initiatives and high ropes course elements at a 50-foot tall Alpine Tower structure in team exercises that built trust, support, communication and decision-making skills – all while building individual physical strength and coordination in the beautiful outdoors.

The Society of St. Vincent de Paul (SVdP) at St. Francis Xavier is a vital work of our parish serving Neighbors in Need. This continues our sharing of who we are and what we do. We recently completed our year-end reporting to the greater St. Louis SVdP Council.

Today, single-mother families are five times more likely to live in poverty than two-parent families. Many of the Neighbors in Need that reach out to St. Vincent de Paul at College Church are single mothers. They don't live far from us. For instance, after experiencing discrimination, M.C. decided to relocate to St Louis with her three kids whose ages range from a few months to 4 years. Her first priority was to find a job, but that also entailed having access to quality, affordable childcare. However, with no car, no income, no friends, and only minimal government help for day care, M.C.'s prospects of finding a job are going slowly. Fortunately, SVdP has been able to help her with monthly rent, some furniture and two food vouchers. Sometimes a little help and some loving encouragement is all that it takes for our Neighbors in Need to get back to being able to pay utilities, rent and food. At other times, situations are more complex and SVdP can help with immediate basic needs and point to other resources in the area.

We thank you for your continued support which enables us to stabilize and support Neighbors in our local community.

Antiracism at College Church

At College Church, antiracism is an expression of our recognition that all are created in the image of God. As such, we respond—personally and collectively— to the call to identify, and to actively challenge, structures and systems that devalue people on the basis of race, and to practice restoration in the pursuit of justice.

Advent Prayer

The hopefulness evoked by the season of Advent is the same that lights our way forward as we continue the journey of our parish racial equity review. For several years now, we have been reflecting on how the sin of racism hurts all of us, stripping us of our humanity and blinding us to our shared heritage as children of God. As we continue this journey together, let us recall the familiar and beautiful story of the Annunciation. Let us hear how the ordinary life of a young woman, our Blessed Mother, was made extraordinary and sacred by her assent to God's invitation. And, following that example, let us remain open to the invitation before us. God summons us to use the potential already within us to repair—and make whole—ourselves and our Church. In that spirit, let us respond to each invocation: Lord, hear our prayer.

Let us reflect on how the sin of racism strips all of us of our humanity and our identity as children of God.

Let us continue to inform ourselves about the sin of racism, its roots, and its historical and present-day manifestations at College Church.

Let us prepare ourselves to hear God's voice and hear the truth, even when we would rather not hear it.

Like our Blessed Mother saying yes to the angel Gabriel's invitation, let us open our eyes, hearts, and minds to the extraordinary and sacred.

Like our Blessed Mother, let us listen to the Holy Spirit telling us to be not afraid of how our lives will profoundly change.

Like our Blessed Mother asking, "How can this be?," let us accept that the Holy Spirit will guide us in our understanding and in our reconciliation and help us to become closer to God's vision for our Church.

Let us not run or hide but face with courage the specific policies and practices that have caused and preserved inequitable outcomes in decision-making, power-sharing, and inclusion of people of color at College Church.

Let the Holy Spirit guide us toward the transformative

change of becoming an antiracist parish and compel us to see this change as an opportunity for reconciliation and for hope-filled celebration of all people's gifts.

Lord, we know racism is a sin and spiritual disorder that has taken root in the garden of our souls. We pray for your grace to convert us through the Holy Spirit so that we can walk by faith toward justice, hope, love, and healing for the glory of your Kingdom. We ask the Holy Spirit to enter our lives, change our hearts, and allow us to see what we would rather not see. Lord, we ask that you bless us as we go on this journey, and may we be grounded and rooted in Your Word.

Amen.

The Light and The Hope of Advent

The season of Advent is a time of anticipation and longing. Through some of the darkest days of the calendar year, we light the candles of the Advent wreath with faith and hope and expectation of Emmanuel. God is with us. We carry this light to others—sharing our material, personal, and spiritual gifts.

So, Advent is a fitting time to focus on the hope and promise in our work for racial justice. In the midst of the inequity we find in our world, we can see many who commit to bringing light where it is needed.

One example of such light may be seen in the work of the St. Louis Black Authors of Children's Literature. This organization was founded by Mr. Julius B. Anthony. Responding to the racial disparity in literacy rates, the group is committed to fostering awareness of the importance of early literacy by creating opportunities for all children to have access to Black children's literature. Understanding that, in addition to quality instruction in reading, children achieve academically when they see themselves represented in the material they read. When children see themselves and their experiences reflected in in their books, they build self-awareness, self-confidence, as well as love of self and others.

To realize these outcomes, the St. Louis Black Authors

of Children's Literature have developed the *Believe Projects*. Through this initiative, to date, ten Literacy Labs have been created in elementary schools and educational centers throughout the St. Louis area. In these nurturing learning spaces, students access culturally relevant literature. In addition to books, The Believe Project also provides literacy learning experiences through theater performances, visits with authors, musicians, and visual artists. They are measuring the connections between exposure to culturally responsive literacy experiences and reading proficiency and they are seeing growth.

Significant Figures in Racial History

Francisco "Chico" Mendes – assassinated December 22, 1988, in Xapuri, Brazil. Mendes was a rubber tapper, trade union leader and environmentalist. He fought to preserve the Amazon rainforest and advocated for the human rights of Brazilian peasants and Indigenous peoples. He was shot by a local rancher.

Martyrs of Acteal – died on December 22, 1997, in Chiapas, Mexico. While forty-five indigenous townspeople, including children and pregnant women, were attending a prayer meeting of Catholic pacifists in the small village of Acteal in Chiapas, a right-wing paramilitary group murdered them all. The Mexican Government did not admit responsibility for the massacre until 2020.

Henry Highland Grant – born into slavery on December 23, 1815, in New Market, MD. Grant escaped from his enslaver in 1824. As an adult he became a Presbyterian minister and was a passionate preacher against slavery. He was also a member of the American Anti-Slavery Society. After the Civil War he helped people displaced by the war and helped the Federal Government develop programs for formerly enslaved people.




