On Mother's Day I sat in church feeling grateful for my mother and for the gift of being a mother myself. And as I listened to the Gospel reading, it occurred to me that Jesus sounds a lot like a Mom. And God the Father sounds a lot like a Mother. There was one line that most struck me especially when I imagined feminine language "On that day you will realize that I am in my Mother and you are in me and I in you." As a mother, I know what it feels like to have someone in me - a tiny human that is her own being and yet there is no separation between us. Literally, she is in me and I am in her. When she is born, the relationship between us shifts dramatically and continues to evolve for the rest of our lives. But she will always be in me and I in her.

Before I had children I was a very deep sleeper. I fell asleep quickly and I could sleep through almost anything. After I gave birth, all my daughter had to do was take a deep breath to wake me up. Her cry sent a surge of hormones through my body. Even after she was born, she was very much in me. As she gets older, we see less of each other. But I see how I am in her in many ways: the choices she makes, the words she uses, her facial expressions.

As I get older, I see how much I am in my mother. My mom thinks about me and my brothers A LOT. We are in her heart, on her mind, in her prayers. We are responsible for most of the miles she puts on her car and all of her gray hair. Our sorrows are her sorrows. Our joy is her joy.

And I see daily that my mother is in me. I have been out of my parents' house for over 25 years and there is still evidence of my mom throughout my life. Everything from the way I fold a fitted sheet, to how I organize a kitchen, to my choice of career and my vocation continues to be shaped by her. She is in me.

So, this week I am resting in the loving image of God the Mother.

A message from Rev. Daniel Vogt, who is presided at our Masses last weekend:

In the appeal that I am making today, I need to raise funds to continue the important ministry that has been my life for the past 35 years. Since arriving in Guatemala as a missionary I have witnessed the effects of extreme poverty on families, especially indigenous children: poor health, stunted growth, slow learning, emotional problems, among them. It has been my goal to help as many families as possible to improve their living conditions, and through Qeqchi Partners we have been able to provide Healthy Homes to hundreds of rural villagers.

A Healthy Home consists of providing 1. Clean drinking water using durable and low cost filters we make, 2. Concrete floors replacing dirt and 3. Flush latrines replacing traditional outhouses or open air human waste disposal. The effects of these improvements are sharp reductions in intestinal and respiratory illness, reduction of malnutrition and child hunger, and reduction of parasitic infections and mosquito or fly borne illness like malaria and dengue. Also, a Healthy Home offers a safer and cleaner environment for child mental and emotional development as well as a reduction in adult depression and illness.

We need YOU to help us. A donation of \$50 allows us to make and install a clean water filter in a rural home, thereby providing clean drinking water. A donation of \$300 allows us to provide a concrete floor for a family home. For a \$400 donation we can provide a flush latrine for a family. Creative Summer Art Camp—Punta Gorda, Belize

Camp Creative was founded by St. Louisan, Julie Kuhnert, while she and her family were missionaries at St. Peter Claver parish in Belize. Now, in its 11th year, the summer camp serves 200+ children, and has expanded to include a 2nd camp in the Mayan village of Big Falls. Camp Creative is looking for volunteers to spend time in Punta Gorda, Belize, working with the local community, to assist at a week-long summer day camp.

What if I don't really work with children?

That's ok too! With a teamlike approach, volunteers work directly with Belizean teachers OR children. Camp Creative has a local coordinator & Belizean teachers that return year after year to volunteer. The community sees this camp as a local effort and American volunteers are able to work up front, or behind the scenes, as they'd like. This culturally sustainable approach also helps to create a more immersive experience for all of our volunteers. We become one awesome team - not two teams coming together.

A willingness to be flexible is a must! Camp is a half day and there are many opportunities for small town, jungle, archeological, cultural, and ocean exploring. We come prepared with all art supplies for the children attending camp, as well as backpacks, school supplies, and classroom items for the teachers. Camp Creative provides a unique opportunity for school age children to experience hands-on art projects, while also supplying classrooms with future resources.

There are two date options, with flexibility in the travel dates. Camp 1 (in Punta Gorda): the week of 7/3-7/7 **OR** Camp 2 (Mayan village 30 min. outside town): the week of 7/10-7/14.

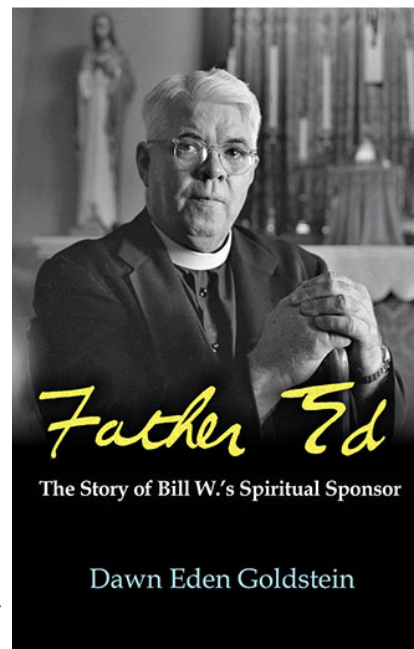
The Next Chapter

New Book Group on the St. Louis-based Spiritual Sponsor of A.A., "Father Ed," Starting today, May 21

Interested in learning more about the connections between the spirituality of Alcoholics Anonymous (A.A.) and Saint Ignatius? Join us this Sunday, **May 21st at 9.15am** in the Adult Faith Room as we discuss the biography of Fr. Edward Dowling, a St. Louis-based Jesuit priest who was the spiritual sponsor to the founder of A.A., Bill Wilson.

A.A. has not only helped millions of alcoholics transform their lives, but has also developed a distinctive form of pragmatic spirituality for people who are imperfect, don't have their lives together, and don't "fit in" well within organized religion (i.e., most people). Father Ed, who celebrated Mass at College Church numerous times, and whose funeral Mass was held at College Church in front of a packed house on April 2nd, 1960, not only helped develop the spiritual foundations of A.A., but was also an early champion of civil rights and social justice in the Archdiocese of St. Louis.

Antiracism at College Church

At College Church, antiracism is an expression of our recognition that all are created in the image of God. As such, we respond—personally and collectively—to the call to identify, and to actively challenge, structures and systems that devalue people on the basis of race, and to practice restoration in the pursuit of justice.

Parish Racial Equity Review: A Recap and Update

For the past year and a half, we at College Church have been involved in a parish racial equity review, a process by which every aspect of our parish life is scrutinized to understand how systemic racism is being preserved. We've undertaken this review in partnership with the Crossroads Antiracism and Training organization, with whom we've been in relationship since 2018. The review is one way in which we may begin to realize our parish vision of becoming an antiracist parish and, more importantly, it allows us to more fully live our faith. Following is a timeline of developments since the review process began:

Oct. 2021 College Church finalizes an agreement with Crossroads to engage in a parish racial equity review.

Nov. 2021 Crossroads offers an orientation to the review process. Steps in the process will include an historical analysis of our parish for use as a guide to the equity review; participation in an in-depth workshop on the topic of systemic racism; a period of data collection regarding our parish culture, offerings, policies, and practices; and preparation of a report to share findings and to propose recommendations for change.

Nov. 2021 Review Team History Committee begins parish racial history exploration.

Jan. 2022 Review Team participates in Crossroads' *Introduction to Systemic Racism* workshop.

Feb. 2022 Awaiting conversion of Crossroads offerings from in person to virtual due to Covid, the Review Team participates in a two-part workshop, *Christian White Dominant Culture*.

April 2022 Antiracism team co-chairs participate in a pilot of *Toward Liberation*, an intensive, five-part training series with Crossroads. The pilot offered a reframing of U.S. history to enable a better understanding of the roots, and consequent pervasiveness, of systemic racism. It provided tools for the analysis of power, which is critical in preparing to undertake the data collection phase of our parish equity review. Finally, there was exploration of our many individual identities (e.g., race, ethnicity, class, etc.) and the ways in which they intersect to either afford or impede access to power and resources.

June/July 2022 Entire Review Team takes part in the *Toward Liberation* workshop.

Nov. 2022 Review Team's History Committee demonstrates its effort to ensure that the review process is thoroughly grounded in the knowledge of the parish's founding. That grounding required the gathering of historical detail relative to College Church, the Archdiocese of St. Louis, the Society of Jesus, St. Louis University, and the City of St. Louis. Historical highlights were identified to create a brochure, timeline banners, and an introductory parish racial history video. The committee members and invited guest speakers offered a series of three presentations - which concluded in November - chronicling important milestones and elevating significant historical figures. Those presentations were recorded to be made available for broad circulation.

March 2023 Webinar with Dr. Maureen O'Connell, *Undoing Our Knots: Personalizing and Praying with Our Parish Racial History*. Well-attended presentation tracing the history of the speaker's Irish Catholic family and its entanglements with racial injustice allowed the drawing of parallels with our own parish racial history. Currently (and since October 2022), the team is gaining practice with the analytical tools that will facilitate the upcoming collection of parish life data. Also anticipated is the creation, in the near future, of review engagement groups throughout the parish to acquire the information needed to formulate recommendations for change.

May is Asian/Pacific American Heritage Month

In 1979, Congress established Asian/Pacific American Heritage Week. On May 14, 1991, George H. W. Bush expanded that recognition by signing into law the first Asian/Pacific American Heritage Month. Continuing the celebration of Asian/Pacific Americans' contributions to society, this legislation also recognized significant dates within the month. May 7, 1843, marks the arrival of the first Japanese immigrants to the United States. On May 10, 1869, the transcontinental railway was completed—a feat largely accomplished through the work of Chinese immigrants.

As we honor the many contributions made by people of Asian/Pacific Island descent, it is important to note that

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this term, created in 1990 as part of the US census, represents numerous countries of origin, languages, and distinct cultures. This month we will highlight some of the individuals from these communities and the related events that enrich our nation and our Church.

Asian Americans / Pacific Islanders in History

Indian American Astronaut Kalpana Chawla: Fascinated with flying since childhood, Kalpana Chawla's professors at Punjab Engineering College believed she had no future in the field of aeronautics. Yet she came to the U.S. for graduate studies and then applied for a position at NASA. Her dream was to fly in space, but she had to become a U.S. citizen first. Eventually, she was chosen from thousands of applicants to join NASA's Astronaut Corp. During her first trip on the space shuttle, Columbia, she served as Mission-specialist and operator of the robotic arm. Tragically, her second trip on the Columbia in 2003, ended when the shuttle broke apart while re-entering the atmosphere. The crew was posthumously awarded Congressional Space Medals of Honor. As the first woman from India in space, Chawla is a national hero there.

Chinese American Concert Cellist, Yo-Yo Ma: Yo-yo Ma was born in France to parents who immigrated from China. He began playing the cello as a toddler and performed for U.S. presidents when he was only seven! He came to the U.S. as a teen for school and to advance his career. He is very versatile, performing American bluegrass and traditional Chinese music, well as classical orchestral pieces. He has won 18 Grammys. He loves to give impromptu concerts at places like the U.S.-Mexico border to promote unity; for essential workers during the pandemic; and to health care workers while getting his own vaccination. Ma has received the Presidential Medal of Honor, and the National Medal of Arts from the U.S. Congress.

Upcoming Events

The Museum of Contemporary Religious Art is exhibiting the work of artists Vicente Telles and Brandon Maldonado whose work is extending the Spanish tradition of creating santeros - or images of saints. The collection displayed explores this religious and artistic expression within our contemporary social experiences. The exhibit may be viewed through June 25th. 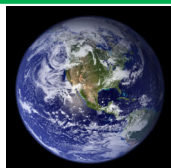


OPENINGS ON THE SFX PASTORAL COUNCIL
