FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK



The cover of our bulletin features the great seal of the United States. Did you know that it is found in our stained-glass windows in the north transept? The window depicts the various members of society going about the various labors of society. The bottom is a scene of all sorts of people coming to College Church.

I cannot speak with absolute certainty about the artist's intention. However, I think it is a reminder that we work and pray as Catholics, but also as Americans. This weekend seems an auspicious time to reflect upon that reality.

We are grappling with competing notions of who is an American, what is our story, and how we are going to tell that story. This has always been the case but, like everything else, this seems to be more divisive and controversial than ever. There are heated arguments over the national virtues we profess, and the sins that have marked us from the very beginning.

This where our Catholicism can be a tremendous benefit to our identity as citizens. We understand the complexity of the human condition. We are sinners but redeemed by Christ's love. Reconciliation only comes from naming faults and admitting our need for healing. Yet, this recognition does not cripple us but frees us. Honesty, humility, and the desire to change are values not just for church but the public square as well. As we pray at Mass today: "For what has been accomplished, we give You thanks; for the work that remains, we seek Your help."

Antiracism at College Church

Collaboration with Crossroads

As our parish continues the journey toward becoming an antiracist organization, we have encountered companions, traveling in the same direction, who help illuminate the path forward. Since the formation of the Antiracism Team at St. Francis Xavier College Church, our work has been guided by such companions through an organization called Crossroads Antiracism Training and Organizing. They have provided consultation that supported our focus group process, and their facilitators led Introduction to Systemic Racism workshops for members of the Antiracism Team. The team and many other parish leaders have studied the book *Becoming an Anti-Racist Church*, the author of which, Rev. Joseph Barndt, served as Director of Crossroads for many years. We anticipate continued collaboration and partnership as our work progresses and we learn more about the resources and expertise they have to offer.

Holding a rich history of work with spiritual congregations, Crossroads helps organizations to identify systemic racism and other forms of oppression within their structures, policies and procedures and supports them in the development of practices that lead to inclusive, multicultural, and antiracist communities. They provide the tools needed for organizations to self-evaluate, build relationships of accountability, and support the individual skills and organizational culture needed to confront racism and oppression in our church and the wider community.



Based in Chicago, Crossroads staff work with organizations in many parts of the country, including several here in St. Louis. There are designated consultants and facilitators who support this region, and we look forward to learning more from them in the coming months. They are experienced in engaging all members of a congregation working through a reflective and transformative process. The Fourth of July: A Different View

On July 5, 1852, Frederick Douglass, who was born into slavery in 1818 and rose to become a great abolitionist and orator, marked Independence Day with a brilliant and fiery speech. Titled "What to a Slave is Your Fourth of July?" the speech was delivered to the Ladies' Anti-Slavery Society of Rochester, New York. A portion of the speech is excerpted below. Fellow-citizens, pardon me, allow me to ask, why am I called upon to speak here to-day? What have I, or those I represent, to do with your national independence? Are the great principles of political freedom and of natural justice, embodied in that Declaration of Independence, extended to us? and am I, therefore, called upon to bring our humble offering to the national altar, and to confess the benefits and express devout gratitude for the blessings resulting from your independence to us?

Would to God, both for your sakes and ours, that an affirmative answer could be truthfully returned to these questions! Then would my task be light, and my burden easy and delightful. For who is there so cold, that a nation's sympathy could not warm him? Who so obdurate and dead to the claims of gratitude, that would not thankfully acknowledge such priceless benefits? Who so stolid and selfish, that would not give his voice to swell the hallelujahs of a nation's jubilee, when the chains of servitude had been torn from his limbs? I am not that man. In a case like that, the dumb might eloquently speak, and the "lame man leap as an hart."

But, such is not the state of the case. I say it with a sad sense of the disparity between us. I am not included within the pale of this glorious anniversary! Your high independence only reveals the immeasurable distance between us. The blessings in which you, this day, rejoice, are not enjoyed in common.

The Black Catholic Messenger by Winnie Sullivan

In December 2020, something old became new again. It was then that a group of mostly young black Catholics and allies created the Black Catholic Messenger, a new online publication that looked to the past for its inspiration. Nate Tinner-Williams—a cofounder of the publication and recent convert to Catholicism now in formation with the Josephites—acknowledges that the legendary Daniel Rudd was his role model.

Rudd was born into slavery to Catholic parents in Bardstown, Kentucky, in 1854. Because black people were not allowed to attend school, he is believed to have acquired academic skills from a parish priest who tutored him. With the end of the Civil War, Rudd moved to Ohio where he was able to complete high school. He went on to become a noted journalist and, in 1885, founded a publication he would eventually call the American Catholic Tribune, the first newspaper for and about black Catholics.

Just as Rudd sought to give a voice to black Catholics and their concerns in his day, Tinner-Williams finds a continuing need to do so today. While the stories of black Catholics are being told, Tinner-Williams contends that those who are writing and reporting those stories are typically either Catholic, but not black—and, thus, not sensitive to cultural nuances—or they are black and not Catholic. The Black Catholic Messenger aims, as is stated on its website, to affirm Catholicism as it, simultaneously, engages in advocacy for black people.

In a distinctly twenty-first century twist, the online publication has extended its offerings to include a podcast. THE BRIDGES RETREAT

A Retreat in Everyday Life.

What Are The Spiritual Exercises?

The *Spiritual Exercises* are prayers, meditations and reflections developed by St. Ignatius of Loyola. Participation in the Ignatian *Spiritual Exercises* offers the retreatant the tools to deepen their prayer life and, thus, their relationship with God. Accompanied by a companion schooled in the movements of the *Spiritual Exercises*, retreatants are guided according to their own personal journey. For many centuries, the *Spiritual Exercises* were often experienced in seclusion over the course of 30 days. People still engage in the *Spiritual Exercises* through this format.

In actuality, St. Ignatius realized that not everyone could leave the responsibilities of their daily lives to devote themselves to the 30-day retreat, so he provided for an alternative known as the 19th Annotation Retreat. The Bridges Retreat in Everyday Life stretches the four weeks of the 30-day retreat over eight months. It uses the same prayers, meditations and reflections as the 30-day retreat. Each retreatant commits to one period of prayer each day and then meets weekly with a trained, experienced prayer companion who serves, under the guidance of the Holy Spirit, to accompany the retreatant on an individual basis. The retreat is prayed in parallel with the seasonal liturgy of the church.

THE BRIDGES RETREAT

The Bridges Retreat begins in September and ends in May. The Bridges Foundation offers the *Spiritual Exercises* at various sites throughout the St. Louis area. An online site is also available to persons outside the Greater St. Louis area and for local persons comfortable with virtual meeting technology.

The group meetings are offered on various days of the week and at different times of the day. As you progress through the Ignatian *Spiritual Exercises*, your responses and needs will be assessed by the prayer companion, who will make your retreat an individualized experience. The Bridges Retreat is enhanced by a community aspect with regular group meetings, including presenters and the opportunity for group sharing.
