**FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK**

Five hundred years ago a fiery Basque courtier led a doomed defense of the town of Pamplona against French forces. Inigo Lopez de Loyola rallied the troops until struck in the leg by a shot from enemy artillery. Realizing discretion is the better part of valor, the town quickly surrendered.

This minor skirmish in a long-forgotten war was the start of a most remarkable journey. Inigo began an extended convalescence which led to a complete re-imagining of his life. He would turn from dreams of personal glory to seeking the greater glory of God. He would move from personal vanity to serving and loving in all things. He would change from Inigo to St. Ignatius Loyola.

We celebrate his feast this weekend with many others all over the world. The Ignatian year being held at this time marks this crucial moment in 1521. Conversion, however, is not simply a single experience, even one as significant as being struck down in battle. Conversion comes from the Latin meaning "to turn around". This turning was not instantaneous for Ignatius. It was a life-long movement of growing in intimacy and friendship with the Lord.

What happened at Pamplona changed Ignatius. He walked with a limp the rest of his life. More importantly, it began a process of turning to God that would mark the rest of his days. It initiated a desire to seek God's will for him. His conversion never really ended because his passion to know, love and serve the Lord never ended.

## Antiracism at College Church

### SFX Parish Racial Equity Review

Last year, with the following statement, we at College Church identified antiracism as a priority of our parish vision:

“We are committed to becoming an antiracist parish. We must continue to grow in our understanding of the systems that uphold racism as well as the actions and avenues that help to dismantle it. With the aid and guidance of the Holy Spirit, we are committed to transforming ourselves, our church and the community so that we can fully live the gospel. We will work to become a transforming institution committed to the process of intentional institutional restructuring, based upon antiracist analysis and identity.”

To help realize that transformation, members of the SFX Antiracism Team and parish leaders have partnered with the Crossroads Antiracism and Training Organization and, by means of that partnership, have begun to develop, through a variety of activities, a common understanding of systemic racism and a shared language to give expression to that understanding.

To continue to effect change, however, we are called upon, as a parish, to engage in a process of scrutiny, not unlike the critical examination of one's life undertaken by catechumens preparing for Baptism. Embracing those new entrants, we pray as a community that they may “be given a spirit of repentance, a sense of sin, and strength of will to live in true freedom as children of God.” The prayers of scrutiny are meant to uncover, then heal, all that is weak, defective, or sinful and to strengthen all that is upright, strong, and good. It is in this spirit that the Antiracism Team seeks to develop a process that will examine the policies, programs, and practices of our parish, assessing how the sin of systemic racism is being maintained within our organization.

Through this process, also known as a parish racial equity review or racial equity audit, we will explore our history, examine our parish culture and identity, and appraise our structures by listening to those

who form our community. This will require the commitment of a team of individuals, over a period of several months, who will participate in training, design surveys, interview groups and individuals, analyze responses, prepare a report of the findings, and develop recommendations that will ensure progress toward becoming a fully inclusive, antiracist, multicultural institution.

Although there is, as yet, no formal agreement to proceed with a review, conversations with representatives of Crossroads suggest that their organization, by virtue of the depth of its expertise and its ongoing relationship with College Church, can provide the tools and support needed for SFX parishioners to conduct a racial equity review.

At the center of this work is perpetual prayer, as we yearn for liberation from the sin of racism. May the Holy Spirit guide us all and give us courage to seek the truth and to work for justice and peace.

### Racial Equity Summit August 4th-6th

Next week, August 9th, will mark 7 years since Michael Brown, an unarmed, 18-year-old youth, was shot by a police officer. The local uprising as well as national protests that followed revealed not only the anger, but the anguish experienced by individuals and communities as a result of racial inequities and oppressive practices.

The Ferguson Commission, a group of community leaders appointed by then Governor Jay Nixon, was tasked with investigation of the factors and conditions that contributed to the climate in which the events of 2014 unfolded.

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The report of their findings, entitled *Forward Through Ferguson*, identified priorities, processes, and pathways to achieve racial equity by 2039. Imagining a St. Louis region where race no longer predicts outcomes and all members of the community have the opportunity to thrive, the commission recognizes the need for all of us to work for the change desired.

A Racial Equity Summit, cosponsored by *Forward Through Ferguson*, will be held virtually August 4th-6th and is designed to help our region realize this vision and better understand how we can contribute. All advocates for equity are invited to attend and learn ways we can support this effort.

Below, you can find recommendations from fellow parishioners for books that deal with issues of social justice. Two recommendations from Jo Curran:

***Caste*** by Isabel Wilkerson is really “heavy duty”. I actually got it as an audio book and really appreciated the way she put things in context. I learned a bunch and really came to understand much more deeply how “the system” has worked for millennia and continues through history. I also enjoyed Eddie Glaude’s book, ***Begin Again***, which points us toward the future.

Five recommendations from Jane Webre:

***High on the Hog, A Culinary Journey from Africa to America*** by Jessica B. Harris. Harris is a culinary historian who uses the narrative of food culture to weave in stories of the African diaspora. Jane Webre adds, “Following the food journey to tell the story about African Americans brought their struggles and successes to light in a new way for me. The seven pages of further reading and more than three pages of cookbooks are great resources.”

***We Are Each Other's Harvest: Celebrating African American Farmers, Land, and Legacy*** by Natalie Baszile. The book is a collection of works from varied genres and many different authors showing black people's long connection to the American land.

***The Last Children of Mill Creek*** by Vivian Gibson. This is Gibson's memoir in which she describes what it was like growing up in the Mill Creek area of St. Louis and how the city government officials destroyed the community under the guise of progress.

***Four Hundred Souls, a Community History of African America, 1619-2019***, edited by Ibram X. Kendi, and Keisha N. Blain. Editors Kendi and Blain have assembled ninety writers, each of whom tackles a five-year period, during the span of years from 1619, and the arrival of the White Lion privateer slave ship off the coast of Virginia, to 2019 and present day race-related struggles.

***In the Walnut Grove, a Consideration of the People Enslaved in and Around Florissant, Missouri*** by Andrew J. Theising. Another local historical work focusing on the practice of slavery in North St. Louis County. Theising, a professor of political science at Southern Illinois University-Edwardsville and a native of Florissant, considers the legacy of slavery and its contemporary impact.

### Registration Open For Religious Education This Fall



College Church offers a Catechesis of the Good Shepherd program and a more traditional Religious Education program as well. The RE Program at the College Church provides children in grades 1 - 8 with an Ignatian approach to their faith lives. Classes meet from 9:15- 10:15 on Sunday mornings, September through May. Children learn to experience God's love for them, and to share that love with those in their midst.

The program offers exceptional sacramental preparation, in-class service opportunities starting in the second grade and outside service days beginning in fifth grade. Classes include instruction based on a Loyola University Press Curriculum, and other hands-on learning activities helping children find God in all things.

Catechists include parents and St. Louis University students who volunteer because of their eagerness to share their love of God with others. ### Catechesis of the Good Shepherd

I was a tired parent when I brought the first of our three children to College Church's Catechesis of the Good Shepherd (CGS) program in 2004. I really did not know much about CGS. I just loved the rare quiet time it afforded me each Sunday. As I attended parent meetings once or twice a year, I became attracted to the CGS work. As a product of 17 years of Catholic education, I found it to be the way I wished all children's faith to be nourished. Every couple years, a catechist would suggest I take the Level I training. It seemed impossible to fit into my busy life. In 2014, CGS was in great need of catechists. A generous SFX parishioner, who wanted to keep CGS alive and well at College Church, offered to pay my tuition. Despite my hesitancy, I took the plunge. I don't know how to describe the catechist journey, except to say it fed my soul and continues to do so. For 7 years now, I have sat in awe with 3-to-6-year-olds and pondered the great mysteries of our faith in a space that provides for reverence and quiet contemplation. Because I am grateful for the work, effort, and hours that many hands put into making CGS available to my now young adult children, I will continue to serve as a catechist as long as I am needed.

**James R. Page, SJ**, was born and raised in New Orleans, alongside his younger brother. He attended Pomona College for undergraduate studies and majored in economics, while also becoming involved in a number of Bible study groups across the campuses of the Claremont Consortium.

He entered the Society of Jesus after college. For his first two years as a novice, James did apostolic work in a number of places: a L'Arche community in Kansas City, Mo., tutoring children in Nicaragua and working in high schools in Denver and Houston, among other ministries. After pronouncing first vows, he studied philosophy at Regis College at the University of Toronto. During his three years in Toronto, he also worked in catechetical programs, a L'Arche community, and participated in a number of interreligious dialogues hosted by the university.

Fr. James did his regency at SLUH teaching in the theology department. He also helped in the school's retreat programs and started a Philosophy Club. He then went on to earn his Licentiate in Sacred Theology at the Boston College School of Theology and Ministry, with a focus on Scripture. He was part of the RCIA program at St. Ignatius Church, and during his diaconate year, he worked at St. Michael's Church in Bedford, Mass.
