

Living Our Faith: Meet Joy

I've been a parishioner since: 2017. I was a student at St. Margaret of Scotland then, and my family joined College Church for the religious education program. I was confirmed here, and my parents - Rob Garavaglia and Bridget Rush -- and I remain active parishioners. My brother, Anthony, is away at college.

Living my faith: In my sophomore year of high school, I became a teaching assistant in the parish's religious ed programs. I work with the program's instructors and SLU students to lead small groups of kids who use hands-on activities to bring the lesson of the week to life. I've also been a volunteer in the summer social justice camp for middle schoolers.

One of my most memorable experiences was taking part in a Solidarity Trip to the Border with other classmates. We went to El Paso, and attended a bilingual Mass at the border - with people in Texas on one side of the congregation and in Mexico on the other -- in memory of those who died on their journey to the US. We talked to border patrol officials and girls and boys who were awaiting processing. We heard their stories, and learned that the best way we can help is to gain knowledge and share that with others, to build empathy and understanding.

Why I'm involved: My first reasons for volunteering at SFX's religion education program were to meet my school's requirement for service to others and to see if I like teaching and working with children. Now in my third year, I find that I'm deepening and learning more about my faith through the eyes of the young students. They teach me more than I teach them. Working with the kids puts the values of faith into action, and that is powerful and moving.

Three words that describe SFX: Passionate, Inclusive, Faithful

My neighborhood: My family lives in Tower Grove, near the Missouri Botanical Garden. It's so close to everything, including The Hill, where I have a job ringing out customers at Missouri Baking Co. (Favorite pastry: cheesecake!)

Fun facts: I'm a senior at Notre Dame High School where my activities include cheerleading, playing on the tennis team, and serving on the Student Diversity Committee. After graduation, I'll be going to college and preparing for a career in early childhood education.

Recently, I was selected to be Notre Dame's 2024 recipient of the Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Model of Justice Award. It was inspiring to be one of 26 local students who recognize the dignity of people from all backgrounds, and to be honored with them at a special Mass at the Cathedral Basilica that commemorated Dr. King's birth and legacy of peace and justice.

Antiracism at College Church

At College Church, antiracism is an expression of our recognition that all are created in the image of God. As such, we respond—personally and collectively— to the call to identify, and to actively challenge, structures and systems that devalue people on the basis of race, and to practice restoration in the pursuit of justice.

A New Saint; A New Parish

St. Josephine Bakhita is the name selected by one of the new parishes in St. Louis, formed from the former Most Holy Trinity, St. Nicholas, and Sts. Teresa and Bridget

parishes. The parish belongs to the same Deanery/Vicariate as SFX.

Bakhita was born around 1869, in Sudan in northeast Africa. At that time Sudan was a British colony bordered by the Red Sea to the east and Egypt to the north, so it was a significant economic player in the region. Accordingly, young Bakhita's family was

prosperous. But at age 9, she was kidnapped and sold into slavery where a series of owners humiliated and tortured her. Her trauma was so great that she even forgot her name. Her kidnappers called her Bakhita which ironically means "fortunate." At age 13 she was sold to a Turkish general. His mistresses punished Bakhita with beatings every day. She also endured excruciating tattoo rituals. Incisions were made in her skin with a razor and salt poured into the wounds. One hundred forty-four permanent scars covered her body.

In 1883, Bakhita was sold to a family who treated her with kindness. They brought her to Italy to work as a maid and caregiver for their baby. When the couple went on a trip, they left the child and Bakhita in the care of nuns at a boarding school. When Bakhita heard the Gospel there, she believed God wanted her freedom. Slavery was illegal in Italy, so Bakhita left her owners and followed God's call. She was baptized "Josephine" and made her first Communion. After prayer and discernment, she joined the convent, making her vows at age 27. Her life was then marked by simplicity and witnessing God's love through cooking, sewing, and attending to the door where she caressed the heads of children; her voice comforting the poor and suffering. Her smile won people's hearts.

In old age Josephine experienced painful sickness, but never complained. Asked how she was, she replied: "As the Master desires." Bakhita died at age 78 on February 8, 1947, and that date is her feast day. She was canonized in 2000 and is the only saint from Sudan. She is the patron of victims of slavery and of trafficking.

Protesting Segregation

The Montgomery Bus Boycott was the first large-scale demonstration against segregation in the U.S. Until



the 1950s, a city ordinance required Black people to sit in the back of buses and yield their seats to white riders if the front of the bus was full. On December 1, 1955, African American seamstress, Rosa Parks, was seated in the front row of the "colored section" on her way home from work. When the white seats filled the driver asked Parks to move, but she refused. Yet she wasn't the first to do so. Earlier that year, on March 2, Claudette Colvin, age 15, had done the same thing. And in October 18-year-old Mary Louise Smith and five other young women, did likewise. All of them were arrested and fined.

When Parks called a prominent Black leader to bail her out of jail, he realized she would be a sympathetic plaintiff in a legal challenge to segregation. Within days African American leaders, including Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., formed the Montgomery Improvement Association which decided to attack the ordinance and called for a boycott of all buses the day of Parks' court hearing. Approximately 40,000 Black riders decided to boycott the bus system until the city met their demands, including hiring Black drivers and a "first-come, first-seated" policy.

The city resisted those demands even though African Americans comprised 75 percent of Montgomery's ridership. Many walked instead of riding a bus. Black leaders organized carpools and the city's Black taxi drivers charged only 10 cents—the price of bus fare—for African Americans. Ultimately, a group of women represented by the NAACP, sued to have the busing segregation laws invalidated. In June 1956, a federal district court ruled that the ordinance violated the 14th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution which guarantees equal rights and equal protection under state and federal laws to all citizens. The Supreme Court upheld that decision.

Montgomery's buses were integrated on December 21, 1956, and the boycott ended after 381 days. Dr. King emerged as a preeminent leader of the civil rights

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movement. Yet integration met with violence. Snipers fired into buses. Churches and homes of Black leaders were bombed. Eventually, police arrested seven bombers, all members of the Ku Klux Klan.

Significant Figures in Racial History

Rosa Parks – born February 4, 1913, in Tuskegee, AL. (see article)

Charles Curtis – died February 8, 1936, in Washington, DC. His mother descended from Kaw, Osage, and Potawatomi nations. Curtis became an attorney and served as vice president of the U.S. from 1929 to 1933 under Herbert Hoover. Curtis was the first person of Native American ancestry to reach a high office in the U.S. government.

St. Josephine Bakhita – died February 8, 1947. (see article)

Saint Miguel Febres Cordero, FSC – died February 9, 1910, in Spain. Cordero was born in Cuenca, Ecuador, and became a Christian Brother. He worked in education for forty years. Cordero then served his religious community in Spain until he died. He is the first male saint from Ecuador.

Saint José Sanchez del Rio – died February 10, 1928, in Michoacán, Mexico. When the Mexican government tried to suppress all religion, a Christian rebellion began. Sanchez was too young to fight, yet he was tortured and put to death at age 14 for refusing to renounce his Catholic faith.

for describing and understanding how white supremacy and systemic racism operate within institutions and deepen their learning through large group discussions, experiential activities, small group sharing, and individual reflection. This workshop will be open to the public.
