FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK



This weekend we mark the 20th anniversary of September 11th terror attacks. I recall seeing an interview with a Catholic theologian from Italy a few years after 9/11. He said as soon as he saw the second plane strike the World Trade Center he knew the individuals involved were motivated by religion. Only something as powerful as religious faith, he claimed, could motivate someone to do something so horrific.

I believe that is both frightening and accurate. Religious faith concerns ultimate truths and realities. Faith seeks to not only know God but to live in accord with the will of God. There is nothing more important for a believer than to order one's life in relationship to God's truth. But this worthy desire can be distorted. A rigid, uncompromising commitment to the Truth can make it possible to justify most anything.

Inherent in all religions is also a recognition of humility before God. Human beings never know God's truth completely. This necessitates a certain modesty to our faith claims. Our grasp of God is always limited, partial and fragmentary. That is why the faith community is so important. It reminds us we are on the way, and still have much to learn.

Knowing God and ourselves in relationship to God is our most fundamental purpose. We need to get this right for the consequences are grave. The Psalmist tells us, "A humble, contrite heart you will not spurn, O Lord." That is the attitude we seek. A compassionate fidelity rather than an unyielding certainty.

Antiracism at College Church

Reliving our History: The Federation of Colored Catholics

Growing out of a concern that the needs of black Catholics, in military service during World War I, be addressed, the Federation of Colored Catholics (FCC) was founded, in 1924, by Thomas Wyatt Turner. Turner, born into a Maryland family of black Catholic sharecroppers, would eventually earn a doctorate from Cornell University and chair the biology department at Hampton Institute; he described the FCC as the “voice of the Catholic Negro in America.”

In important respects the spiritual progeny of Daniel Rudd's Black Catholic Congresses (1889-1894), the FCC set as its purpose bringing “about a closer relation and a better feeling among all Catholic Negroes, to advance the cause of Catholic education throughout the Negro population, to seek to raise the general Church status of the Negro, and to stimulate colored Catholics to a larger participation in racial and civic affairs.” For the next several decades Turner and the FCC continued to press for black Catholic clergy (at a time when most seminaries did not accept black aspirants); schools at which black Catholic children could be educated; and, responding to a specific case at the Catholic University of America, admission of black students to Catholic colleges and universities.

The importance of forming the Federation became clear to Wyatt when, en route to Kansas City to deliver a presentation on a scientific paper, Wyatt stopped in St. Louis to attend Sunday Mass. He was quickly told that the seat he had chosen in church was “inappropriate” and that he would have to move, which he refused to do. Over time, the FCC would tackle not only racial discrimination in the Church, but also in the broader society.

The FCC held its first annual convention in December of 1925 in Washington, D.C. Its seventh convention took place in St. Louis in 1931, with St. Elizabeth—the city's designated African American parish—serving as host. More than 500 clergy and laity are estimated to have attended the opening celebration at St. Louis University. Father William Markoe, S.J., who was at St. Elizabeth's, had joined the FCC and had made the parish's publication, *The Chronicle*, the official organ of the FCC, asked Archbishop John Joseph Glennon if the convention Mass could be held at the new St. Louis Cathedral Basilica. Glennon refused, and the Mass was held, instead

at St. Francis Xavier (College) Church, with the archbishop making brief remarks to those gathered.

By 1932, the FCC would splinter, with early supporters Markoe and John LaFarge, S.J., pressing to encourage a more interracial direction for the group and Turner wanting to maintain a sole focus on black Catholic demands. The organization under Turner would become completely inactive by 1952, but would serve as an important precursor to the currently existing National Black Catholic Congress. Turner lived a long life, receiving an honorary doctorate from the Catholic University of America in 1976, and passing two years later at the age of 101.

Land Acknowledgment

Our country and our church have recently begun to reexamine the relationship between Native American peoples and those who later came to occupy this land. A more complete truth is being revealed concerning the harm inflicted on indigenous people—both historically and in our present day. Policies and practices were established that limited or eliminated native cultures and took possession of the land they cared for—land that sustained them in return. America is just beginning to reckon with the injustices endured by its native people and to identify a path seeking truth, reconciliation, and healing.

One practice that has been recognized as a first step in that direction is known as a land acknowledgment. This is a statement that recognizes and respects indigenous peoples as traditional stewards of the land. It is an expression of gratitude and appreciation to those on whose territory we stand. Such statements may be proclaimed at the beginning of public gatherings and serve to raise awareness—countering the erasure of native cultures. By itself, acknowledgment is a small gesture but may provide movement toward a just and more equitable relationship.

We recognize that the land that we know as St. Louis is the ancestral home of the Osage, Miami, Cahokia, Kaskaskia, Michigamea, Moingwena, Sioux, Peoria, Haudenosaunee (also called Iroquois) people, as well as the Illini Confederacy. The state of Missouri has been home to the Otos, Mississippian, Cherokee, Delaware, Kickapoo, Sac, Fox, and Shawnee, in some cases as the result of forced removal from their traditional lands in other parts of the country. In spite of restrictive

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government policies and involuntary relocations, approximately 80,000 American Indians live in Missouri today.

ID & Birth Certificate Program Updates

Thank you for your ongoing support of the Outreach Program for State ID and birth certificate assistance. Over the past year, even in a pandemic, we were blessed with the opportunity to serve over 3,000 St. Louisans, providing assistance with over 4,800 IDs and birth certificates to individuals and families who are experiencing homelessness or poverty. We believe that the work is never done and the need for vital documents continues to be great.

Our Beyond 2020 campaign has granted us the opportunity to hire for the new role of Mobile Outreach Coordinator within our program. In this role, the Mobile Outreach Coordinator will explore the opportunities to make IDs and birth certificates more accessible in the wider community.

LIGHTWORKS - AN EXPERIENCE OF IGNATIAN PRAYER

LIGHTWORKS is a “light form of work,” a series of limbering up exercises for the spirit. Physical exercises build muscle, increase stamina, and develop flexibility. So **LIGHTWORKS** does for the spirit. These exercises of prayer and reflection, build our relationship with God and help us become more aware of God’s presence in our lives. It consists of weekly group sessions. Participants are given scripture passages or reflections from the Spiritual Exercises of St. Ignatius to pray over each week. These invite us into conversation with God about our lives. Then during the weekly session, there is sharing about these passages and a presentation. LightWorks will be offered on Tuesday evenings starting on Sept 28. There will be 16 sessions with 8 weeks before Thanksgiving and 8 weeks in the new year.
