Reflection from Our Associate Pastor

Fairness, Justice and Mercy

We tend to have an innate sense of fairness and justice. It may not be perfect, but we react when someone is being cheated or treated unfairly...especially when that someone is us.

Jesus helps us to examine that sense of justice with the parable of "The Workers in the Vineyard." Jesus describes a landowner who goes out several times during the day to hire workers. The final group of workers were brought into the vineyard at the end of the day and only worked a short time in comparison to those who worked the entire day.

When it was time to pay the workers, everyone received a full day's wage and those that worked the longest had a strong reaction. That makes sense to us. This seems completely unfair and unjust. We can imagine ourselves as the workers who were there the entire day, or maybe even as those who were there for most of the day. Why should the other workers get as much as us? We might even ask, where were those other workers all day long?

What if, instead, we imagined that we were the workers who came at the end of the day and received the full day's wage? We might be overjoyed, but I think many of us would feel a bit uneasy about the situation. We may not feel worthy of this great gift.

This parable is a great example of how Jesus uses parables to provoke a reaction in us and teach us about the love and mercy of God. We do have a sense of fairness and justice, but we are reminded that God's capacity for justice, mercy, and compassion is beyond our comprehension.

"For my thoughts are not your thoughts, nor are your ways my ways, says the LORD. As high as the heavens are above the earth, so high are my ways above your ways and my thoughts above your thoughts."

In the end, what we receive from God is not based on the amount of work that we put in or our own merits, but on the generous love of God. Thank God for that.

Maureen Hook

I've been a parishioner since: August 1975, when I arrived on the SLU campus. College Church has been my spiritual home for 48 years.

Living my faith: I'm a lector and Eucharistic minister, and chair the Social Connections Commission. Over the years, I've also taught religious education classes, been a cross bearer and sung in the choir.

Why I'm involved: While lots of things in my life have changed, College Church has been a constant bedrock of my faith life. The Jesuits and many parishioners at College Church have been at my side when my husband joined the Church, when my boys were baptized, when my twin sister died. It is the center of many of our family's holiday celebrations.

Throughout this journey, I've made lifelong friendships and have been challenged to stretch and grow – both through the sacramental life of the Church and also through the Social Ministry. I've helped for years with Hot Stuff and Cold Stuff (summer and winter events for the unsheltered that provide food and opportunity to “shop” for clothing), and am involved in the racial justice work of the parish. It is a place where I feel valued as a woman.

Fun facts: I'm a physical therapist and a massage therapist. I teach gross human anatomy at SLU through Adventures in Medicine and Science, a science/anatomy learning provider for students in grade 2 through high school, and their teachers.

LIGHTWORKS - AN EXPERIENCE OF IGNATIAN PRAYER

LIGHTWORKS is a “light form of work,” a series of limbering up exercises for the spirit. Physical exercises build muscle, increase stamina, and develop flexibility. So **LIGHTWORKS** does for the spirit. These exercises of prayer and reflection, build our relationship with God and help us become more aware of God's presence in our lives. It consists of weekly group sessions.

Participants are given scripture passages or reflections from the Spiritual Exercises of St. Ignatius to pray over each week. These invite us into conversation with God about our lives. Then during the weekly session, there is sharing about these passages and a presentation. There are 16 weekly sessions with 8 before Thanksgiving and 8 in the new year. Antiracism at College Church

At College Church, antiracism is an expression of our recognition that all are created in the image of God. As such, we respond—personally and collectively—to the call to identify, and to actively challenge, structures and systems that devalue people on the basis of race, and to practice restoration in the pursuit of justice.



Quinceañera

A *quinceañera* is a celebration of a girl's fifteenth birthday that is traditionally observed in Latin American cultures to mark her transition to

adulthood. The term also refers to the young woman herself who has reached this age. Its origins date back to the 1500s in the Mesoamerican societies of Central and South America. Customs of the indigenous people were blended with the Catholic faith of the Spaniards, creating a ceremony that confirmed a girl's readiness for marriage. Over time, the significance of the event has evolved from a focus solely on marriage to the commencement of adulthood.

The celebration of *quince años* may take many forms, however, there are some characteristics most have in common. Typically, the day begins with a religious service—traditionally that is a Catholic Mass. In addition to her family and godparents, the young woman is accompanied by fifteen young men and women of her choice. The Mass is an expression of gratitude to God for the blessings the family has received and for the life of the young woman. She will receive a special blessing, a Bible, and a rosary indicating the piety expected in her adult life. A bouquet of flowers will be placed at the feet of the statue of the Virgin Mary and the young woman will receive a tiara—symbolizing that she is a daughter of God. These are reminders of her cultural heritage and the importance of her spiritual life.

There are other rituals that express the transition to adulthood. For example, the *quinceañera* may present one of her dolls to a younger sister or relative. She might also pass down a rosary from her First Communion. One of the most enduring traditions is the formal gown worn by the *quinceañera*. Originally the dress would be white or pink, but today many different colors and styles are worn. The design chosen may reflect the family's cultural heritage and include colorful patterns. Of course, after Mass there is a fiesta that will likely include dinner, music, and dancing.

Preparation for a *quinceañera* celebration involves more

than party planning. It is an expectation of the Catholic Church that the young woman has received the Sacraments of Initiation—Baptism, First Communion, and Confirmation—or is preparing to do so. The Archdiocese of St. Louis also offers a day-long retreat to help the young person reflect on the meaning of this event in her life and her new roles within her culture, her family, and her church.

The celebration of *quinceañera* is also viewed as an affirmation of the gift of women as a blessing to the Church. In the Hispanic community, it is traditionally women who hand on the faith—organizing feast days, creating the family altar within the home, and offering prayers for the living and the dead. The blessing of the *Quince Años* recognizes this historic role of women as evangelizers and teachers of faith.

Yom Kippur – Jewish Day of Atonement

For ten days after Rosh Hashanah, Jews reflect on their lives over the past year. They believe that God keeps something like a “book of life” for each person and enters judgments into those books. So each person spends Yom Kippur atoning for their sins because when that day ends those books are sealed. Thus, Yom Kippur is the last chance to change God's judgment by repentance and making amends. Together, Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur are known as the Jewish High Holy Days.

Even Jews who do not observe other religious customs take Yom Kippur seriously. No work is allowed on Yom Kippur. Jews also fast from food and drink from sunset when Yom Kippur begins (this year Sept. 24) until nightfall when it ends (Sept. 25). In addition, the Talmud prohibits other activities such as anointing one's body with cosmetics, wearing leather, or engaging in sexual relations. People often wear white all day, a reminder that our sins “shall be made white as snow” (Is. 1:18).

Much of the holiday is spent at the synagogue. Services begin in the morning and continue until about 3 PM. People return for evening services that continue until nightfall. In the service that begins Yom Kippur Jews ask God to annul all personal vows made such as “If I

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pass this test, I'll pray every day for 6 months!" This is because Jews consider themselves bound to such vows even if made under duress.

Most important is the confession of the community's sins, emphasizing communal responsibility for sin. This confession has two parts: a general list (we have been aggressive, slanderous...), and a specific list (for sin committed willingly, or by acting callously...) Most sins mentioned involve speech which Jews consider very serious (offensive speech, slander, etc.). There's also a catch-all confession: "Forgive us the breach of positive commands and negative commands, whether or not they involve an act, whether or not they are known to us."

The day's final service lasts about an hour. The ark where the Torah is kept is open throughout, thus participants stand the whole time. This service is referred to as "the closing of the gates" because it is the last chance to get in a good word before the holiday ends. The service concludes with a very long blast of the shofar, followed by a sense of relief, and joyous singing and dancing. — *Source: Judaism 101 website*

Significant Figures in Racial History This Week

Althea Gibson – Died September 28, 2003, in East Orange, NJ. In 1956, Gibson became the first African American to win a Grand Slam tennis title. The following two years she won Wimbledon and the US Nationals and was named Female Athlete of the Year by the Associated Press. In total, she won 11 Grand Slam tournaments, both singles and doubles. In the 1960s she was the first Black competitor on the Women's Professional Golf Tour.

Gwendolyn (Gwen) Ifill – Born September 29, 1955, in New York. Ifill was a journalist and political analyst. She became the first African American woman to host a nationally televised public affairs program: *Washington Week in Review*, on PBS. She also co-anchored the PBS *NewsHour* from 2013 until her death. She served on several Boards of Directors and authored a best-selling book, "The Breakthrough: Politics and Race in the Age of Obama." Ifill died of cancer in 2016 at age 61.

Identity = Dignity

Thank you to everyone who participated in the recent “Identity = Dignity” presentation sponsored by the College Church Advocacy Committee. Participants were invited to walk with “two feet of love in action”, recognizing the of both providing direct assistance and seeking systemic solutions to issues of identification access.



First, volunteers from the College Church Birth Certificate and ID program shared a story with those sitting at their table highlighting the barriers to getting official identification faced by guests of the program. Guests of the Birth Certificate and/ID program face hurdles such as a lack of permanent address, funds, transportation, and more. Guests come from a variety of backgrounds and are sometimes unhoused, recently incarcerated, survivors of intimate partner violence, or facing other challenges. Without official identification documents employment, housing, social services and medical care are out of reach.



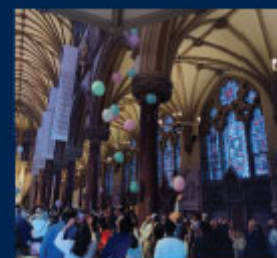
The second element of the “Identity=Dignity” presentation was an overview of College Church’s Advocacy Committee which works on systemic issues that marginalized individuals face in obtaining documents for identification. The program ended with a Call to Action to join in this dignity centered work. Pledge cards were handed out that listed nine possible action opportunities for attendees to indicate their commitment to putting their own two feet of love into action. Lights Out to Save Birds by Stephanie Todd
(reprinted <https://www.sierraclub.org/missouri/eastern-missouri>) Every year millions of birds die during migration due to artificial lights. Most birds migrate at night to save energy and avoid predators, using the moon and stars to navigate. Artificial lights disorient birds and cause them to circle lights until they die from exhaustion or hit something, like a building. St. Louis is the 5th deadliest city for birds during spring migration and 6th for fall Migration. You can help save birds! Turn off outdoor lights during peak migration periods, September and May. If you must have lights on, mitigate their detrimental effects by shielding them so they do not shine up into the sky and turn them off by 11:00 pm.
