*Reluctantly, I learn that I can't have one without the other.*

*Ever so slowly, I'm viewing death and loss not as unwelcome guests, but as companions who generously invite and leave room for birth and newness to travel with them.*

*Spirit-led with God's gentle guidance, death and loss becomes the dance with birth and newness as its partner.*

*Their movements together are so inviting and beautiful.*

*My desire to join them is strong and soon I am dancing with them in a single fluid motion. I realize that I'll need to*

*practice some steps, but I know in my heart that I will never forget this dance.*

Learning to pay attention to the pattern of the paschal mystery has been a great gift. It is not a gift that has come easily. It has been received in increments with each life-challenge coming my way and the dying of my expectations of the outcome. Each one has added to my trust that God is with me.

At this point in life the deaths are those of a body waning in stamina and abilities; the expectations of perfect family interaction; accomplishments that will never happen; causes that will be fought without me; services I can no longer render.

We are choosing to leave this home and this community... this is the death of an era and the birth of a new one. It is here that we have celebrated the Paschal Mystery both literally and figuratively for so much of our family's life. The Good Fridays came when beloved parishioners died or we walked with those facing serious illness or loss, especially through the Pastoral Care Ministry. The Easters were especially joyous: family baptisms, First Communions, Confirmations, marriages, children's tableaux, ribbon waving, young ones chasing floating balloons, as well as delightful times with friends, new and old.

I was struck by how much of our life has already ascended to greater heights, newer challenges and unexpected places well beyond what we could have imagined. Yet, clearly, there is more ascension ahead.

*As the strains of "Soon and Very Soon" rang out,  
your eyes lit up and you unselfconsciously danced in your pew,  
at first holding your mamma's finger, and then utterly free.*

*O, wee one, you offered me a whole liturgy in itself,  
including a stirring homily far beyond words.*

*I catch myself mourning the loss of my delight and fervor at  
Mass.*

*Envyng you does not seem fitting—does not seem adequate.  
May the Holy Spirit unshackle me so that you may be my  
teacher.*

I think of [my advocates] every day. What a defining moment occurred in my life by their extra-ordinary gesture. I celebrate them every day. I try to emulate what they did for me, to anyone who seeks some of my time, like they did and do what I can to be of enabling assistance.

*A new door opened, lemonade, the silver lining  
This is what we are told to seek in the face of rejection  
But maybe the beauty is still inside the room,  
or in the tartness of the lemon,  
or in the rain that falls*

Each day I am called to be less separate and see myself joined to all of creation. With intention I lift up my ego,

my judgments, my frustrations to be transformed in resurrection. My new Spirit yearns to see the face of God in all and to meet all with mercy and kindness.

*When a man asked his son to help with the harvest, the son declined because he had "other plans." But the next day, the father found his son working at the harvest. "I had second thoughts," the son explained. When Walter Burghardt, S.J., told this story at College Church several years ago, he added the comment "God is in our second thoughts." To this day, I try to listen to my second thoughts when making a decision.  
The Spirit is active there!*

[I'm giving birth to] more vulnerability, more trust in the Holy Spirit to translate my imperfect work into a gift of inspiration, hope, or solace and calm. Giving birth to an attitude of freedom from concern about the outcomes; and growing within an attitude of gratitude and openness to God's shepherding. Shepherding found in the gentle leadership and loving community at St. Francis Xavier.

*My hope and prayer:*

*In this time of Pentecost, may the Spirit bring us the fire of His  
love and His guidance*

*in the transition and reality of all that is new.*

*May we be inspired to truly listen to those grieving, not where  
WE are, but where They are...in every way.*

*And in our listening*

*Let us be grateful.*

*Let us be caring.*

*Let us be Jesus.*

Solemnity of Pentecost 2023

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

This weekend the Church throughout the world celebrates the Solemnity of Pentecost, and so commemorates the outpouring of the Holy Spirit on the Apostles, the foundation of the Church, and the beginning of her mission to all nations and peoples.

The mystery of Pentecost exhorts us to prayer and commitment to mission. The Holy Spirit inspires faith, hope, and charity in the hearts of the faithful, and ennobles the numerous and varied ways of transmitting the Christian message according to the culture and customs of all times and places. While giving us access to communion with God in prayer, the Holy Spirit also prompts us towards service of our neighbor by encountering him, by reconciliation, by witness, by a desire for justice and peace, by renewal of outlook, by social progress, and missionary commitment.

Almost two years ago, we as an Archdiocese embarked upon a strategic pastoral planning process, *All Things New*. We prayed to the Holy Spirit for guidance, and we committed ourselves to you the faithful of this Archdiocese. An extensive process of listening was undertaken in all the parishes. Thereafter, I consulted the Archdiocesan Presbyteral Council regarding every parish under consideration. I then spent time in further prayer, study, and discernment, after which I reached the following decision regarding St. Francis Xavier parish.

Your parish will remain unchanged regarding its present structure, and the Reverend Timothy McMahon, S.J. who is currently assigned to provide pastoral care at your parish will continue to do so.

While there is no change to the structure of your parish, in this moment in the Archdiocese, we are all called to rededicate ourselves to the new modes of evangelization and social outreach. I ask that you join me in praying for those among the faithful of the Archdiocese who will be hearing challenging news this weekend regarding their parish.

Please join me in praying that the Holy Spirit will draw us all closer together as we commit ourselves to following the Lord Jesus and spreading His message by the witness of our lives. Sincerely yours in Christ,

## Antiracism at College Church

At College Church, antiracism is an expression of our recognition that all are created in the image of God. As such, we respond—personally and collectively—to the call to identify, and to actively challenge, structures and systems that devalue people on the basis of race, and to practice restoration in the pursuit of justice.

### Being Fully Inclusive

As our parish engages in the work of becoming an antiracist church, we are recognizing that not only do we need to communicate and confirm a sense of belonging to people of all races, we must be more inclusive of people who experience discrimination based on other aspects of identity. That includes people who identify as LGBTQ+. We can begin by remembering the words of Pope Francis who said, “If a person is [LGBTQ+] and seeks out the Lord, . . . who am I to judge that person?” He was paraphrasing the Catechism of the Catholic Church which states that LGBTQ+ people should be treated with “respect, compassion, and sensitivity” just like everyone else. [Catechism, paragraph 2358] We will also be more intentional about sharing the stories, perspectives, and issues of people who are LGBTQ+; exploring, in particular, the intersectionality with racism; and including the ways in which these stories impact the Catholic faith we share.

### Transgender and Human Rights Activist, Cecilia Chung

Born in Hong Kong, Cecilia Chung came to the U.S. as a teen when her family moved here in 1984. When she came out as a transgender woman in 1992, she suffered greatly as her family rejected her, and she lost her job. Homeless, she turned to sex work and drugs. She experienced both physical and sexual violence and contracted HIV. Once when she was so severely injured that she ended up in the hospital, her family came back to her side and that helped her to re-stabilize her life.

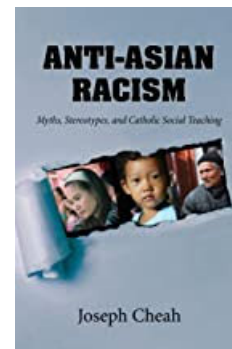


From then on Chung worked as an HIV counselor. She also became part of San Francisco’s Transgender Discrimination Task Force documenting the mistreatment of trans people all over the country. According to Chung, they weren’t fighting just for their rights, but for their very lives. They simply wanted their human dignity to be recognized in the world.

Cecilia Chung’s efforts have seen significant success. Among her accomplishments are the creation of one of the country’s most wide-ranging publicly funded programs aimed at reversing economic injustice toward transgender people. She continues to advocate for LGBTQ+ communities, for immigrants, and for people living with HIV/AIDS.

### Recommended Reading

Those of us who regularly follow the news are well aware of the rise, over the last several years, in anti-Asian sentiment and hate crimes. In his book, *Anti-Asian Racism: Myths, Stereotypes, and Catholic Social Teaching*, Father Joseph Cheah, a Servite priest, examines this phenomenon from a Catholic perspective. Said to be the most thorough analysis to date of anti-Asian racism, the book explodes three stereotypes—the perpetual foreigner, the “Yellow Peril,” and the model minority—offering insights from history, Asian American studies, and Catholic Social Teaching. Cheah believes that by centering the Asian American community, his book will further an understanding of how white supremacy has shaped history. And he is hopeful his work will provide guidance on how Catholic Social Teaching can inform the way in which Catholics engage in the work of anti-racism. An interview with Fr. ### Significant Figures in Racial History This Week

Born June 3, 1906 – Singer Josephine Baker in St. Louis, Missouri. Raised Catholic, she was the first Black woman to star in a major silent motion picture. During World War II she spied on the Nazis for the French Resistance. Because she supported civil rights in the U.S., she was prohibited from returning to her home country for several decades. She now has a star on University City’s Walk of Fame.

Born June 5, 1993 – Tyre Nichols in Sacramento, California. He was a father and amateur photographer. In January 2023 he was stopped by Memphis police officers who beat him brutally. He died three days later due to internal bleeding from the beatings. All officers involved were fired and charged with second degree murder, aggravated assault, aggravated kidnapping, official misconduct, and official oppression. Tyre would

have been 30 years old this week.

Died June 7, 1918 – Servant of God Julia Greeley in Denver, Colorado. Born into slavery in Hannibal, Missouri, Julia suffered injury to an eye when she was five years old from a slave master who was whipping her mother. After emancipation she moved to Denver, Colorado, converted to Catholicism, and joined a Franciscan lay group. It is said she pulled a wagon of food, coal, and clothing to needy families at night so as not to embarrass whites ashamed to receive charity from a black woman. She was known as Denver’s “Angel of Charity.” Her cause for canonization was begun in 2016.

June 17, 9:00 a.m.: The second annual MAAFA Procession and Prayer Service, hosted by the Archdiocese of St. Louis, will be held to commemorate the millions of lives lost during the Middle Passage of the Atlantic Slave Trade. The event will begin with a prayer service at the Old Cathedral followed by a remembering ceremony at the south pond on the Arch grounds and a one-mile procession to St. John the Evangelist Church where participants will share a meal.

### SFX Racial Justice Vigils

This year, the Racism and Reconciliation Committee will be organizing monthly racial justice vigils from 6-7pm on the front steps of College Church. The vigils will feature signs as testaments to our racial justice awareness, prayers, and silence. The next will be **Monday, June 19, 2023** - in coordination with the federal holiday of Juneteenth, established in 2021 to commemorate the emancipation of enslaved people in Texas.

After that, the vigil will be **Sunday, July 3, 2023** - to mark Independence Day on July 4th.
