**Reflection from Our Parish Life Coordinator**

**Do you know Phoebe?**

In the Letter to the Romans, St. Paul commends St. Phoebe to the church in Rome, introduces her as a deacon (diakonos) of the church at Cenchreae, and asks that they "receive her in the Lord" (Romans 16:1-3).

St. Phoebe was a woman of great courage and deep love. She answered God's call to minister to God's people during the earliest days of the Church, when persecution against Christians was strong. She earned the trust of Paul, who depended on her to handle communications with the ecclesial community in Rome.

In both the Eastern and Western Church, St. Phoebe is commemorated on September 3. In 1969, the feast of Pope Gregory the Great (590-604 CE) was moved from March 12 to September 3, the anniversary of his election, thus displacing Phoebe on the liturgical calendar. She is recognized in the Roman Martyrology (2004), the official list of Catholic saints, as ancilla Domini (handmaid of the Lord), among the faithful of Cenchreae, a seaport about six miles from Corinth. Her liturgy is celebrated in Eastern Rite and Orthodox Churches. Growing her devotion is one way to help restore her memory and establish a liturgy to commemorate her in our tradition.

**How will we receive her in the Lord?**

**On a Sunday in early September, College Church will celebrate**

**St. Phoebe.** We will have many women serving in liturgical roles and I will offer a reflection after Communion. We join over a hundred Catholic communities across the U.S. and beyond in celebrating St. Phoebe during the month of September as church leaders prepare to gather in Rome in October for the General Assembly of the Synod. Among the themes considered will be women's participation in the Church, both broadly and specifically as deacons. In celebrating as a faith community, we join in prayer for the Global Synod, deepen our devotion to an inspiring but little-known saint, and honor the gifts of women ministers and leaders in our local church community.



Let us follow in the footsteps of St. Phoebe as we seek to journey with our global Church in synod!

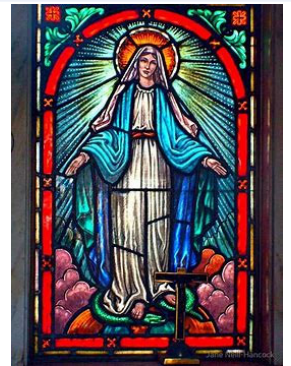

## Antiracism at College Church

*At College Church, antiracism is an expression of our recognition that all are created in the image of God. As such, we respond—personally and collectively—to the call to identify, and to actively challenge, structures and systems that devalue people on the basis of race, and to practice restoration in the pursuit of justice.*

### Reflections on the St. Louis Black History Tour

On a warm Saturday morning at the end of July, 28 people boarded a bus with a desire to learn more about the racial history of St. Louis. The tour, led by Fr. Gerry Kleba, did not disappoint. Traveling St. Louis streets from midtown to downtown, from Old North to South City, Fr. Kleba pointed out sites and shared stories of centuries of anti-black racial oppression and its legacy that is experienced today. There were also stories of perseverance, community collaboration, and hope. Drawing on his personal experience of ministry and social activism, Fr. Kleba described the good that can be realized when people work together.

Some College Church parishioners were part of this experience and offer a few of their individual thoughts and reflections.

“Traveling through St. Louis neighborhoods, it is easy to notice the contrasts between them. While driving by, I see the disparities in access to safe housing, food, education, health care, and all of the other components that transform geography into community. The St. Louis Black History Tour, led by Father Gerry Kleba, not only highlighted these inequities, it provided important historical context to better understand their origin and the systems that maintain them. What is not as easily recognized are the many people who have been and continue to work to dismantle racial barriers and to create more just systems. I was encouraged to learn of the efforts of Catholic Church leaders to work in collaboration with communities, courageously challenge unjust policies and practices, and to create services to meet people’s needs. I appreciate learning these stories of advocacy in antiracism. They are an important piece of our racial history and can guide our own efforts.” - Lisa Burks

“What an enlightening experience the bus tour was! A native Chicagoan, I have been immersed in the history of Black Catholics in St. Louis for some years. The bus tour offered an opportunity to see and hear about parishes that served the Black community and are frequently referenced in historical documents. We rode past Visitation Catholic Church and learned, from Father Kleba—a former pastor at Visitation—what that parish, which merged with Holy Ghost Catholic Church in 1961, meant to the community. Father

Kleba was pastor when Visitation—which as of 1992 became Visitation/St. Ann Shrine—began a credit union to aid neighboring residents. We passed the site on which Holy Ghost, now razed, had stood. Its rectory now houses senior citizens. The tour included St. Elizabeth, Mother of John the Baptist; St. Matthew the Apostle in the Ville neighborhood; the former site of St. Bridget of Erin, where Father Kleba had also served as pastor; and the merged Sts. Teresa and Bridget.

“Father Kleba’s perspective was invaluable. In addition to his various pastorates, he was a founder of the St. Louis Associations of Community Organizations (SLACO), which fought—and continues to operate—to ensure that the needs and concerns of the community are met. Father Kleba is a treasure trove of the history of social justice action in St. Louis, and I heartily recommend joining him when the next bus tour is scheduled.” - Winnie Sullivan

“Much of the tour was in the Ville neighborhood, which reportedly was once middle-class and thriving. Now it appears mostly desolate. There is so much empty space: vacant lots or huge, but abandoned houses. An exception is the former Homer G. Phillips Hospital, now a Senior Residence facility. It is a humongous building(!) and very well kept up. But it is like an island, with virtually no nearby businesses for blocks. There is so much history in the neighborhood. I returned the following day on my own to find a few ‘highlights’ not covered during the tour such as Chuck Berry’s house on North Whittier Ave.

“One can see how important churches were/are to help sustain such neighborhoods. We drove by St. Matthew’s, which suddenly appears like a shining light with trimmed lawns, and beautifully kept buildings among so many dilapidated residences. Yet even today the churches organize vital programs for the poor.

Fr. Kleba, our guide, told us, “One person doesn’t make decisions; groups make the decisions.” He was talking about investing in neighborhoods and was referring to groups of realtors, financiers, and developers as the decision-makers. Yet if these areas in north St. Louis were redeveloped, I wonder if those who truly need housing the most would be able to

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to afford it? It's an overwhelming problem to contemplate . . ." - David Werthmann

"Saturday's bus tour around parts of north St. Louis and areas south of that was eye-opening. Fr. Gerry who is a very tall man is now a giant in my mind. He lived in so many of the areas we drove through as he was assigned to various parishes. One significant thing that he did for the residents was to establish a credit union enabling many, many more people the ability to get loans. Banks were hesitant to loan money to Black people. With the credit union in their area, they were able to borrow money and improve their lives and receive further education. Sadly, the credit union had to shut down as some banks objected. We also learned more about the history of Ranken Technical College, a very large footprint in the north neighborhood. I appreciated Fr. Gerry mentioning reparations and how so many of the areas around the Botanical Gardens were built with the labor of enslaved people. The beautiful neighborhoods and valuable real estate are examples of financial inequity that we see today. Fr. Gerry is a living encyclopedia of knowledge. He stressed that one person alone can't make too many changes, but people working together for a common purpose can do a lot. We saw many examples of that on the tour. It was excellent and I recommend a tour like this to anyone." - Ginny Schrappen

### Significant Figures in Racial History This Week

Fredda Witherspoon – Died August 14, 1996, in St. Louis, MO. Witherspoon received a Ph.D. in Guidance Counseling from Washington University in St. Louis and taught at Forest Park Community College for 27 years. She and her husband encouraged fair-skinned African Americans to purchase homes in a neighborhood with restrictive covenants that prohibited Blacks from living there. This action eventually led to the Supreme Court declaring such covenants illegal.

Amelia Boynton Robinson – Born on August 18, 1911, in Savannah, Georgia. Robinson was a civil rights leader and activist in the southern U.S. She was a key figure in the 1965 Selma to Montgomery marches. In 1990, she was awarded the Martin Luther King Jr. Freedom Medal. Robinson lived to be 104 years old!

St. Alberto Hurtado, SJ – Died August 18, 1952, in Santiago, Chile. Hurtado was born into wealth. After his father died his mother sold their estate, but the buyer defrauded her, leaving them impoverished. This led to Alberto's interest in social justice. As a Jesuit, Father Hurtado worked to instill Christian values in labor unions. He published numerous articles and books on labor issues in relation to the Catholic faith and became a national hero. Unfortunately, he died soon after being diagnosed with pancreatic cancer. He was canonized in 2005.

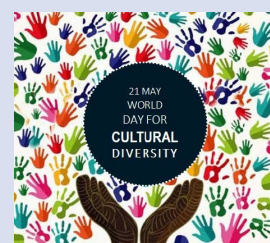

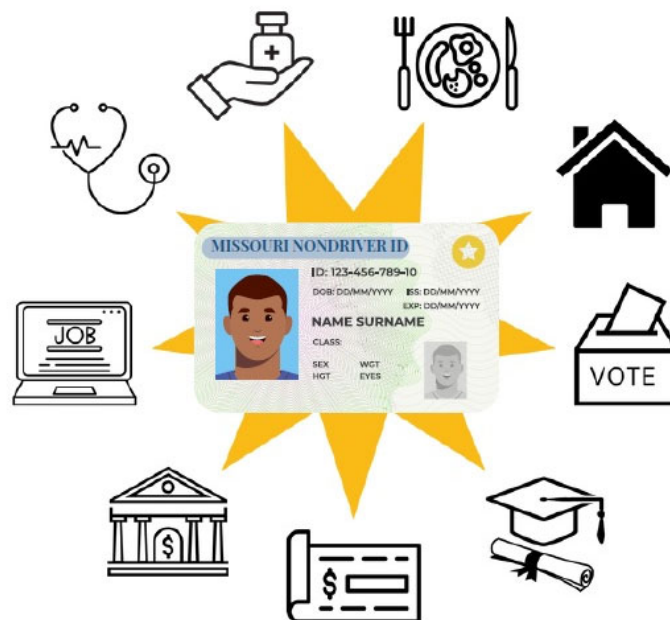
