Pope Francis has a special monthly prayer intention for the entire Church. Approximately 150 parishioners have participated. In the coming weeks members of our transition team will review all of the notes that were taken at these meetings to continue our parish discernment.

We hope to continue in some form the process of meeting in small groups and sharing our desires and concerns with one another. We see this a core practice for becoming a more synodal church.

Prayer for the Synod on Synodality

Every session of the Second Vatican Council began with the prayer Adsumus Sancte Spiritus, the first word of the Latin original meaning, "We stand before You, Holy Spirit," which has been historically used at Councils, Synods and other Church gatherings for hundreds of years, being attributed to Saint Isidore of Seville (c. 560 - 4 April 636). As we are called to embrace this synodal path of the Synod 2021-2023, this prayer invites the Holy Spirit to operate within us so that we may be a community and a people of grace. For the Synod 2021-2023, we propose to use this simplified version, so that any group or liturgical assembly can pray more easily.

We stand before You, Holy Spirit, as we gather together in Your name.

With You alone to guide us, make Yourself at home in our hearts;

Teach us the way we must go and how we are to pursue it.

We are weak and sinful; do not let us promote disorder.

Do not let ignorance lead us down the wrong path nor partiality influence our actions.

Let us find in You our unity so that we may journey together to eternal life and not stray from the way of truth and what is right.

All this we ask of You, who are at work in every place and time, in the communion of the Father and the Son, forever and ever.

Reflections on Synodality

For me, synodality means that the laity are called to be in full partnership with the clergy in moving the church forward. In many ways, College Church already embraces this way of being. We are no longer just "helping out" but in fact are "co-responsible". A clerical model of church is obviously no longer sustainable. If the church is to have a future then we are the ones who must take it there. There is no "vocation crisis" when we live this model of church for we are all equally called to lead.

Antiracism at College Church Update from the Antiracism Team

With the start of a new calendar year, the members of the Antiracism Team took the opportunity to look back on the path we have traveled for the past three and a half years that we have been meeting. We reflected on the growth we have witnessed in our parish's desire to become an antiracist community, and we began to look ahead to create the support needed to continue and to build on that growth. Many examples of the work of antiracism can be witnessed in ministries and works throughout the parish. For instance, in collaboration with the Antiracism Team's Liturgical and Spirituality Committee, SFX staff and catechists have been exploring the religious imagery presented to children in their classroom space and working to ensure that they encounter diverse representation. Last year, members of the pastoral council and other parish leaders not only incorporated the annual Racial Justice Journey into their Lenten observance, many participated in weekly Spiritual Conversations to share their prayer experience. Our understanding of the impact of systemic racism grew as many parishioners participated in educational programs and dialogs, such as "Hiding In Plain Sight." The Racial Equity Review of our parish has begun and the first step, a thorough examination of our history and the ways it has supported as well as opposed racism, will soon be shared with the parish community. We are grateful for the many ways our pastor, Fr. Dan White, SJ, the parish staff, and SFX parishioners have accompanied one another on this journey.

Our desire to engage all members of the College Church community in the work of antiracism is ongoing. We will continue to invite all into conversation, prayer, and action, seeking and developing the right relationship with all of our sisters and brothers that God intends. In addition to collaboration with individuals and ministries within our parish, we share this journey of racial justice with others in our civic and religious communities. One such connection is with the Jesuit Anti-Racism Sodality, also known as JARS. In the past, members of this group have partnered with the College Church community by initiating the Tuesday evening vigils and offering the "Know Justice Know Peace" racial justice virtual retreats.

Introduction to UCS JARS

Over the past couple of years, a small group of Jesuits who are in formation have gathered to pray and reflect on the need for an ongoing response to the sin of racism in the world, and more specifically, within the boundaries of the US Central and Southern (UCS) Province of the Society of Jesus. The boundaries of the UCS Province covers the US portions of the Midwest, Gulf South, Puerto Rico and Belize.



Our prayer and reflection have grounded us in the difficult history and current

reality of racism against People of Color within the geographical region of our Province. We recognize that our Province, as well as institutions and individual Jesuits, have contributed to this sinful history. We humbly acknowledge that today, our Province and our Catholic Church remains in need of looking critically and honestly at our history and current reality in order to more faithfully follow the call of Christ, the Eternal King, who preaches a reign of justice, reconciliation, and peace.

We see the following as the threefold call that UCS JARS (Jesuit Anti-Racism Sodality) seeks to responds to: "To see the corrosive effects of racism, to judge this reality from the perspective of our faith in Christ and his Gospel, and to respond with concerted action" (from UCS JARS Proposal, December 29, 2020).



It is our sincere hope that UCS JARS will serve as a space for Jesuit members of our Province and our lay collaborators to gather in order to respond to this call in a sustained, committed, and Spirit-guided way, through the lens of our Ignatian Spirituality.


