**Reflection from Parishioner Emory Webre**

Why were these disciples in today's gospel going to Emmaus? What were they so focused on that they didn't recognize Jesus until he broke bread with them? We come here Sunday after Sunday, or most Sundays, or maybe only once-in-a-while. Where are we going? What are we focused on? Who do we not recognize when the Bread is broken?

We're the older parishioners who've been coming here for more years than we can count, with our aches and pains and pills, our doctors' appointments, thankful that God has brought us to another celebration in our true home. We're the widows, widowers and those who have lost a child, standing with aching hearts and empty hands, missing our loved ones.

We're parents with infants who are here even when it would be easy to find an excuse for staying home, but we come, thanking God for the gift of our babies. We're the parents with young children who struggle to make ends meet and to be with them in all they do, but we manage with God's grace. We're the parents with teenagers who drag them to church every week or we're the teenagers who are here because our parents won the argument, this time.

We're the college students, far from home, missing family, sometimes lonely, struggling with our studies, but we come because this Sunday Mass helps us to stay focused on our goal. We're the LGBTQ persons who face rejection or hostility but find a welcoming family at St. Francis Xavier.

We're the Black or Brown parishioners experiencing prejudice and discrimination not only in our jobs but even in the Catholic Church, while finding here those who listen and share our hurts. We're the immigrants who have fled our countries, longing for our families and homes, while finding others here to stand by and support us.

Can we recognize Him now? Jesus is present in the Bread broken which we receive in Communion. Open our eyes and recognize He is present in one another, in the ones standing in the pews with us. Just as we recognize Jesus' Presence in the Bread of the Eucharist, recognize those who are traveling this road with us.

### **First Communion Offerings - What is it that we bring to the Altar?**

What is it that we bring to the altar? In preparation for First Communion this year, we have spent time with the children reflecting on this question. The “simple” answer is bread and wine. And yet, when we begin to ponder the bread and wine, the richness of these gifts unfolds.

One of the insights that we have come to this year in our preparation is that all of creation is a gift from God to us, but that creation is not finished yet. It is a part of God’s plan that human beings have a special role in the on-going work of creation, in the transformation of creation. By the work of our hands, we take the gift of wheat and make bread; we take grapes and make wine. Our work brings the creation of the earth to a new place. The bread and wine represent all the gifts that we’ve received from God that we transform “by the work of our hands”-our cooking, our cleaning, our drawing, our skating, our playing sports, our befriending, our reading, our studying, our loving. We present our whole lives to God at the altar and ask God to transform them, to fill them-that God’s presence may shine through them.

As part of our celebration of First Communion, the children who are celebrating have each brought a symbol of “the work of their hands;” these will be placed near the altar as a visible image of what the offering of bread and wine represent to them: the offering of their daily lives on behalf of God’s gifts.

## Antiracism at College Church

*At College Church, antiracism is an expression of our recognition that all are created in the image of God. As such, we respond—personally and collectively—to the call to identify, and to actively challenge, structures and systems that devalue people on the basis of race, and to practice restoration in the pursuit of justice.*

### April is Arab-American Heritage Month

*We seldom reflect upon the fact that Jesus, Mary, and Joseph, and all twelve Apostles were olive-skinned Middle Eastern Jews. Our Christian faith began in the Middle East. It has its deepest roots in cities like Jerusalem, Galilee, Nazareth, and Bethlehem. The Gospel spread throughout the world from those places. This month we will explore the impact world events and individuals of Arab descent have had on our American society and our church.*

### Welcoming Afghan Refugees to St. Louis

When the U.S. withdrew from the Afghanistan war, thousands of Afghan citizens who collaborated with American Forces as translators and strategists were promised, along with their families, refuge from the Taliban as recompense for aiding our military. Without that promise most would have been executed for aiding the Americans. The mayor of St. Louis offered to welcome 1,000 of those refugees to our city, so the International Institute of St. Louis called for donations and volunteers to help resettle these displaced allies. I wanted to be part of that effort, so I volunteered.

The International Institute is in the former St. Elizabeth's Academy, operated for 130 years by the Precious Blood Sisters. The Sisters were pleased to sell the facility to an organization that would help needy ones, like immigrants and refugees.



On my first day I was directed toward the gymnasium of the school where donations were warehoused. The sight was overwhelming – mountains of bedding, cookware, dishes, laundry supplies, diapers, microwaves, toys, school and office supplies, and much more. St. Louisans were so generous that the Institute had to rent outdoor storage containers to hold the overflow. The first month we sorted and organized everything. That was a major task as donations kept coming in while we worked. The federal government provided lists of what families would need. So, the second month was spent packing boxes with those items and readying them for delivery as families arrived.

Initially, new arrivals were kept at various military bases until family members or friends already in the U.S. could be located. Refugees were then resettled where they had

“human connections” for support. For those brought to St. Louis, the International Institute outfitted apartments/houses using the supplies we had packed. It felt great knowing we were helping people who had supported our G.I.s to live in safety here among us. As of December 2022, around 700 Afghans have been settled in the area. About 300 more awaiting U.S. State Department clearance are expected this year.

More housing of all sizes is needed, preferably in south St. Louis city. The Institute provides rent for up to three months. The Institute also needs donations of laundry detergent, large cookware (like Dutch ovens), and Aldi/Schnucks gift cards. These can be delivered to the International Institute at 3401 Arsenal Street. Volunteers are currently needed to 1) prepare refugees for job interviews; 2) help them navigate public transit; and 3) babysit while parents take Cultural Orientation classes. ### Arab Americans Who Have Made History

Football Star Doug Flutie is the grandson of Lebanese immigrants. As quarterback for Boston College in 1984 he threw a 48-yard touchdown pass that won him the Heisman Trophy. He played a total of 21 seasons split between the Canadian Football League and the NFL including the Chicago Bears, Buffalo Bills, San Diego Chargers, and New England Patriots. Late in his career a cereal was produced called “Flutie Flakes” with all profits funding the Doug Flutie Jr. Foundation for Autism in honor of his autistic son.

Singer Paula Abdul is the daughter of a Syrian immigrant father. She started as a cheerleader for the L.A. Lakers and soon became their choreographer. Eventually the Jackson 5 asked her to do their choreography. During her singing career she recorded two #1 albums; six #1 singles and received a Grammy Award. She is also a former host of the TV programs “American Idol” and “So You Think You Can Dance.”

### Book Groups Forming!!

A few years ago, when we at College Church decided to include becoming an antiracist parish as part of our parish vision, members of the Antiracism Team sought to fully explore the significance of that choice. Toward that end, the team turned to a resource—a book

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entitled *Becoming an Antiracist Church: Journeying Toward Wholeness*—to aid its members' understanding via a process of group study and discussion. Joseph Barndt, a Lutheran minister and founder of Crossroads Antiracism Organizing and Training with whom we are partnering for our parish racial equity review, is the book's author and, in it, he lays a foundation for personal and institutional change. Barndt explores the history of racism in the Christian church, describes how racial injustice became institutionalized in the church in America, and sets out methods for appraising and addressing systemic racism within congregations.

To extend the spirit of antiracism throughout the parish, we are inviting all who are interested to participate in group study and facilitated discussion of the Barndt book. Groups will be organized according to preferred days, times, frequency, and format (virtual vs. in person).
