FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

Our second reading for the next month comes from the Letter of James. It is impossible to know definitively the author's identity, but many scholars believe it is the James described as Jesus' brother in both Mark and Matthew's Gospel. This James became a leader of the Christian community in Jerusalem. James was martyred in the early 60's.

The Letter of James reflects in many ways traditional Jewish belief and piety. It is concerned with right conduct, worship and how the faith community is to live together. The text is more of an exhortation or extended sermon than it is a letter. James is not addressing a particular person but rather describes the necessary way of being faithful to God.


James has no illusions about the nature of the Church. There are significant divisions and behaviors that he sees as damaging to the faith community. Perhaps none more so than the use of words to separate and hurt the faithful. James says the tongue can be like fire, poison, and bitter water. It is especially harmful when those in authority or leadership act in such a way. He echoes Jesus in reserving his harshest judgement for religious leaders.

The ways we can build up or tear down one another with our words is always worth pondering. My favorite line from James is, "the tongue is a small member, and yet has great ambitions." Amen. Perhaps the next month can be a graced moment to use our tongues to bless God and uplift each other, and not hurt others.

Antiracism at College Church

“Will You Do Something Positive Right Now...?”:

The Legacy of Claude H. Heithaus, S.J.

The start of the academic year is an occasion for remembering those who, offering their own lives as examples, have taught us to critically confront the most difficult issues of our time. One such person was Reverend Claude Herman Heithaus, S.J., whose electrifying homily, at a student Mass seventy-seven years ago, was an important catalyst for the integration of St. Louis University (SLU) in the summer of 1944.

Heithaus taught Classical Art and Archaeology at SLU and served as the director of university publications and publicity. At a time when all Catholic schools in St. Louis were segregated, he became aware that an inquiry regarding admission of a young African American woman to SLU had been met with reluctance by the university's Council of Regents and Deans. He also learned that admission by another young black applicant to Webster College, run by the Sisters of Loretto, had been blocked by Archbishop John J. Glennon.

On February 11, 1944, Heithaus addressed a body of five hundred students from the pulpit of St. Francis Xavier (College) Church, and made an impassioned plea for racial justice, charging the congregation to commit to change. A portion of his sermon follows:

“Our Lord and model, Jesus Christ, commanded His followers to teach all nations. He founded one church through which all were to be saved. He prayed that all might become one in Him. He incorporated all races and colors into His Mystical Body. He died that all might be united in the happiness of the Beatific Vision...

“The Catholic Church, denouncing race discrimination in its encyclicals, has said that ‘those who enter the Church, whatever be their origin or their speech have equal rights as children in the House of the Lord.’ But some people say that Negroes have only those rights which the white men condescend to grant them...

“I am horrified to find that some Catholics have been infected with this diabolical prejudice against the Negro. Self-deluded fools that they are, they cling with blind obstinacy to the idea that the time has not yet come to give justice to the Colored children of God...

“And now I ask you Catholic students to look at the Blessed Sacrament and answer this question. Will you not do something positive right now to make reparation

for the suffering which this prejudice has inflicted upon millions of your fellow Christians?

“For the wrongs that have been done to the Mystical Body of Christ through the wrong done to its colored members, we owe the suffering of Christ an act of public reparation. Let us make it now. Will you rise please? Now repeat this prayer after me. ‘Lord Jesus, we are sorry and ashamed for all the wrongs that white men have done to Your Colored children. We are firmly resolved never again to have any part in them, and to do everything in our power to prevent them. Amen.’”

For this act of courage, Father Heithaus was reprimanded and, ultimately, reassigned by his superiors. But he is rightly credited with having been responsible, in part, for the admission of five African American students to SLU during the summer of 1944, affording the university the distinction of being the first in a former slave-holding state to integrate.

Not far from College Church and covering less than half of a square mile, bordered by St. Louis Avenue, MLK Drive, Sarah Avenue and Taylor Avenue, a community was formed out of the racism, restrictions, and exclusionary policies of the St. Louis region. With few other options, this is where black middle-class St. Louisans lived. The neighborhood, which came to be known as The Ville, grew to become a thriving center of African American culture-including businesses, human services, churches (including Jesuit parish St. Matthew the Apostle), and educational institutions of all levels. Here is located the historic Homer G. Phillips Hospital, which not only served the African American community, but also trained black doctors and nurses from across the county. Sumner High School, the first high school for black students west of the Mississippi, nurtured Chuck Berry, Billy Davis Jr., Margaret Bush Wilson, Dick Gregory, Grace Bumbry, Arthur Ashe and many others. Sadly, it was the choices afforded through desegregation that lured many residents away from the neighborhood, beginning the decline that is evident today.

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This is some of the historical context that will be present in this year’s production of Shakespeare in the Street. Sumner High School alumna, Mariah L. Richardson, has written an adaptation, inspired by William Shakespeare’s Hamlet, that incorporates the experiences of residents of the Ville. It promises to not only entertain but to provide insight into the perspectives and vision of this steadfast community.

Registration Open For Religious Education This Fall

College Church offers a Catechesis of the Good Shepherd program and a more traditional Religious Education program as well. The RE Program at the College Church provides children in grades 1 - 8 with an Ignatian approach to their faith lives. Classes meet from 9:15- 10:15 on Sunday mornings, September through May. Children learn to experience God's love for them, and to share that love with those in their midst.

The program offers exceptional sacramental preparation, in-class service opportunities starting in the second grade and outside service days beginning in fifth grade. Classes include instruction based on a Loyola University Press Curriculum, and other hands-on learning activities helping children find God in all things.

College Church's Youth Group at the Haiti Packathon

Six members of the College Church Youth Group, along with acting youth group directors Julie Kilian and Terry Edemann, participated in a meal "packathon" which resulted in 113,000 meals prepared for Haiti in a two-hour session.

Members Robbie Winter, Tyler Winter, Elizabeth DeFoy, Nicholas Sheppard, Dominic Lee and Jack Taylor joined 350 local volunteers at Chaminade College Prep on Saturday, August 14 to package the meals. The students, in a well-organized assembly line, filled and sealed plastic bags filled with rice, pinto beans, vitamins, and freeze-dried vegetables. Each bag contained six servings or meals.

Shortly before the session started news came out about another deadly earthquake in Haiti, making the event all the more significant. The packathon was organized by the CRUDEM Foundation and was one of many taking place around the country.
