Reflections from our Parish Life Coordinator

The Feast of St. Mary Magdalene is July 22, 2022. Her celebration was elevated to a feast day in 2016. Here is a quote from the Vatican document announcing the change: "This decision, in the current ecclesial context, seeks to reflect more deeply upon the dignity of women, on the new evangelisation and on the greatness of the mystery of God's Mercy."

Here are excerpts from a reflection that I like. It was offered by Rev. Rachel Hartland, a priest with the Church of England (ramtopsrac.wordpress.com/).

Mary of Magdala, Mary Magdalene, Apostle to the Apostles

The woman we remember has had so much imposed upon her ... that it is difficult to untangle the things that we really know of her, from the things that have been assumed, conflated with others; impressions and fables captured in art and in literature, both learned and less so.

We can be pretty sure that this Mary was an independent woman from the lakeside town of Magdala, on the Sea of Galilee. Why independent? Well because in scripture she takes her name from the place, rather than from her nearest male relative (Hebblethwaite, p116-7) as is otherwise the case in the Gospel's and context of the time. The myth of her sinful past may well rest on the absence of these reassuring family ties; and the layer of assumption that her closest relationship with a man appears to have been with Jesus (Hebblethwaite, p116-7), has no doubt contributed to more romantic notions than scripture actually provides evidence for.

Possibly the most consistent point of reflection through all the layers of Magdalene myths is the scriptural evidence that ... she sees... the risen Lord whom she finally encounters and recognizes by the use of her name: Mary. As the Apostle to the Apostles (Wright, p147), [she is] sent to share the good news of the reality of the resurrected Christ with those who had run too soon to witness it themselves...

Another quote from the Vatican document: "Saint John Paul II paid great attention not only to the importance of women in the mission of Christ and the Church, but also and with special emphasis on the particular role of Mary of Magdala as the first witness who saw the risen Christ, and as the first messenger who announced the Lord's resurrection to the Apostles (Mulieris dignitatem n. 16). The importance of this continues today in the Church, as is evident in the new evangelisation, which seeks to welcome all men and women "of every race, people, language and nation" (Rev 5: 9), without any distinction, to announce to them the Good News of the Gospel of Jesus Christ while accompanying them on their earthly pilgrimage, and offering them the wonders of God's salvation. Saint Mary Magdalene is an example of a true and authentic evangeliser, that is an evangelist who announces the central joyful message of Easter."

Bridges Spiritual Exercises of St. Ignatius in Everyday Life

As you go about your daily life, you are asked to pray daily and meet weekly with a trained spiritual director/companion who will listen with you with you and help guide you in the Exercises. Introducing Fr. Tim McMahon, SJ



As Fr. Dan mentioned above, Fr. Tim will be joining us starting on August 1st. Here is a bit about his background so you can start keeping him in your prayers:

Father Timothy McMahon, SJ currently serves as Associate Pastor at St. Matthew the Apostle Parish in St. Louis. Prior to arriving in St. Louis he served as Superior of the Jesuits in Houston and as Pastor of Sacred Heart Parish in El Paso, Texas from 2019-2020. Fr. McMahon was President of Arrupe Jesuit High School in Denver, Colorado from 2010-2018. He served as the Provincial of the Jesuits of the Missouri Province from 2003 – 2009 and as Provincial Assistant for Formation and Secondary Education from 2001 - 2003. Fr. McMahon spent seven years as pastor of St. Frances Xavier Church and elementary school in Kansas City, Missouri and adjunct professor of Biology at Rockhurst University (1994 -2002). He also served in the Province Offices as Vocation Director and Provincial Assistant for Planning (1991-1994). He did pastoral ministry in Santa Tecla, El Salvador (1987-1989) and taught Biology at St. John's College in Belize (1982-1984) .and at De Smet Jesuit High School in St. Louis, Missouri. (1989-1991)

Fr. McMahon is a native of St. Louis, Missouri, attended St. Louis University High School and Saint Louis University before entering the Jesuit Novitiate in Denver, Colorado in 1976. During his course of formation, he earned Bachelors degrees in Philosophy and Slavic Studies from Saint Louis University; a Masters of Divinity from the Weston School of Theology in Cambridge, Massachusetts; an MS in Biology from the University of Illinois at Chicago, and an MA in Theology from the University of Central America José Simeón Cañas in San Salvador, El Salvador.



Antiracism at College Church

At College Church, antiracism is an expression of our recognition that all are created in the image of God. As such, we respond—personally and collectively—to the call to identify, and to actively challenge, structures and systems that devalue people on the basis of race, and to practice restoration in the pursuit of justice.

The Religious of the Sacred Heart and the People They Enslaved

The Society of the Sacred Heart in St. Louis, Missouri, was founded by St. Rose Philippine Duchesne in Missouri and Louisiana. She and four other sisters came from France to St. Louis in 1818 to begin a school for girls at the request of Bishop Louis William Valentine DuBourg. During a brief stay in New Orleans with the Ursuline Sisters, they observed enslaved workers in that convent. This was their first chance to consider what owning slaves might mean for their own community in St. Louis and later in Louisiana.

Philippine wrote to her superior, St. Madeleine Sophie Barat in Lyon, France, in 1822, “In spite of my repugnance for having negro slaves, we may be obliged to purchase some.” It seems that Philippine was looking at the cost of an enslaved person and at maintaining the integrity of the convent. Although she had written that they did not want slaves and did not have money to buy them, they did not see how they could get along without help.

The Society of the Sacred Heart admitted candidates who brought enslaved persons as part of their required dowry. The sisters purchased enslaved persons and received them for students’ tuition. The House Journals of the Society refer to slaves receiving sacraments and attending Mass. They performed specific tasks such as the laundry, cooking, cleaning, and caring for the farms and livestock. One set of financial books for 1825–1866 has a category for “Domestiques,” in which the total payments for about 70 slaves in these records amounted to \$13,284.38, the equivalent of several million dollars today.

During the period of 1818 to 1865, the Society held at various times more than 150 enslaved persons, mostly at the convents and schools they conducted in Louisiana and a few in Missouri.

Unlike the Jesuits at Georgetown, the story of the enslaved people of the Religious of the Sacred Heart has not received much publicity or attracted national attention. The Society continues to examine its history about the possession of enslaved persons and their treatment through its mandate: “To focus on the on-going issue of racism in the world and the Society of the Sacred Heart’s participation in the historic sin of slavery...we commit ourselves to recover the story of

slavery in our early days in this country, to share this historical fact as widely as needed, to assist in the attempt to locate the descendants of enslaved persons who lived on property owned by the Society of the Sacred Heart, and to take appropriate steps to address this painful chapter in our history while also working to help transform on-going racist attitudes and behaviors.”

“We Speak Your Names,” a gathering planned by the descendants of those who were enslaved by the Society in Grand Coteau, Louisiana, took place in 2018. A monument naming the known enslaved persons of the convent in Grand Coteau was dedicated and blessed in the cemetery on the grounds of St. Charles Borromeo Church.

Summer Book and Movie Recommendations

The Spiritual Works Of Racial Justice: A Month Of Meditations With Ignatius Of Loyola by Patrick Saint-Jean, S.J.

Recommended by Mary Bequette

I have read several books on racial justice and this is one of the best. Each 10-12 page chapter offers insight and practical action one might consider in taking steps on the journey with God and with one another in imagining a new way of building the kingdom. He nudges the reader without guilt or rant to a deeper understanding of what is lost in a world of unjust policies. I cannot think of a single person who would not benefit from reading this book.

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Just Mercy: A Story of Justice and Redemption by Bryan Stevenson

Recommended by Tim Plunkett

Just Mercy is one of the most compelling books I've read dealing with the area of criminal justice. Upon graduating from law school, the author, Bryan Stevenson, moved to Alabama and opened a nonprofit law center dedicated to providing free, quality legal services to condemned men and women on death row. The book centers on the case of Walter McMillian, a Black entrepreneur, who is convicted of murder—a crime that he did not commit—and was sentenced to be executed. As Stevenson writes, "We have to reform a system of criminal justice that continues to treat people better if they are rich and guilty than if they are poor and innocent." Stevenson founded the Equal Justice Initiative in Montgomery, Alabama, where he serves as the executive director. He is also responsible for developing the National Memorial for Peace and Justice, which honors the nearly four thousand African Americans who were lynched in the South between 1877 and 1950. Stevenson is a law professor at New York University and has argued five times before the United States Supreme Court.

In 2019, the book was made into a movie starring Michael B. Jordan and Jamie Foxx.




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
