FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK



Next weekend the anointing of the sick will be offered at all the Masses. One of the prominent themes in the Gospels is Jesus the healer. The Evangelists depict again and again Christ's ministry towards the sick and suffering. Even his opponents acknowledged the power he exercised to cure all kinds of infirmities.

Physical ailment in first century Palestine was not simply a matter of being lame or blind. The human person was seen as both spiritual and physical. Just as important, an individual was intimately embedded into a communal network of relations. Illness is a spiritual condition as well as physical. It has enormous repercussions for communal ties. Sickness, in whatever form, was a profound experience of separation.

Jesus' power is directed to the whole person, not just fixing the physical problem. Faith is essential to the encounter with Him. The Gospel's stories recount not only the person's restoration to health, but also to the wider community. The person is healed and made whole in every way. That is why the healing Christ brings is so much connected to the inauguration of God's Kingdom. Healing is symbolic of God's definitive in-breaking into all creation through Jesus Christ.

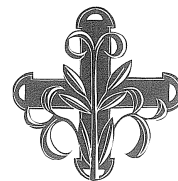

A Call to Discernment

Thanks to everyone who has participated in a house meeting over the last four months. Parishioners have hosted nearly 30 gatherings in person or on zoom.

Approximately 150 parishioners have participated. In the coming weeks members of our transition team will review all of the notes that were taken at these meetings to continue our parish discernment.

We hope to continue in some form the process of meeting in small groups and sharing our desires and concerns with one another. We see this a core practice for becoming a more synodal church.

Prayer for the Synod on Synodality

Every session of the Second Vatican Council began with the prayer *Adsumus Sancte Spiritus*, the first word of the Latin original meaning, “We stand before You, Holy Spirit,” which has been historically used at Councils, Synods and other Church gatherings for hundreds of years, being attributed to Saint Isidore of Seville (c. 560 - 4 April 636). As we are called to embrace this synodal path of the Synod 2021-2023, this prayer invites the Holy Spirit to operate within us so that we may be a community and a people of grace. For the Synod 2021-2023, we propose to use this simplified version, so that any group or liturgical assembly can pray more easily.

We stand before You, Holy Spirit, as we gather together in Your name.

With You alone to guide us, make Yourself at home in our hearts;

Teach us the way we must go and how we are to pursue it.

We are weak and sinful; do not let us promote disorder.

Do not let ignorance lead us down the wrong path nor partiality influence our actions.

Let us find in You our unity so that we may journey together to eternal life and not stray from the way of truth and what is right.

All this we ask of You, who are at work in every place and time, in the communion of the Father and the Son, forever and ever.

Reflections on Synodality

An explanation of synodality that speaks to me is “walking together.” I imagine all of us, our whole parish, as companions on a journey. We, each and every one of us, open our hearts to hear God’s will, and we all have the courage to share with the community where and how we hear God calling us to go. We also listen to each other, recognizing that each one of us is receiving God’s call. This dialogue—the sharing and listening—is our discernment process, and through it we together see our path to growing closer to God. We are not sheep, unthinkingly following a shepherd. Instead, we are each co-responsible for finding the righteous path so we can travel it together.

Anointing of the Sick

Healing was one of the central aspects of the ministry of Jesus. He was moved with care and compassion for each of the people who sought his assistance.



The church extends this ministry of Jesus into our time and place through visitation of the sick, bringing communion to those in institutions and who are homebound, and through the sacrament of Anointing of the Sick. Next weekend at our liturgies, we will celebrate the sacrament communally. Communal celebrations allow the whole community to express their connection to the sick, express our support, and affirm their dignity as our sisters and brothers.

Following the homily, all who have a serious illness, who are recovering from or preparing for surgery, or who are experiencing the challenges of advancing age are invited to receive the sacrament. The rite begins with intercessory prayers for those who wish to be anointed. All who are near them are invited to hold their hand, touch their shoulder or extend a hand toward them.

For the anointing they will be invited to step out into the aisle and stay by their pew. The priest will come to them. Those who are unable to stand should raise their hand as the priest comes down the aisle. He will anoint you on your forehead and the palms of your hands with the words:

Through this holy anointing may the Lord in his love and mercy help you with the grace of the Holy Spirit. Amen

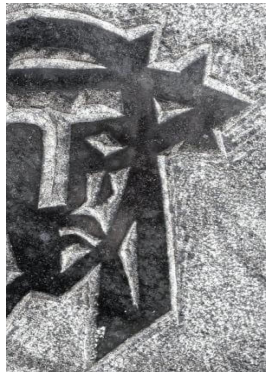
May the Lord who frees you from sin, save you and raise you up. Amen

Racial Justice Journey: A Lenten Call to Conversion

Lent is a season of preparation during which we are drawn to spiritual practices that can deepen our relationship with God and one another. Our parish vision challenges us to become an antiracist faith community. To that end, our Racism and Reconciliation Committee will offer, for the 4th year, an online Lenten Racial Justice Journey for our enrichment. It contains daily readings, videos, and podcasts on the theme of racial justice. The material will be printed in the weekly bulletins and shared through our website beginning February 27th. This year, in connection with our Parish Racial Equity Review, the journey will also include information, history, and reflections specific to our parishioners, parish, SLU, the St. Louis community, and the Jesuits.



It is not necessary to view every entry for the experience to be meaningful. It is most beneficial to bring our thoughts and feelings about the material to our prayer. This is an important part of the Lenten Journey. A racial justice examen and other prayers will be made available with the Racial Justice Journey material. Spiritual Conversations

To help us absorb and process the content of the Racial Justice Journey in a personal way, we invite parishioners to participate in small discussion groups, through Zoom, for spiritual conversation about the material. Volunteers from among our parish leaders will facilitate the groups, and weekly reflection questions based on the Examen will engage us in our Ignatian Spirituality. In addition, participation in these spiritual conversations will guide us in applying the Lenten lessons of conversion and discipleship to the pursuit of racial justice.

The conversation groups will begin the week of March 6. We envision each group meeting for about an hour per week to pray together and to share feelings, challenges, and inspirations based on the provided reflection questions. Our intent is for these conversations to grow our knowledge and prayer life, to call us toward discipleship, and to deepen relationships in our parish community.

Parish History Presentation on the Horizon

Last December, College Church began a racial equity review designed to appraise every aspect of parish life with a view toward identifying, and dismantling, the ways in which systemic racism is preserved. The review process began with the collection and examination of the parish's history within the context of historical developments in the City of St. Louis, the Archdiocese of St. Louis, the Society of Jesus, and St. Louis University. As compilation of that history progressed, the need to share it with the entire parish became increasingly clear. In response, members of the Parish Equity Review Team are preparing a video presentation—available for viewing as of February 27—which will address the importance of knowing our history as a parish, will elevate some of the highlights of our history, and will explore how knowledge of that history helps move us toward the goal of becoming an antiracist parish. In addition to the video, an accompanying brochure containing an historical timeline and inviting parishioners to engage with our history will be available in church on February 27. Look for information about how to access the video in next week's bulletin.

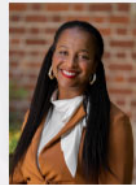
A CALL TO CONVERSION
