**Reflections from our Parish Life
Coordinator**

Many years ago I read the book *The Red Tent* by Anita Diamont. It is historical fiction that imagines the lives of women in Jacob's family from the Old Testament. In the story, the red tent was the place that women were sent when they were considered by Jewish law to be unclean, which was at least once a month. But within the tent existed an intimate sisterhood that provided a sense of value and safety and belonging. The red tent provided refuge from the expectations of subservience and submission that men placed on women.

For the last couple of months, anytime news about Roe v. Wade came up on the news I would turn it off. If I saw a post on social media, I quickly scrolled past it. I just didn't want to feel the feelings that would inevitably come. Then the decision was announced and my first instinct was to hide. I've never had an abortion. I will never be in the situation of considering an abortion for myself. And yet, I felt judged and dismissed.

Since the decision, I've listened to some of the coverage and have begun to unpack some of my feelings. The best way I can describe them is I feel like the red tent was invaded.

There are situations women face connected to our beautiful and amazing ability to bring life into the world that we learn not to talk about openly. Struggles that we carry and share with very few - often other women. We create our own red tents and we go there for solace and rest and to share what "shouldn't" be talked about.

Now I feel like our tents have been invaded by judges closely followed by legislators, with many religious leaders standing right outside. Some of us are tempted to fall silent and struggle alone.

As a Catholic, I often feel like I shouldn't talk about my complicated thoughts and feelings related to pregnancy and choice. In fact, at my Catholic high school I was explicitly told not to talk about it. I know I'm not the only one who has felt silenced. And I think a lot of us are needing to talk right now. As a synodal church, we need to listen. Somehow we need to imagine a world where we see the image of God in every woman. I have faith that there is a better way forward, but we will not find it if we don't listen.

As such, we respond—personally and collectively—to the call to identify, and to actively challenge, structures and systems that devalue people on the basis of race, and to practice restoration in the pursuit of justice.



A Fourth of July Message

As we consider the democratic ideals and aspirations celebrated this July 4th, let us reflect on the words of

Congressman John Lewis and resolve to live into this vision of equity, unity, and peace. In doing so, we step closer to realizing the Beloved Community.

Ordinary people with extraordinary vision can redeem the soul of America by getting in what I call good trouble, necessary trouble. Voting and participating in the democratic process are key. The vote is the most powerful nonviolent change agent you have in a democratic society. You must use it because it is not guaranteed. You can lose it.

You must also study and learn the lessons of history because humanity has been involved in this soul-wrenching, existential struggle for a very long time. People on every continent have stood in your shoes, through decades and centuries before you. The truth does not change, and that is why the answers worked out long ago can help you find solutions to the challenges of our time. Continue to build union between movements stretching across the globe because we must put away our willingness to profit from the exploitation of others.

Though I may not be here with you, I urge you to answer the highest calling of your heart and stand up for what you truly believe. In my life I have done all I can to demonstrate that the way of peace, the way of love and nonviolence is the more excellent way. Now it is your turn to let freedom ring.

When historians pick up their pens to write the story of the 21st century, let them say that it was your generation who laid down the heavy burdens of hate at last and that peace finally triumphed over violence, aggression, and war. So I say to you, walk with the wind, brothers and sisters, and let the spirit of peace and the power of everlasting love be your guide.

Dreaming Together: The Parish Justice Summit

“Here we have a splendid secret that shows us how to dream and to turn our life into a wonderful adventure. No one can face life in isolation... We need a community that supports and helps us, in which we can help one another to keep looking ahead. How important it is to dream together... By ourselves, we risk seeing mirages, things that are not there. Dreams, on the other hand, are built together.” Pope Francis, *Fratelli Tutti*

A few weeks ago, more than one hundred representatives from fifty parishes around the nation met virtually to share ideas about how best to advance the work of social justice. Organized by the Ignatian Solidarity Network (ISN), the Parish Justice Summit offered attendees the opportunity to form connections with other parish ministers engaged in the work, to share best practices and resources, to gain new strategies, and to prepare for continued growth with the aid of upcoming ISN-sponsored events.

The summit drew its theme and its energy from the call of Pope Francis for communal conversion and solidarity—to create our dreams together and to turn those dreams into action. The keynote speaker, Dr. Cecilia Gonzalez-Andrieu, picked up that thread and described how, in her work with students at Loyola Marymount University, she uses the story of the Road to Emmaus to illustrate the process of discernment, stirred by communal imagination, that leads to social transformation. Annie Fox, the provincial assistant for social ministry for Jesuits West, offered an array of ideas for inviting and sustaining parish engagement around justice-related efforts. Issue-specific breakout sessions provided forums for exchange about racial, immigration, and environmental justice, and Antiracism Team co-chairs Lisa Burks and Winnie Sullivan were able to put forward some of the racial justice activities at College Church, particularly the work that is ongoing relative to understanding and disseminating our parish history and to acquiring more culturally inclusive sacred imagery.

Finally, summit attendees were encouraged to seek opportunities for collaboration, both within our parishes and in our broader communities. Special emphasis was placed on the need to approach parish faith-justice work holistically, to bridge the silos of our issue-specific areas,

Summer Reading/Viewing Suggestions: *Boarding School Seasons* by Brenda J. Child

Last month, the U.S. Department of the Interior, under the direction of Secretary Deb Haaland—a member of the Pueblo of Laguna and the first Native American to serve as a cabinet secretary—released an investigative report, which is being described as a “comprehensive effort to address the troubled legacy of federal Indian boarding school policies.” In her slim, but well-documented volume, Brenda J. Child—a Red Lake Ojibwe—turns her own talents to that effort, examining the legacy in all its complexity. She describes the ill-conceived views that caused indigenous children to be separated from their families and subjected to efforts to strip them of their cultural heritage. By excerpting the correspondence of Native American parents—some of whom sought boarding school enrollment—Child allows us to experience the conflicting emotions of wanting the opportunities that education can provide and being appalled upon learning of the schools' harsh conditions and betrayal of promises. While *Boarding Schools Seasons* examines government-sponsored schools only, and not the religious-run schools that have also been a topic of recent news, the book is an eye-opening look at the flawed thinking that underlay all such institutions. — Winnie Sullivan
