

LIGHTWORKS - AN EXPERIENCE OF IGNATIAN PRAYER

LIGHTWORKS is a "light form of work," a series of limbering up exercises for the spirit. Physical exercises build muscle, increase stamina, and develop flexibility. So LIGHTWORKS does for the spirit. These exercises of prayer and reflection, build our relationship with God and help us become more aware of God's presence in our lives. It consists of weekly group sessions.

Participants are given scripture passages or reflections from the Spiritual Exercises of St. Ignatius to pray over each week. These invite us into conversation with God about our lives. LITURGICAL MINISTRY

The prayerfulness and beauty of our Sunday liturgical celebrations is due in a large part to the various liturgical ministers who share their time and talent with the parish.



Usher/Greeters welcome everyone with friendly faces, answer questions, and assist them with special needs. Acolytes prepare the vessels and hosts, organize the books, and assist all involved so that the liturgy runs smoothly. Lectors prepare and proclaim the readings and Universal Prayers (General Intercessions) each Sunday. The choir raises their voices for God's glory and leads the assembly in the hymns. Eucharistic ministers distribute communion to the assembly and when needed can take communion to the homebound. The liturgical laundry team washes and prepares the linens used at the altar each week. The Art and Environment team prepares and decorates the church for the special seasons each year. More dedicated hands are needed in each of these ministries.

Antiracism at College Church

At College Church, antiracism is an expression of our recognition that all are created in the image of God. As such, we respond—personally and collectively— to the call to identify, and to actively challenge, structures and systems that devalue people on the basis of race, and to practice restoration in the pursuit of justice.

The Emmett Till National Monument

On July 25, 2023—the date that would have been Emmett Till's eighty-second birthday—President Joe Biden signed a proclamation designating a new national monument honoring the slain teen. Till, a 14-year-old black youth, lived with his mother, Mamie Till-Mobley, on Chicago's South Side. In the summer of 1955, Mobley allowed her son to visit relatives in the town of Money, Mississippi.

During the visit, Till was accused of making inappropriate advances toward Carolyn Bryant Donham, a white female storekeeper, in a manner that has been variously described as looking at her, touching her, or whistling at her. For that alleged act, which was recanted by Donham fifty years later, Till was kidnapped from his relatives' home, brutally beaten, and thrown in the Tallahatchie River. Upon locating his remains, his mother transported Till's body back to Chicago and insisted on an open casket during his funeral service, requiring an encounter with, and acknowledgment of, the horror of his death. The outrage that ensued helped to launch the Civil Rights Movement.

Emmett Till's death is not an abstract, remote historical fact for me. As a curious four-year-old, I was aware of the hushed, somber tones of adults in our family's home in a neighborhood near Till's. I sensed that something terribly wrong had happened, though my relatives refrained from speaking of it openly in my presence. I recall having seen an image of Till in the *Jet* magazine on my aunt's coffee table, and hearing my aunt's renter, who was Till's cousin, whisper about the long lines around the church where his funeral service was held.

That church, in Chicago's Bronzeville neighborhood, will now be one of the three sites of the national monument. The other two sites are the Tallahatchie County Courthouse, where Till's killers were acquitted by an all-white, all male jury in September 1955, and the bank of the Tallahatchie River where Till's body was found. A marker identifies the spot where Till's body was retrieved from the river, but it has been repeatedly vandalized. The new national monument—in its three locations—will cover an area of five acres, will be overseen by the National Park Service, and will, it is hoped,

serve as a fitting memorial and tribute to him and to his mother's courage.

Compassionate Saint Louis: Inviting YOU to Help Re-brand Our City

At the heart of antiracism at College Church is our shared belief that all people are created in the image of God. This belief compels us to challenge the systems and structures that devalue and harm people because of race or other aspects of identity and seeks to build an inclusive community. Compassionate St. Louis is an organization that is also working to honor the inherent dignity of every person and to increase justice and equity in St. Louis. We invite you to learn more about their work from Sr. Carla Mae Streeter, Chair of the Coordinating Circle.

In 2007, British author Karen Armstrong sent an email asking: "Why are all the world religions so violent?" She got so many responses that she invited six interfaith leaders to discuss the question. They agreed that the basis of all their traditions is "compassion." They wrote four simple paragraphs and called them the Charter for Compassion.

Armstrong took the Charter to TED Talks where speakers present ideas that might change the world. The Charter for Compassion won the \$100,000 prize as the top idea that year for changing the world. She then presented the Charter to 8,000 participants at the Parliament of World Religions. She announced that she would travel from city to city, inviting mayors and city councils to sign-on to the Charter and post it so all will practice its principles. So far, over 490 cities around the world are on board.

Several of us brought the Charter back to St. Louis to begin building a Compassionate City here. First, we developed a strategic plan. Even during COVID we continued meeting via Zoom and worked out three immediate goals:

- Raise awareness of the Movement;
- Seek 500 organizational and individual endorsers/ partners;
- Celebrate by calling attention to compassionate activity already happening throughout the region.

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Our ten-year goal is to re-brand the St. Louis Region so it shows up on the Realtors' List of the 10 Most Compassionate Cities in the USA, i.e., a place where "You Would Want to Live."

The national website (charterforcompassion.org) describes what is happening internationally. Our local website (Compassionate-STL.org) is where you will find a copy of the Charter, a video, and a webinar produced in 2021.

If you share the Charter's values and you can stand with us by endorsing it, go to 'Endorse Us' on the local website. Ask others to do so, also. The Mayor's Office knows we are coming once we reach our goal of 500 endorsements. Help us reach that goal!

I will be in the church vestibule August 27 after all Masses to help you sign-on if you haven't already done so on the website.

Significant Figures in Racial History This Week

W. E. B. DuBois – Died on August 27, 1963, in Accra, Ghana. DuBois grew up in an integrated environment in Massachusetts. He became the first African American to receive a Ph.D. from Harvard University. DuBois helped establish the NAACP in 1909 and worked for civil rights throughout the world.

Emmett Till – Died August 28, 1955, in Drew, Mississippi. At age 14 Till was lynched after being accused of offending (i.e. "looking at") a white woman while purchasing an item in her family's grocery store. His body had been beaten beyond recognition.

Lucy A. Delaney – Died on August 31, 1891, in Hannibal, Missouri. Delaney was born into slavery in St. Louis in the early 1800s. After receiving her freedom, she worked as a seamstress, wrote stories about living in slavery, and served as a leader among the local Black community.


