Reflection from Our Parish Life Coordinator,

During this hope-filled season of Advent, I watched a lecture about hope given by Fr. Michael Himes who passed away earlier this year. I found myself writing down word for word what he said because he said it so well! So, rather than offer a summary, I'll share some of my favorite quotes:

What is Hope: "Hope is based on God's activity in us. God loves us not because we are lovable but because God is loving. Our hope is rooted in God's activity. Hope is rooted in God's constant quest of us. The foundation of our hope is that God is always reaching out to us in love. It is because of our conviction that God is endlessly reaching out to us that we have the courage to reach out to God. Hope is the virtue of endlessly reaching out in the conviction that we are always being reached toward."

Hope vs Despair: [Talking about the temptation in the Garden of Eden] "The root of this sin is not disobedience. It is not pride. The root is despair - the inability to believe that we're as good as God says we are. It's the inability to accept that God has chosen to make us like God."

[Reflecting on Dante's inferno] "The entry to hell is hopelessness; it's despair. Satan is a monster of despair. Once one rejects the goodness of being, there are no limits to the horrors that can follow. That's despair."

[Antidote to despair] "The need to turn out, the need to give oneself away grows constantly throughout our lives. Hope is about reaching out - because we are so completely confident that there is one reaching toward us."

[Referencing the Christian Community] "We never come to God alone. We always come to God in conjunction with everybody else. God always brings us into God's love as a member of a people. It is because we are always connected to others that we are a people of hope. There is a danger in that, however. If the community disappoints us, it can badly damage our hope. If you are not disappointed in the Roman Catholic church at this time, you must be comatose. There are profound disappointments for many of us. It is the conviction that God never drops us even though we don't deserve to be held that is not only the source of our ability to live with ourselves in hope but to live with one another in hope. Any community that for 2000 years has faithfully proclaimed the standards by which it itself is condemned is a very good community to belong to."


Mark Your Calendars!

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Antiracism at College Church

At College Church, antiracism is an expression of our recognition that all are created in the image of God. As such, we respond—personally and collectively— to the call to identify, and to actively challenge, structures and systems that devalue people on the basis of race, and to practice restoration in the pursuit of justice.

Our Parish Racial Equity Review: An Update

Approximately two and a half years ago, we at College Church determined that we would become an antiracist parish, and we enshrined that intention as a priority within our parish vision. To help realize the required transformation, members of the SFX Antiracism Team and parish leaders partnered with the Crossroads Antiracism and Training Organization to initiate a scrutiny of every aspect of our parish life. We call that process of scrutiny our parish racial equity review.

Over the course of the past year, members of the Review Team's History Committee have worked to ensure that the review process is thoroughly grounded in the knowledge of the parish's founding. That grounding required the gathering of historical detail relative to College Church, the Archdiocese of St. Louis, the Society of Jesus, St. Louis University, and the City of St. Louis. Historical highlights were identified to create a brochure, timeline banners, and an introductory parish racial history video. To keep what we had learned before us and to share it with the greatest number of parishioners, History Committee members and invited guest speakers offered a series of three presentations —which concluded in November—chronicling important milestones and elevating significant historical figures.

Review team members have also engaged in extensive training throughout the year, starting with an orientation to the review process a year ago, followed by an examination of white cultural dominance as evidenced within Christianity, and undertaking a five-week intensive workshop to prepare for the work of the review. Currently, the team is being introduced to, and gaining practice with, the analytical tools that will facilitate the exchanges needed to appraise our parish life. And team members have actually begun the process of data collection. The coming months will see additional collection of information regarding our policies, practices, and offerings toward the goal of recommending change.

As important as the training—and somewhat unanticipated, as it sets this experience apart from other similar exercises—is the personal growth and interpersonal change, the noticeable difference in our way of being, that mark this journey. Please pray, during this season of Advent, for all—within our parish and beyond—who are engaged in the work of racial justice.

White Like Me: Reflections on Race from a Privileged Son - Tim Wise

Recently, the Racism and Reconciliation Committee at College Church, in collaboration with the Peace and Justice Committee at St. Alphonsus Liguori "Rock" Church, and the Center for Social Action at St. Louis University, hosted a community conversation on race and racism. The program began with a screening of a recorded address given by Tim Wise at the University of Tennessee – Martin. Mr. Wise has been engaged in the work of antiracism as a writer, educator, and activist for over thirty years. He was a leader in the student movement at Tulane University seeking financial divestment from companies doing business in South Africa during apartheid. After graduation he worked with several organizations on issues related to justice and was part of the movement to defeat David Duke's political campaigns. Since that time, he has written and lectured extensively on the topic of racism, particularly the harm to people of color and the benefits to white people that are preserved through systemic racism. White Like Me: Reflections on Race from a Privileged Son is the title of Wise's memoir, through which he shares multiple examples of his personal experience of privilege.

Many of the ideas presented in Mr. Wise's video address resonated with the participants of the community conversation. Among those ideas was the value for a more complete understanding of our history. It is important to understand not only the legacy of harm that has resulted from slavery and segregation and other forms of oppression, but it is also valuable to learn from the examples of the many leaders who have worked and continue to work toward a just and equitable society. Tim Wise is one of those leaders whose efforts help guide our path forward.

A Filipino Christmas: A Blend of Secular and Religious Elements

The Philippines has the longest history of Christmas in Asia. While some of the secular elements come from America (e.g., Santa Claus and snowmen), the oldest

Christmas rituals come from their Spanish heritage. Pedro Chirino, a 17th century Jesuit, described the Filipino choirs as better than those in Spain.

Giving Macy's a run for their money, the Christmas decorations go up early in September in homes, malls, and public buildings. The creche is a legacy of St. Francis Assisi and is now found round the world. As opposed to wearing Palestinian robes, the Filipino version has Mary and Joseph in tropical clothes surrounded by coconut trees.

A uniquely religious ritual includes the Simbang Gadi, a nine-day novena of pre-dawn Masses leading up to Christmas. The Filipinos believe the sacrifice of waking before sunrise adds potency to their prayers. Many Filipinos attend this novena for a specific intention.

From great-grandfathers to infants, families gather for the Christmas meal known at Noche Buena. The meal begins late in the evening of Christmas Eve and lasts until the first few hours of Christmas Day. The menu usually consists of Christmas ham and ensaymada, a light sweet bread dusted with sugar and grated cheese. Gifts are exchanged with relatives during the Noche Buena.

The most popular Christmas album, "Christmas in Our Hearts" was released in 1990 and is played continually to this day. The most popular song includes the lyrics:

"Whenever I see girls and boys selling lanterns on the street, I remember the child in the manger sleeps, Whenever I see people giving gifts, exchanging cards, I believe Christmas is truly in their hearts."


