### Antiracism at College Church

At College Church, antiracism is an expression of our recognition that all are created in the image of God. As such, we respond—personally and collectively— to the call to identify, and to actively challenge, structures and systems that devalue people on the basis of race, and to practice restoration in the pursuit of justice.

#### **Christmas Lights Will Not Shine in Bethlehem**

Last month, Christian leaders and municipal authorities in Bethlehem decided that, as an act of solidarity with the suffering in Gaza, there would be no Christmas celebrations in the West Bank city this year. Though religious services will be held, public festivities such as Christmas markets are cancelled and, for the first time since modern celebrations began, the Manger Square tree in the birthplace of Jesus will not be decorated.

Bethlehem was not alone in that decision. Patriarchs and heads of the churches in Jerusalem asked Christians in the Holy Land to refrain from festive Christmas activities, as have Catholic churches in Galilee. In Jordan, the Jordan Council of Church Leaders announced that festive Christmas celebrations will be cancelled. Witnessing the horrors of war and the ensuing humanitarian catastrophe, the festive spirit is crushed.

A letter to President Biden from two Palestinian Christians captures the grief and longing that underlie the decisions to cancel Christmas celebrations, "This land has been crying for peace and justice for 75 years. It is time justice is served. It is time everybody can live with dignity in this land. The Palestinian and Israeli children deserve to live, hope, and dream."<sup>1</sup>

And a recent statement from the Society of Jesus reinforces this message:

Last week, when speaking to his weekly audience, Pope Francis urged the world to take "only one side" in the Israeli-Palestinian war—the one "of peace." He added, "War does not solve any problem, it only sows death and destruction, increases hatred, multiplies revenge. War erases the future..."

The Society of Jesus endorses the Pope's unconditional call for peace.

The Society of Jesus has been present at the heart of the conflict in Israel-Palestine and throughout the Middle East. Jesuits have been deeply engaged in dialogue with Jews. Fully committed to the uprooting of the teaching of contempt for Jews, anti-Judaism, and anti -Semitism, the Society of Jesus also recognizes the rights of Jews in Israel and everywhere else in the world. Never again must Jews be murdered, raped, maimed, tortured, kidnapped and threatened. Jesuits have also been deeply engaged in dialogue with Muslims who form the majority of Palestinians together with the Christian Palestinians. They are fully committed to the building up of multicultural and multireligious societies in Palestine and throughout the Middle East. They are active in the fight against Islamophobia and racism. Palestinians have the right to live everywhere in their homeland in dignity and peace. Never again must Palestinians be murdered, buried under the rubble of their homes, expelled, starved, collectively punished and exiled.

It is time to say stop the killing and promotion of ideologies that permit it. Stop instrumentalizing religion for political power projects. Decades of violent conflict have brought nothing but ruin on the entire region and escalation of hatred. The only possible victory is the fruit of a struggle for justice and peace, equality and reconciliation.

Today, in this time of engulfing darkness and death, let us embrace the invitation to take the side of peace.<sup>2</sup>

#### Kwanzaa

A Celebration of Unity and Reflection Kwanzaa is a pan-African and African-American cultural festival celebrated from December 26th to January Ist. Professor Maulana Karenga, who teaches African Studies at California State University – Long Beach, introduced the festival in 1966 to counter the commercialism of Christmas. Kwanzaa comes from the Swahili word meaning "first fruits." Seven principles comprise the celebration:

Unity – maintaining the unity of family, community, nation, and race;

• Self-Determination – define ourselves, name ourselves, create and speak for ourselves;

· Collective Work – build and maintain our community. Make our brothers' and sisters' problems our problems;

Collective economics – build and maintain our shops, stores, businesses, and profit from them together;

 $\cdot\,$  Purpose – build and develop our community and restore our people to their greatness;

· Creativity – leave our community more beautiful than we inherited it; and · Faith – believe in our people, our parents, our teachers, our lead-



ers and believe in the righteous.

As Professor Karenga said, "During Kwanzaa we study, recall, and reflect on our history and the role we play as a legacy to the future."

During Kwanzaa seven candles traditionally are displayed on a table with three red candles on the left, three green candles on the right, and one black candle in the center. Each day one candle is lit starting with the black candle and then alternating between the red and green candles. The red candles represent the struggle, the green candle the land, and the black candle Africa. The communal feast is called Karamu and draws on the cultures of the Caribbean, Africa, and South America. The food served includes fried okra, plantains, fried chicken, black bean soup, baked ham, and gumbo. The feast is not just about the food—it is a time to sing, to pray, and celebrate African heritage. The last day of Kwanzaa is a time for reflection. People ask themselves: Who am I? Am I really who I say I am? Am I all I ought to be?

#### **Significant Figures in Racial History**

Jane Aileen Gordon Kaiser - born December 27, 1912, in St. Louis, MO. Gordon-Kaiser was a descendant of Thomas lefferson with a women whom he enslaved.

When Kaiser's children were old enough to attend school, she challenged the St. Louis archdiocesan school system to admit her son. Though unsuccessful, her efforts motivated the transfer of Archbishop Joseph Ritter to St. Louis, who integrated the Catholic schools.

Sister Thea Bowman, FSPA – born December 29, 1937, in Yazoo City, MS. Bowman became a Franciscan Sister and made major contributions to the ministry of Black Catholics, including the production of an African American Hymnal. She died of cancer in 1990, and her cause for sainthood has been introduced at the Vatican.
