FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK



No one likes to be tested. No student has ever told a teacher, "More exams, please." Even well into adulthood a common nightmare is showing up late for the SAT or one's college finals. The anxiety of being evaluated most definitely leaves a mark.

That is why it is reasonable to approach today's Gospel with fear and trembling. The common title of this story is "Jesus' Temptation in the Desert." A more accurate would be "Jesus' Testing in the Wilderness." This harkens back to Deuteronomy when the people of Israel were tested for forty years as they wandered. Spoiler alert: they failed the test over and over.

Matthew makes explicit the contrast between that experience and Jesus. The devil tries to trip him up three different times, and is completely defeated. Jesus is the model of what it means to be faithful to God's covenantal love. Every test is aced.

It is good to begin Lent by focusing on the identity of Jesus, Son of God. We tend to make this season about ourselves, whether it be dwelling on our sinfulness or concentrating on what we are doing for Lent. Christ, however, is always the starting point for us. How can we possibly be faithful disciples if it becomes all about ourselves? This is not about our failing the test, but instead the One who never fails.

Lenten Gathering Rite

Lent is a season of preparation for the great feast of Easter, in which we are invited to pause and ponder the quality of our relationship with God and others...to celebrate the good we find there and to seek forgiveness and reconciliation for what is lacking. The traditional Lenten disciplines – prayer, fasting and almsgiving – provide us with the contours and practices for the conversion we seek.

During this penitential season the Gathering Rite we will sing gently implores, "Gather us in mercy, Lord. From the depths we cry to you." The presider will invite the assembly to either kneel or bow our heads during the penitential rite. Either posture is a way of helping us bodily recognize and acknowledge our need for God's mercy. Doing this together further underlines the communal nature of our Lenten journey of conversion and of our need for one another. Our bodies, our voices, our hearts unite in humility and trust as we enter into the great prayer of the mass.

Lenten Books and Materials

The season of Lent offers us an opportunity to deepen our relationship with God. Reflection materials are available in the vestibule of the church this morning. These include: a variety of daily reflection booklets with excerpts from the preaching of Pope Francis, the writings of Henri Nouwen, or from Cardinal Newman.

<u>Daybreak</u> is a series that presents passages from the writings of particular authors arranged for reflection during Lent. Each booklet features a different author. These include Fr. John Kavanaugh, SJ,, Fr. Ronald Rolheiser, OMI, scripture scholar Sr. Diane Bergant, CSA, and liturgist Fr. Paul Turner.

There are books that draw from the writings of St. Ignatius, St Francis and St. Claire, and Thomas Merton. Joyce Rupp, OSM, has a new book for Lenten reflection, *Jesus, Friend of my Soul*, that offers a two-page reflection for each day.

Additionally, there are booklets for children with stickers, suggested activities for older children, and some with reflections for teens and young adults. If you would like to reserve a book or pick one up during the week, please contact Joseph Milner at joseph.milner@slu.edu or 314-977-7305.


2020 Lenten Racial Justice Journey


Video: THE RIVER AND THE WALL

Communal Lenten Formation Activity

There is a long tradition of adopting a special practice for Lent in order to make a more generous offering of ourselves to the Lord in this season. As an expression of our communal desire to be formed more deeply by the Lord—not only as individuals but as a parish—our pastor Fr Dan White proposes that we adopt a common Lenten practice this year as a parish. Think of this as something you can do, not just for yourself, but for the parish, and even for the whole Church.



The idea is to reflect together in small groups on the Sunday gospel as a way of entering more deeply into our weekly encounter with

the Lord in the Mass. What makes this passage from the gospel "good news"? What new horizon does it open for me and for our parish? How do I sense it forming me more profoundly in the love of God?

We invite you to sign up for a small group that will meet once a week during Lent for about 45 minutes each time. A large variety of groups will be available, some meeting on Sundays at the parish, others elsewhere in the area and on other days. The Disciplines of Lent

Jesus said, "Whoever wishes to be my follower must deny his very self, take up his cross each day and follow in my steps." (Lk 9:23)



In response to this call, the Church for centuries has invited Catholics to make the season of Lent one of repentance for sin and a renewal of our baptism. **Baptism and penance** are the two foci of the season. We journey with our catechumens as they prepare to be baptized at the Easter Vigil. We embrace the traditional spiritual practices of **prayer, fasting and almsgiving.**

Prayer is the way each of us grows in our relationship with God. Consider adopting the Ignatian practice of praying the Examen; commit to more daily prayer time; pray the Stations of the Cross to connect with the suffering of Christ in our brothers and sisters today. And remember to journey prayerfully with all the candidates and catechumens throughout the Church as they prepare for full incorporation into the Church at Easter.

Fasting helps us remember that we are ultimately dependent on God, not food or our own selves. Ash Wednesday (Feb 26) and Good Friday (Apr 10) are days of fasting for those ages 18-59. Fasting means one full meal a day, with two smaller meals and nothing between meals. Our communal fasting manifests our collective commitment to putting God first in our lives.

Abstinence from meat invites us to join the poor of the world in eating simply. As Jesus empties himself and shared in the poverty of the human condition, so are we asked to embrace the poverty of those who live on subsistence diets.

Ash Wednesday and all Fridays of Lent are days of abstinence from meat. All who are 14 years of age and older, unless there is a serious health problem, are asked to share in this discipline.

Almsgiving is a means for us to respond concretely to those who are in need. Giving can include material gifts or gifts of the spirit. Ideally, whatever we choose is given not from our excess, but in a way that is sacrificial and makes us do without.
