Renewing Our Easter Joy

We are now a few weeks into the Easter season and I can't help but wonder: Are we maintaining our Easter joy?



A few weeks into the Lenten season, I found myself examining my Lenten promises. Like many of us, I was doing well with some of them, but I had already fallen behind on others. After four weeks, I felt like I still had plenty of time to go in Lent and I could renew or amend my promises for the rest of the season. While we don't typically take on penances, extra prayers or activities for Easter, like we do for Lent, I think we should do a similar examination with our Easter joy.

We are an Easter people, living in the joy of the Resurrection. Joy, however, can be difficult to maintain over time. It is abundant during the Triduum and Easter Sunday, when we are gathered together as a community and especially when the balloons are still in the air. But after that joyful weekend, we go back to our normal lives and that joy can wane. Lenten promises are not automatic, they are usually things that we have to work at in order to maintain. The same is true for joy.

We have to choose joy. That's right, we have to choose it. Joy is something that we feel, often in response to something, but it is also something that we can find and develop. Many people in Ignatian and Jesuit circles know the phrase, "Finding God in All Things." This means finding God at work and present all around us, including in some of the seemingly ordinary moments, people, and things all around us. This means actively looking for God around us, and within us, so that we might meet the risen Lord on a daily basis.

When we sharpen our eyes to see God in our midst, we can experience the Resurrection constantly. That is how we can find and constantly renew our Easter joy.

Living Our Faith: Meet Sandra Spencer

An SFX parishioner since: 2003. I moved to St. Louis from Minnesota that year to begin work at Saint Louis University Hospital. I was already well acquainted with St. Louis and College Church. I had spent two years here in the late '90s when I attended graduate school at SLU, pursuing a master's degree in pastoral counseling.

Living my faith: My faith has been the driving force of my long life. To begin, I was born in St. Paul, Minn. to a Presbyterian father and Catholic mother. My brother, sister and I say that we learned about the sacraments, the rosary and feast days from Mom, and about Jesus and the Ten Commandments from Dad. As a member of a religious community, my teaching ministry began in

1954 in Catholic Schools in St. Paul and rural Minnesota as a teacher of "upper grades" and an occasional principalship.

My next experience – as a missionary in Guatemala for 20 years, from 1964-1984 – was transformative. The country was in civil war. Vatican II reforms had begun. Documents from Latin America pertaining to justice, poverty and "liberation theology" had life-changing influences on priests, sisters and catechists working with the poor. Innocent citizens were branded as communists, routinely terrorized and randomly murdered. While we were sent to teach religion and train teachers, eventually the need grew for an orphanage and a clinic. From the people of Guatemala we learned a new faith in the waves of brutality, poverty and earthquakes. The people of San Lucas taught us how to pray, how to stand strong in fear, and how to speak the truth. We learned that God was in these mountains, among this people, long before we arrived.

After returning to the States and resuming my education, I ultimately relocated to St. Louis and joined the pastoral care staff of the old Saint Louis University Hospital, providing spiritual support for trauma and cancer patients and staff. I was a chaplain there for nearly 15 years, and served as a director of the department in my last five years.

Why I'm involved: Today, I continue to be an active parishioner at SFX and serve regularly as a lector at 5:15 Mass on some Saturdays, weekdays and Holy Days. I love the study and preparation for the reading of Scripture. And, as a woman, "'Proclaiming the Word" is as close as I can come, right now, to sharing the Word.

For about 18 years, guided and taught by Joe Milner and accompanied by another catechist and dear friend, Carol Joselyn, I participated in the parish's RCIA (Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults) Program. We still gratefully watch these new Catholics grow in their faith and contribute to our parish community.

Now, it's a privilege to be part of two dedicated Parish prayer groups. The Intercessors pray each week for parishioners who are sick. The Elder Prayer Companions gather every six weeks to pray for the needs of our parish leadership. (Both groups welcome new members!)

Three phrases that describe SFX: Committed, Viably Present in the Heart of St. Louis, Consistently Welcoming.

My neighborhood: For the past four years I've lived at St. Agnes Senior Living Apartments in a renovated school building on Wisconsin Ave. in South St. Louis City that is supported by the Archdiocese. It is home to a supportive community of 80 amazing men and women who are black, brown, yellow and white. My neighbors come from China, Puerto Rico, Cuba, Croatia, Eritrea, and, of course, St. Louis and several areas in the U.S. There are many chances to converse in Spanish. We enjoy and learn from each other. And we can take in remarkable views of the sunrise – when smoke is not drifting by the Anheuser Busch complex, that is.

Fun facts: My baptismal and legal name is Alexandra. This was shortened to Sandra, for Ist grade printing purposes, and now serves as my "professional name." It slid to Sandy, a name that has stuck ever since. I respond to all three.

Antiracism at College Church

At College Church, antiracism is an expression of our recognition that all are created in the image of God. As such, we respond—personally and collectively— to the call to identify, and to actively challenge, structures and systems that devalue people on the basis of race, and to practice restoration in the pursuit of justice.

A Few Thoughts and An Invitation

Later this month, all members of the College Church community will be invited to respond to a survey that is a component of our Parish Racial Equity Review. Several parishioners have devoted countless hours to this evaluation process—including development of the items that form the survey. We would like to share some of their thoughts and reflections on this experience.

Joan McGinnis

I am embarrassed to say that I was an older adult before realizing, with the death of Michael Brown, the degree of systemic racism prevalent in St. Louis and throughout the country. I then felt I was part of the problem if I was not part of the solution. That led me to join the Racism and Reconciliation Committee and the Equity Review Team here at College Church. Over the last 6 years I have learned so much about racism and how complicit we are—uncovering the many unmerited privileges I have as a white person. If everyone takes the survey, the results will guide us to identify and design a way to be a more just, loving, and inclusive community for all persons.

Mary Kellogg

Only in recent years have I become aware of the extent of racism surrounding us. I have learned of my own implicit bias and I have discovered that the stories and history I held to be true have hidden stories and facts that I was not taught. This led me to join the Racism and Reconciliation Committee and the Review Team to dig deeper into the problem of racism by examining my heart and actions as well as looking at the world around me including our home at SFX College Church.

We want College Church to be a church that welcomes all people and allows them to be their authentic self and feel welcomed. I would encourage everyone to answer the survey. All voices are important as we examine the culture of our parish so we can be more open and loving.

April is Arab American History Month

According to the Arab American Institute, approximately 3.7 million Americans have Arab ancestry.

It is a diverse community of immigrants and descendants of immigrants whose countries of origin include twenty-two Middle Eastern and North African countries, such as Lebanon, Syria, Egypt, Palestine, Morocco, Iraq, Jordan, Yemen, Bahrain, Tunisia, Algeria, Sudan, Qatar, Saudi Arabia, the United Arab Emirates, among others. In 2017, a national recognition of Arab American Heritage was initiated in the month of April and has continued to grow. In the 2024 Proclamation on Arab American Heritage Month, President Biden acknowledges the numerous contributions made by Arab Americans through professional accomplishments, community service, and civic leadership. We are encouraged to learn more about the history, culture, and achievements of Arab Americans.

Etel Adnan-Speaking in Words and Color

Etel Adnan was a Lebanese American writer and visual artist. Through her novels, news articles, essays, and poetry, she gave voice to many of the important political issues of the day. Her writing often focused on the violence and turmoil of war. Her award-winning novel about a kidnapping in Lebanon during the civil war, *Sitt Marie Rose*, has become a classic of war literature and translated into 10 languages.

Adnan was born in Beirut and grew up in a city and family of diverse cultures. She received a Catholic education from a French school run by nuns. After earning a degree in philosophy from the University of Paris, Adnan pursued graduate studies at the University of California–Berkley and at Harvard. She taught and lectured at colleges throughout the United States and continued to write and publish throughout her life. Her final book, *Shifting the Silence*, was published shortly before her death at age 96.

A self-taught artist, Adnan's drawings, paintings, tapestries, and sculptures gained international attention in the latter part of her career. She recalls visits to the markets of Beirut with her father to see the Persian carpets as her introduction to the color and patterns of visual art. Her work is characterized by geometric patterns and vibrant colors. The mountains of California were a frequent inspiration.

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Etel Adnan won numerous awards for her writing. Exhibits of her artwork can be found on display throughout the world. Through her varied means of expression, Etel Adnan's work helps us to explore the conflict and complexity of our human experience, critique oppressive systems, and to recognize the beauty and love in our world.

Significant Figures in Racial History

BI. Pedro de San Jose Betancur – died April 25, 1667, in Antigua, Guatemala. Known as "St. Francis of the Americas," at age 23 Betancur sailed to the New World as a missionary working among the sick and poor. He founded the Order of Our Lady of Bethlehem to continue his work. He is the first saint of Guatemala.

BI. Laura Evangelista Alvarado Cardoza - born April 25, 1875, in Choroni, Venezuela. As a teenager Cardoza volunteered in hospitals assisting patients with smallpox. After an earthquake, she served those left homeless from that disaster. In 1901 she received permission to found a religious congregation devoted to caring for the ill. Cardoza was beatified in 1995.

Albert King - born April 25, 1923, on a cotton plantation in Indianola, MS. Regarded as one of the most influential blues guitarists of all time. He performed at lke Turner's Manhattan Club in East St. Louis, and with the St. Louis Symphony. King was inducted into the Blues Hall of Fame, and posthumously into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame. Rolling Stone named him among the 100 Greatest Guitarists of All Time.

Harry Belafonte, Jr. – died April 25, 2023, in New York City. Born to Jamaican immigrant parents and raised Catholic, Belafonte popularized calypso music. He was a close confidant of Martin Luther King, Jr. during the civil rights era and financed many of King's activities. Belafonte won countless awards for his singing, acting, and activism including the Kennedy Center Honors, National Medal of Arts, and a Grammy Lifetime Achievement Award. death. However, at trial all officers were acquitted, or charges were dropped.

2024 Offertory Items

First Communion Offerings- What is it that we bring to the Altar?

What is it that we bring to the altar? In preparation for First Communion this year, we have spent time with the children reflecting on this question. The "simple" answer is bread and wine. And yet, when we begin to ponder the bread and wine, the richness of these gifts unfolds.

One of the insights that we have come to this year in our preparation is that all of creation is a gift from God to us, but that creation is not finished yet. It is a part of God's plan that human beings have a special role in the on-going work of creation, in the



transformation of creation. By the work of our hands, we take the gift of wheat and make bread; we take grapes and make wine. Our work brings the creation of the earth to a new place. The bread and wine represent all the gifts that we've received from God that we transform "by the work of our hands"-our cooking, our cleaning, our drawing, our playing sports, our befriending, our reading, our studying, our loving. We present our whole lives to God at the altar and ask God to transform them, to fill them-that God's presence may shine through them.

As part of our celebration of First Communion, the children who are celebrating have each brought a symbol of "the work of their hands;" these will be placed near the altar as a visible image of what the offering of bread and wine represent to them: the offering of their daily lives on behalf of God's gifts.

A pin that I made: "It reminds me that God loves all and doesn't discriminate. All are welcome." ~Charlotte S.

A toy elephant: "I picked an elephant because I like learning about animals and taking care of them." ~Elliot

A friendship bracelet: " My gift is I am a generous and kind friend. I'm good at including others." ~Francis

A piece of art: "I chose this because I enjoy creating and gifting art to those I love." ~Charlotte W.

A picture he created: "I drew a picture of my dog, Sadie, and decorated her nose with a gem, to represent my love for animals." ~Will

A basketball: "I brought this because I love sports, being outside, and being active in nature." ~Teddy

A picture she drew with the quote: so often the hands of the almighty are found at the ends of our own arms: "I am offering the work of my hands to God, to work for peace and love." ~Lucy

COLLEGE CHURCH - SISTER PARISH SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM DEADLINE: APRIL 29, 2024

For the last three years, we have extended the opportunity for College Church parishioners to sponsor students at our sister parish St. Peter Claver in Belize. Thanks to your generous response, our parish community currently sponsors the high school education of **50** students in Belize. We hope to sponsor **fifteen additional students this year**.

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION & GUIDELINES

The Scholarship Program is coordinated through our Sister Parish St. Peter Claver in Belize and through the supervision of Ms. Olive Woodye. It is well organized and has specific requirements and guidelines for scholarship application and for retention. It is designed for boys and girls in all four high school years, Forms I-4. The parents are interviewed and have an application process and a contract that they must sign for their child to participate. They also require 20 hours of service from each student each year. Their report cards are reviewed regularly and Ms. Olive monitors and advises them on grades and other needs they may have.

To sponsor a student for all 4 years of high school costs \$900 USD (or \$225 per year), which can be paid as one lump sum or annually. The cost covers school fees, books, uniforms, supplies, and lunches. This would be used for the same child all four years as long as they meet all the program requirements annually. If a student does not complete all four years, the sponsor would be informed and a new student in need would be selected and benefit from their sponsorship.

There are 30 schools in the Toledo district where St. Peter Claver is located, the poorest district in Belize. There are many students awaiting sponsorship for high school! Scholarship interviews and selection takes place over the summer, and school begins in August.

Process

(3) Do you foresee any obstacles that would prevent you from regularly attending Council meetings and, from time to time, assisting with special projects or events? Are there scheduling or other accommodations that would make participation easier for you? Katie Jansen or another council member will meet with each applicant to discern with the nominee whether or not they would be a good fit for the council.
