**Reflection from Our Parish Life Coordinator**

**Invitation: a crowd-sourced reflection for Pentecost**

I invite you to please join me in an experiment. I was listening to NPR (National Public Radio) and heard a crowdsourced poem put together by Kwame Alexander about sleep that was just beautiful: <https://bit.ly/nprpoem>. And it gave me an idea. What if we as a faith-community were to crowd-source a reflection for Pentecost? I'll offer a few questions for your reflection. From those who'd like to share their reflections with me, I hope to use portions to create one collective reflection for the parish.

**Our premise in faith:**

The Holy Spirit works within and among all of us. And we are a beautiful and vibrant community to the extent that we recognize the Holy Spirit among us. As we will hear on Pentecost, "they were all filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in different tongues, as the Spirit enabled them to proclaim."

**To stimulate reflection:**

Here is an excerpt from a reflection by Ronald Rolheiser in *Give Us This Day*:

*The Christian paschal cycle has five distinct moments: Good Friday, Easter Sunday, the Forty Days, the Ascension, and Pentecost... Taken together, they constitute a paradigm for how we are invited to handle the many deaths, disappointments, and broken dreams in our own lives.*

*Scripture tells us that, in his death, Jesus left us an example we should follow. How do we do that? In non-religious language, we might put it this way. The five interpenetrating moments in Jesus' life that stretch from Good Friday to Pentecost invite us to always do this: Name your deaths. Claim your births. Mourn what you lost. Don't cling to what you had, but let it ascend. Receive a new spirit for the life you are already living.*

*Sound abstract? It's not. We are always dying in some ways, though we are never dead. We are always alive with new life. But we need to grieve what's died, adjust to the new, and let the old ascend. If we do this, Pentecost will happen in our lives. We will receive a new spirit for the life that we are, in fact, living.*

*And this Holy Spirit will exorcise the dissatisfaction and restlessness that perennially gnaw at our souls by bringing our lives - and the spirit by which we are living them - in sync.*

**How to participate:**

For our crowdsourced reflection, please consider the following questions. You may answer just one or two -- however you feel moved.

**What are you grieving? What are you giving birth to? What do you need to allow to ascend? What new spirit might you receive?**

Feel free to be creative in how you answer the questions: write a poem, craft a prayer, or describe an image or a memory or a longing or a hope.

Please email your piece to me at [katie@sfxstl.org](mailto:katie@sfxstl.org) by Sunday, May 21. If emailing is not workable for you, feel free to drop off your piece at the office.

As we embark on this experiment, I wonder what will come of our many voices and perspectives and experiences and encounters -- gathered into one piece in the spirit of Pentecost?

### Creative Summer Art Camp—Punta Gorda, Belize

**Am I open to working with diverse cultures?**

Camp Creative was founded by St. Louisan, Julie Kuhnert, while she and her family were missionaries at St. Peter Claver parish in Belize. Now, in its 11th year, the summer camp serves 200+ children, and has expanded to include a 2nd camp in the Mayan village of Big Falls. Camp Creative is looking for volunteers to spend time in Punta Gorda, Belize, working with the local community, to assist at a week-long summer day camp.

**What if I don't really work with children?**

That's ok too! With a teamlike approach, volunteers work directly with Belizean teachers OR children. Camp Creative has a local coordinator & Belizean teachers that return year after year to volunteer. The community sees this camp as a local effort and American volunteers are able to work up front, or behind the scenes, as they'd like. This culturally sustainable approach also helps to create a more immersive experience for all of our volunteers. We become one awesome team - not two teams coming together.

A willingness to be flexible is a must! Camp is a half day and there are many opportunities for small town, jungle, archeological, cultural, and ocean exploring. We come prepared with all art supplies for the children attending camp, as well as backpacks, school supplies, and classroom items for the teachers. Camp Creative provides a unique opportunity for school age children to experience hands-on art projects, while also supplying classrooms with future resources.

There are two date options, with flexibility in the travel dates. Camp 1 (in Punta Gorda): the week of 7/3-7/7 **OR** Camp 2 (Mayan village 30 min. outside town): the week of 7/10-7/14.

## Antiracism at College Church

*At College Church, antiracism is an expression of our recognition that all are created in the image of God. As such, we respond—personally and collectively—to the call to identify, and to actively challenge, structures and systems that devalue people on the basis of race, and to practice restoration in the pursuit of justice.*

### May is Asian/Pacific American Heritage Month

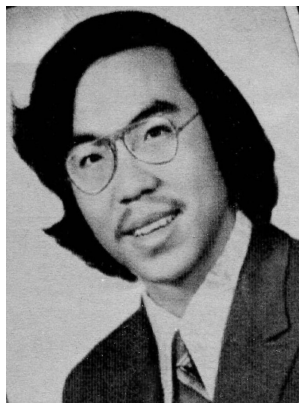
In 1979, Congress established Asian/Pacific American Heritage Week. On May 14, 1991, George H. W. Bush expanded that recognition by signing into law the first Asian/Pacific American Heritage Month. Continuing the celebration of Asian/Pacific Americans' contributions to society, this legislation also recognized significant dates within the month. May 7, 1843, marks the arrival of the first Japanese immigrants to the United States. On May 10, 1869, the transcontinental railway was completed—a feat largely accomplished through the work of Chinese immigrants.

As we honor the many contributions made by people of Asian/Pacific Island descent, it is important to note that this term, created in 1990 as part of the US census, represents numerous countries of origin, languages, and distinct cultures. This month we will highlight some of the individuals from these communities and the related events that enrich our nation and our Church.

### Vincent Chin: Galvanizing Asian American Activism

Vincent Chin was born in China. As a toddler he was adopted by a Chinese-American couple and raised in Detroit, Michigan. After completing his education, he became a computer graphics designer. In 1982, at age 27, he was engaged to be married.

At that time in American history, the auto industry in Detroit was struggling. The industry blamed its problems on the rise in popularity of Japanese autos here in the U.S.



One evening prior to Chin's upcoming wedding, a group of friends took him to a club for a sort of bachelor's party. On the same night, a 43-year-old foreman at Chrysler and his 22-year-old stepson who'd lost his job at Chrysler, were also at the club. All of the men were drinking and a dispute arose between the two groups. Apparently, the auto workers presumed Chin was

Japanese. Someone heard the 43-year-old shout at Chin, "It's because of you [expletives] that we're out of work."

A scuffle ensued and soon moved outside. The foreman grabbed a baseball bat out of his car and chased Chin as he

ran away. For a while the two auto workers drove around looking for Chin. When they eventually found him, the stepson held Chin down while the older man beat him with the baseball bat. Chin died in the hospital four days later from his injuries.

The murder wasn't covered by national news outlets right away. It only became a "newsworthy story" after the trial several months later. A Wayne County Circuit Court judge ruled that Chin's death resulted from nothing more than a barroom brawl. He declared the two murderers guilty of manslaughter. They each received a \$3,000 fine, \$780 in court costs and three years' probation. Neither one received any time in prison.

Such a light sentence sparked national outrage, leading to a federal trial—the first federal civil rights trial for an Asian American. People of Asian descent became very frightened, knowing that if it could happen to Vincent Chin, anyone of them could be targeted in a similar way. The results of the litigation, wherein both defendants were eventually acquitted, ignited a national movement for Asian American rights, saw the formation of a pan-Asian identity, and illustrated that Asian Americans are entitled to the protections afforded by civil rights and hate crime legislation.

### Asian Americans / Pacific Islanders in History Chinese American Chef, Joyce Chen (1912-1994)

In 1949, Chen immigrated to the U.S. with her family. She opened her first restaurant in 1958, and published her first cookbook in 1962. It sold more than 70,000 copies and has been reprinted for decades. She introduced new meals to America, such as Moo Shu Pork and Hot & Sour Soup. Chen is credited for popularizing the Chinese buffet concept. In 2014, the U.S. Postal Service featured Chen on one of its Celebrity Chef Forever stamps.

### Korean American Olympic Diver, Dr. Sammy Lee (1920-2016)

In college, Lee won the springboard and 10-meter diving events at the Amateur Athletic Union championships. He joined the Army Reserves and began studying medicine at the University of Southern California. In the 1948 London Olympics, Lee became the first Asian American to win a gold medal for the U.S. In the 1952

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Helsinki Olympics he became the first male diver to win the gold twice. In 1953, Lee was the first person of color to win the Amateur Athletic Union's award. After these wins, he was asked to serve as a goodwill ambassador for the U.S. State Department.

### **Book Groups Forming!!**

A few years ago, when we at College Church decided to include becoming an antiracist parish as part of our parish vision, members of the Antiracism Team sought to fully explore the significance of that choice. Toward that end, the team turned to a resource—a book entitled *Becoming an Antiracist Church: Journeying Toward Wholeness*—to aid its members' understanding via a process of group study and discussion. Joseph Barndt, a Lutheran minister and founder of Crossroads Antiracism Organizing and Training with whom we are partnering for our parish racial equity review, is the book's author and, in it, he lays a foundation for personal and institutional change. Barndt explores the history of racism in the Christian church, describes how racial injustice became institutionalized in the church in America, and sets out methods for appraising and addressing systemic racism within congregations.

To extend the spirit of antiracism throughout the parish, we are inviting all who are interested to participate in group study and facilitated discussion of the Barndt book. Groups will be organized according to preferred days, times, frequency, and format (virtual vs. in person).
