Today's New Testament readings regale us with that most fundamental of Christian convictions, that we have been loved into existence by a God whose very being is Love overflowing. St. Paul reminds us that "God is rich in mercy, because of the great love he [has] for us." And in the Gospel we find one of the most famous passages in the entire Bible, one often referenced on countless "John 3:16" placards waved by earnest evangelizers at sports events. There is no more central Christian claim, yet the very pervasiveness of this passage can make it difficult for its outrageous assertion to seep into our bones.

However, I experienced (anew) God's outrageous love when I became a grandparent last year. When visiting my new grandchild, Elliot, I saw again the power of love at its most elemental.

As I watched my sleep-deprived daughter-in-law selflessly nursing little Elliot, the Gospel refrain echoed anew . . . for God so loved the world.

As I witnessed my son swaying with Elliot in his arms, gently crooning a lullaby . . . for God so loved the world.

As I gazed with wonder into his cherubic visage and held him close . . . for God so loved the world.

This is our God, drawing us into the Father's divine bosom, bearing us up in Love everlasting.



Living Our Faith: Meet Mary

An SFX parishioner since: 2012. I like to say my journey to College Church began on a dark and stormy night. In 2004, I was a hit-or-miss Catholic who felt a calling to go deeper in my spiritual life. I thought a faith-based retreat might be a way to dig into that. With zero knowledge about Ignatian spirituality, I found myself driving at night through a pouring rain from downtown St. Louis to the White House Retreat Center — questioning that decision every mile. Eight years (and retreats) after that first one, I asked to join College Church where I can more fully embrace Ignatian spirituality. I'm thrilled to be a parishioner and have never questioned the wisdom of that decision!

Living my faith: I'm the granddaughter of four Italian immigrants who retained "green card" status their entire lives because they were shy, not formally educated and lacked command of the English language. So, it was somewhat personal for me to join the Advocacy Committee, where I'm privileged to help raise awareness about the vital needs of those we serve through our Birth Certificate and State Identification Program. I've always wanted to live the call of Christ in Matthew:25. The Program is a perfect manifestation of that call.

Why I'm involved: Those who exit the White House Retreat see a sign that says "Welcome to the Mission Field" – an Ignatian reminder to live our faith through action. In addition to being spiritually fed here, I'm so blessed to be part of a warm and compassionate community. College Church is filled with bright, action-oriented people responding to community needs.

Words that describe SFX: Progressive, Dynamic, Intellectually Stimulating.

My neighborhood: My husband, David, and I live in Creve Coeur near the Jewish Community Center in a beautifully diverse neighborhood. I loved growing up on a farm in a small town in Illinois, and I love the multicultural vibe in my current neighborhood. Common ground is easy to find.

Fun facts: I'm Momma to two beautiful daughters and Nonna to four precious grandchildren (7, 5, 3 and 1!) I'm retired from a 42-year career spent in journalism, communications and marketing, with the exception of a seven-year stint (1993 - 2000) as the founding executive director of Forest ReLeaf of Missouri. This vibrant, volunteer-driven organization, now 31 years old, has planted more than 250,000 trees in neighborhoods, communities and cities. It's such a joy to see the fruits of this labor.

Antiracism at College Church

At College Church, antiracism is an expression of our recognition that all are created in the image of God. As such, we respond—personally and collectively— to the call to identify, and to actively challenge, structures and systems that devalue people on the basis of race, and to practice restoration in the pursuit of justice.

Recognizing Fannie Lou Hamer in Women's History Month

March is Women's History Month. It is a time set aside to celebrate the often-overlooked contributions,



achievements, and leadership of women in all aspects of our society. One day of this month, March the 8th, is also devoted to The International Day of the Woman whose theme for 2024 is Inspire Inclusion. One notable example of this inspiration and leadership was demonstrated by Fanny Lou Hamer. Her life's work impacted voting rights, racial representation in the political process, and economic opportunities for black farmers and entrepreneurs.

Fannie Lou Townsend was born in 1917 in Montgomery City, Mississippi. Her parents were sharecroppers, and she joined her family picking cotton at age six. When she was 12 years old, Fannie Lou left school to work full time. In 1944, she married Perry Hamer and the couple labored on a Mississippi plantation until 1962.

In the summer of 1961, Hamer attended a meeting led by civil rights activists James Forman of the Student Non-Violent Coordinating Committee (SNCC) and James Bevel of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC). She became a SNCC organizer and led multiple groups of African Americans in attempts to register to vote. In June 1963, after successfully completing a voter registration program in Charleston, South Carolina, Hamer and several other black women were arrested for sitting in a "whites-only" bus station restaurant in Winona, Mississippi. While in custody, she and several of the women were brutally beaten, leaving Hamer with lifelong injuries.

Fannie Lou Hamer persisted. She co-founded the Mississippi Freedom Democratic Party (MFDP), that campaigned for racial representation in the electoral process. In 1964, Hamer's impassioned speech to the Credentials Committee of the Democratic National Convention drew attention to the discrimination faced by African Americans in Mississippi and on the barriers to voting rights nationally. The Voting Rights Act was passed in 1965. In following years, the Democratic party ensured fair participation. Fannie Lou Hamer was elected as a national Democratic Party delegate for the 1972 national convention. She also helped to establish

the National Women's Political Caucus.

In addition to political advocacy, Hamer also developed and led efforts to increase economic equality. In 1968, she began a "pig bank" to provide free pigs for black farmers to breed, raise, and slaughter. A year later she launched the Freedom Farm Cooperative (FFC), buying up land that black people could own and farm collectively. She also initiated the building of 200 units of low-income housing—many still exist today.

Fannie Lou Hamer continued to travel the country, speaking to raise support and funds for Civil Rights until her death at age 59. The results of her courage and activism remain with us today.

Salvadoran Martyrs

Born in El Salvador, Rutilio Grande was raised primarily by his grandmother. She was very devout and set the foundation for Rutilio's priestly vocation. "Father" Rutilio celebrated his First Mass on the feast of St. Ignatius in 1959. As a young lesuit, he taught seminarians to be faithful to the people of El Salvador. He ensured that the teachings of Vatican II and of the Latin American Bishops' Conference were accepted by the Salvadoran church. Rutilio truly held a fundamental option for the poor and dedicated his life to proclaiming Gospel justice to the campesinos of his parish. He organized Christian communities to catechize those who were poor or exploited, and to work for human rights as an essential part of discipleship. In fact, Grande's work inspired the Jesuits to adopt promoting justice as part of their primary mission.

Yet not everyone appreciated his efforts. Political leaders and wealthy landowners wanted Grande to be silenced. Several priests were expelled from the country or arrested and tortured for preaching the way he did. On March 12, 1977, Fr. Grande was driving to another village to celebrate Mass. With him were his 72-year-old sacristan, Manuel Solórzano, and a teenage helper, Nelson Rutilio Lemus. Their route passed through fields of sugar cane where they were ambushed. The attackers included Salvadoran security forces and a customs officer. Doctors removed twelve nine-millimeter rounds from Grande's body. Manuel and Nelson also died in the attack.

At the funeral, Archbishop Oscar Romero connected Fr. Grande's life and death to Pope Paul VI's exhortation for the church to be present in the struggle for liberation from human misery. The violence in El Salvador eventually led to a civil war that left 75,000 dead. Among them were 18 priests including 7 Jesuits, 1 archbishop, 5 Religious Sisters, and hundreds of lay catechists.

Grande was beatified in 2022. Pope Francis greatly admires him. The pope considers the impact of Grande's murder – which jarred Archbishop Romero enough that he, too, began preaching justice – as Grande's first miracle! His biographer wrote: "[Rutilio] continued the work of Jesus, announcing the kingdom and making it present by his work and his contact with the harsh reality of the peasants and the marginalized."

Significant Figures in Racial History

Ralph Abernathy, Sr. – born March 11, 1926, in Linden, AL. Rev. Abernathy was a mentor of Martin Luther King Jr. and helped create the Montgomery bus boycott. In 1971, Abernathy addressed the U.N. about world peace, and he helped broker the agreement between the FBI and Native American protestors at the Wounded Knee incident.

Martyrs of El Salvador – died March 12, 1977, in San Salvador. Blessed Rutilio Grande Garcia, SJ, was a Jesuit priest and close friend of Archbishop Oscar Romero. Nelson Rutilio Lemus Chávez, a young very active catechist, helped others to read the Scriptures. Manuel Solórzano worked closely with Fr. Grande for many years. All of them were gunned down in an ambush of their vehicle. Grande was beatified in 2022.

They have invited the CCC to submit additional ideas for thought or activities. The theme for the upcoming week is Worship At The Feast. Here are some thoughts from the CCC:

I.The Greeks who came to the feast said, "We wish to see Jesus." How do you see Jesus in your own life?

2. Along with your family, choose items to donate for the SFX Easter Basket Project (See details elsewhere in the Bulletin).
3. Brainstorm with your family about new ways to avoid wasting

food at home, such as taking smaller portions initially on your plate, using up leftovers instead of tossing them out, composting appropriate types of food scraps, planting a vegetable garden.

4. Visit a local plant nursery to choose seeds or seedlings and learn about caring for your garden.
