Reflection from our Parish Life Coordinator

This week as we celebrate our parish moving to a new leadership structure and a new way to be church, I thought I would share some of what I heard during our house meetings last year. These are quotes I continue to reflect on as we move in this new direction.

We feel like we are on the Road to Emmaus. We are being called to be more like the early church – not the perfect church. If we are a more synodal church, if we listen to one another, maybe we could overcome some divisions in the larger church.

Synodality is the antidote to clericalism. You don't have to be ordained to listen to the Holy Spirit. We can embolden a priesthood of the people.

As a woman, my voice has never been encouraged to participate in the Catholic Church. I grew up not knowing my own voice, and it has been a challenge to learn how to find it now after watching my daughters find theirs.

Every person has a piece of the truth; If you don't have a voice you can't be yourself.

(thinking of those who identify as LGBTQIA) As I think of my children, I know that we all want to be accepted by our mother and by our church.

We need to listen to each other's different experiences and images of God and different traditions and cultures.

How do we as a community affirm each other for the goodness that we bring and offer rather than looking at what's going wrong? I think synodality is looking for what is going right, looking for the gifts and accepting that I am not in control. But I can and should bring my voice to the table through active listening and active sharing.

I'm truly grateful to be on this journey with all of you. I look forward to learning the way the Holy Spirit is working in each one of us. I am excited about how that can be reflected in our work and worship together.

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

Please let me start by thanking you for your thoughtful consideration and honest feedback to our various All Things New surveys, outreach and strategic planning endeavors. Your prayers and input have been most valuable to this effort.

As I write, I'm reflecting on something the Holy Father said several years ago that remains true and especially relevant to us in the Archdiocese of St. Louis. Pope Francis said "we are not living an era of change, but a change of era." The All Things New pastoral planning process is going to bring historic change to the Archdiocese of St. Louis. We know that our current model is not sustainable. As we start to look at potential plans for parishes, ministries and schools to ensure a vibrant presence and future for the Archdiocese, I'd like to update you as to where we are in the process.

In this next phase, we will begin a conversation with our archdiocesan priests and parishioners to discuss draft models, which are based on demographics, sacramental data and feedback received from the Disciple Maker Index survey and other consultative bodies. This past Friday, we presented the information we gathered and preliminary proposals for parishes to our priests to gather their feedback. Then, over the next several months, we will share updated proposals in a series of listening sessions hosted at each parish to hear your thoughts about the proposed models. *Please let me remind you that these parish models are preliminary and will be adjusted based on your feedback.* Specific information regarding schools will be released later.

Our goal is to implement a vision for evangelization that is accessible to all and empowers every Catholic to spread the Gospel message – today and for generations to come.

This is our primary focus as Catholics, and so I urge you all to bear this in mind as we take the next steps. We are called to collaborate as the Catholic Church rather than compete as many individual churches. I encourage you to engage with us during our listening sessions with an open heart and mind, as we continue to discern where the Lord is leading us. We will continue to update you through allthingsnew.archstl.org. May God bless you, your family and your parish community.

What is All Things New?

We all know that the Church of today is not the same that it was 50, 100 or 150+ years ago, and yet we are still functioning in many ways out of the same mode of evangelization. We have inherited a great treasure of Catholic institutions from previous generations, but as the Catholic population and society have shifted over the past several decades, they are no longer as effective or sustainable as they once were.

We are closer now to 2050 than to 1950. We need to ask ourselves what our parishes, ministries and institutions need to look like in order to effectively share the faith in a way that is suitable and sustainable for our children and generations to come.

All Things New is evaluating the effectiveness of the Church in St. Louis in proclaiming the Gospel and identifying opportunities for improvement and renewal within all parishes, schools and curia offices and agencies.

Why is the Archdiocese of St. Louis making these changes now?

- Our Catholic population continues to decline and age.
- Our priests are aging and as a result, their number is declining.
- Mass attendance and sacramental participation continue to decline.
- Fewer children attend Catholic Schools and Religious Education (PSR).
- Our resources are finite and need to be realigned. •

On August 19, 2022, Archbishop Rozanski met with Archdiocesan priests. What was shared?

The Archbishop and Fr. Chris Martin, Vicar for Strategic Planning, shared the next phase of All Things New with archdiocesan priests, which included proposed parish models based on our Planning Areas.

A Planning Area is a number of parishes and schools in a geographic region which will be considered together to develop proposed structural options for the future. There are 15 planning areas in the Archdiocese.

They saw several options as to how parishes in their specific Planning Area could be structured and

collaborate in the future. Each option is termed a "model." The models are "unfinished" because they need your insight and feedback.

What's next?

Archdiocesan priests will evaluate the Planning Areas and Models and offer feedback. Their feedback will be incorporated into the models. Then, the updated Planning Areas and Models will be shared at every parish in listening sessions. The purpose of the listening sessions is to gather your input on these proposed options that are specific to your parish so that over the next year a recommendation can be presented to Archbishop Rozanski for his discernment.

Modelled parishes are generally much larger than current parishes. On average, parishes are 2 to 2.5 x larger.

What happens after the Listening Sessions?

All parishioners across the Archdiocese will have an opportunity to provide feedback through an open-ended survey about their parish's model options after the listening sessions. This feedback will be incorporated into revised models which will be refined with input from the pastors and key parish leaders throughout the winter 2022 and into 2023. Once a final recommended grouping of parishes and schools is determined, the model will also include the following:

- Recommendations concerning buildings to be used by the merged parish
- The number of priests initially assigned
- Suggested evangelization and ministry strategies

What is the timeline for this?

While decisions will be made in spring 2023, implementation will not begin until fall 2023 and will extend through 2026. Implementation will occur in a phased approach over time to allow for orderly planning and transition at the local level, led by your pastor and supported by the Archdiocese.

What can we as local Catholics do now?

You are encouraged to attend your parish's listening sessions with open hearts and minds. Continue to attend Mass, participate in the Sacraments and pray for the power of the Holy Spirit to pour out upon the Church of St. Louis, to grant us the gift of true discernment, so we may do His will in all things.



Antiracism at College Church

At College Church, antiracism is an expression of our recognition that all are created in the image of God. As such, we respond—personally and collectively— to the call to identify, and to actively challenge, structures and systems that devalue people on the basis of race, and to practice restoration in the pursuit of justice.

Loyola Academy: Breaking the Cycle of Poverty

Loyola Academy, located just three blocks from College Church, is the Jesuit middle-school serving underresourced boys in the 6th, 7th, and 8th grades. Father Paul Sheridan, former president of SLUH, founded Loyola in 1999. Father Sheridan noted there were very few students of color at SLUH and those that were there were struggling academically. Thus, the impetus to start Loyola.


Today the Loyola student body is 97% Black and 3% Latinx. The school's mission is to prepare boys to matriculate into the college preparatory schools located throughout the area. Many of the students attend Saint Louis University High, DeSmet, or Christian Brothers College. With a total enrollment of 60 boys (20/class), Loyola students receive individual attention in a Nativity Miguel model which includes an extended school day (7:30 to 5:30) and an extended year (August I through June 3). Once at Loyola, the boys are exposed to chess, robotics, personal finance class, meal etiquette, public speaking, ordering a pizza on the Hill in Italian, a Mom Prom, and three nights in an overnight camp in Illinois. Upon graduating, the students remain under the tutelage of Loyola's Grad Support Department which provides two counselors to stay with the boys. One counselor, who focuses on their high school performance, had two Loyola alumni spend 6 weeks in Demark this summer, while another Loyola alum, now at DeSmet, visited Kenya. The other grad support counselor assists our alumni in making their college applications. 78% of Loyola alumni are in post-secondary educational institutions.

One of the unique features of the school is its extensive volunteer program. The morning reading program has volunteers working with boys (one-on-one). The volunteer reads alternatively with the boy showing him how to stop at a period, pause at a comma, raise his voice at an exclamation point and help decipher an unfamiliar word in the story. The boys select the book and reading sessions occur on Monday, Tuesday, and Thursday from 10:10 to 10:50. Some volunteers read twice/week; others just one day/week. Most of reading volunteers are retired personnel and Jesuit seminarians; a number have been reading for 8+ years. The volunteer reads with the same boy for the entire year.

The afternoon tutoring program is held on Mondays through Thursdays, 4:30 to 5:30. Here the volunteer is paired with a student (one-on-one) to work on homework assignments, tests preparation and class projects. The volunteer works on all subject matters (converting decimals to fractions, finding prepositional phrases on a laptop, re-discovering the phases of the moon). Here the volunteers are comprised of undergraduates from SLU and WashU, Jesuit seminarians, retired individuals and high school students who are Loyola alumni, as both CBC and DeSmet offer daily bus service to Loyola. Many volunteers start with a student in sixth grade and stay with him through his three-years at Loyola. Last year's combined headcount of reading and tutoring volunteers exceeded 70 individuals. Talent is distributed equally; opportunities are not.

Book Recommendation



The Last Children of Mill Creek Vivian Gibson © 2020, Belt Publishing

I became interested in the Mill Creek Valley neighborhood after I realized it was located just across the street from our church. Approximately 20,000 black people lived and worked there. For those growing up

in Mill Creek, the neighborhood was a self-contained "small town" where virtually everything they needed was available. Children were warned "never cross Jefferson Avenue without an adult." In other words, don't leave the confines of the area where you live.

Ms. Gibson's family was poor but did not live in squalor. Their mother showed great concern about the appearance of her children: dresses and shirts must always be ironed before they left the house.

The author's father had a job with the city repairing streetcar tracks, a position he claimed was "a pretty good job for a colored man." One can see from that remark that living in a segregated society kept even the adults in their places with little hope for advancement. Yet the children seemed happy – perhaps because they were seldom exposed to other lifestyles.

There is no mention of "welfare" as families worked hard to maintain their properties and raise wholesome families. But then in 1959, when the city began to demolish the neighborhood, many residents were moved into the Pruitt-Igoe complex that had recently opened. Fortunately, the Gibson family was able to afford to move to Wellston. There, realtors working with city governments counted on whites moving out as they moved more black families in. Yet eventually middle-class blacks also moved further out into the County. Thus, the author points out that the shortsightedness of city leaders cleared out one slum only to create another. That was not progress!

This small, easy-to-read book provides an eye-opening description of life for black families living in St. Louis in mid-20th century.
