FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

If you had to compare our Sunday liturgy to something similar, what would it be? My analogy would be to our neighbors up Grand Avenue at Powell Hall. The St. Louis Symphony Orchestra is composed of different musicians playing different instruments directed for a common purpose. Each member contributes to the whole by performing their particular part. All are necessary for the performance to be done well.

Obviously, liturgy is prayer not performance. There is a certain resemblance, though. There are multiple ministers that constitute the liturgical celebration. Musicians, cantors, lectors, choir, ushers, Eucharistic ministers, priest celebrants, acolytes, and the congregation are all participating in our communal prayer. Each has a specific and needed part that they contribute. It is telling the rubrics for mass require the priest and at least one other person. The liturgy is always a shared work.

A new academic year is the perfect time to imagine how you might contribute to our liturgy. I invite everyone to prayerfully consider serving as a minister at mass. Like the symphony, there is a place for one's gifts and talents. Unlike the symphony, you do not need to be a professional who has devoted your entire life to being, for instance, a lector.

Antiracism at College Church

The St. Louis Shakespeare Festival

Not far from College Church and covering less than half of a square mile, bordered by St. Louis Avenue, MLK Drive, Sarah Avenue and Taylor Avenue, a community was formed out of the racism, restrictions, and exclusionary policies of the St. Louis region. With few other options, this is where black middle-class St. Louisans lived. The neighborhood, which came to be known as The Ville, grew to become a thriving center of African American culture-including businesses, human services, churches (including Jesuit parish St. Matthew the Apostle), and educational institutions of all levels. Here is located the historic Homer G. Phillips Hospital, which not only served the African American community, but also trained black doctors and nurses from across the county. Sumner High School, the first high school for black students west of the Mississippi, nurtured Chuck Berry, Billy Davis Jr., Margaret Bush Wilson, Dick Gregory, Grace Bumbry, Arthur Ashe and many others. Sadly, it was the choices afforded through desegregation that lured many residents away from the neighborhood, beginning the decline that is evident today.

This is some of the historical context that will be present in this year's production of Shakespeare in the Street. Sumner High School alumna, Mariah L. Richardson, has written an adaptation, inspired by William Shakespeare's Hamlet, that incorporates the experiences of residents of the Ville. It promises to not only entertain but to provide insight into the perspectives and vision of this steadfast community.

Invitation to Conversion: Ignatian Spirituality and Antiracism

Stories of the life of St. Ignatius invariably begin with the “cannonball moment” – marking the event that led to his conversion. The time he spent recovering from his battle wounds allowed Ignatius to examine his life circumstances, and to see things in a new way. He came to recognize God’s loving mercy and to respond to God’s call to serve. Ignatius spent his life creating a pathway for others to experience this same redemption, healing, and mission. That pathway we now know as Ignatian Spirituality and through it we can find a deeper relationship with God. This is the gift we celebrate throughout this Ignatian year.

The work of antiracism invites us to a similar transformation. While some of our conversion experiences may be as dramatic as a cannonball wound, more likely, our vision gains focus and clarity over time – the grace received through multiple experiences and encounters. As our parish continues its journey toward becoming an antiracist church, we seek continuous formation in the practice of Ignatian Spirituality as well as in action and advocacy for racial justice. We are grateful to have received a Social Grant from the UCS Province of the Society of Jesus that will strengthen and integrate these efforts. Some of the grant monies will be used to support our antiracism leadership development and parish review process, funding scholarships for review team training. In addition, we will host a series of speakers that will guide us in applying the principles and practice of Ignatian Spirituality to the work of antiracism in our parish and throughout the province. Plans are under way for this program to be held virtually early in 2022.

As we continue our Ignatian Year, may we pray for the grace to see one another through the eyes of Jesus, accepting the invitation of continual transformation, and dedicating our lives to radical love in service of others.

Two recommendations from Emory Webre:

The Sum of Us: What Racism Costs Everyone and How We can Prosper Together by Heather C. McGee. Everyone benefits and profits when everyone gains economically.

How the Word is Passed by Clint Smith. His visits to seven historic sites all connected to the history and memory of slavery and how they affect the present.

Two recommendations from Lea Koesterer:

Wrestling with Zionism: Jewish Voices of Dissent by Dr. Dafna Levit. Dr. Levit's book is a collection of writings from 21 Jewish and Israeli thinkers (scholars, theologians, journalists, lawyers and activists). There is a lot of information that the US mainstream media is oblivious of. Before anyone presumes to voice an opinion about Israel/Palestine, they should read this.

Embracing Israel/Palestine: A Strategy to Heal and Transform the Middle East by Rabbi Michael Lerner (Tikkun). Rabbi Lerner has superb understanding of the human condition. He describes the inner workings of the mentalities that spawned the current unsustainable occupation of the Palestinian territories. Resolution seems hopeless, yet he offers hope!

A recommendation from Thomas Dziagwa:

An American Marriage by Tayari Jones. A phenomenal fictitious story telling the real effects of how a wrongful conviction impacts the life of the individual and the lives those around them. "Winner of the Women's Prize for Fiction 2019."

The students, in a well-organized assembly line, filled and sealed plastic bags filled with rice, pinto beans, vitamins, and freeze-dried vegetables. Each bag contained six servings or meals.

Shortly before the session started news came out about another deadly earthquake in Haiti, making the event all the more significant. The packathon was organized by the CRUDEM Foundation and was one of many taking place around the country.
