St. Peter Claver Parish Updates

Update on our Sister Parish St. Peter Claver in Punta Gorda, Belize, Fr. Matt Ruhl, S.J., pastor.

St. Peter Claver, our sister parish, is a Roman Catholic Church located in Punta Gorda, Belize. The Jesuits at St. Peter Claver minister to the town of Punta Gorda and 36 villages with Catholic Churches in the Toledo District of Belize.

Capital Improvements: In recent months, St. Peter Claver demolished four old derelict school buildings on their property in Punta Gorda. With the assistance of parishioners, they planted trees and flowers,



created gardens around the primary school campus, and erected fencing. An outdoor basketball court was also constructed for the school children, which will be available for use once the pandemic is under control in the community. The next big undertaking is a sea wall that has become necessary to protect the parish center, church, and school buildings from rising sea levels. The staff at St. Peter Claver is working on obtaining grants to help with the estimated cost of \$86,000. They hope to have the sea wall in place by July to prevent flood damage and the loss of

property.

Food Bank / Church Ministries: Given an increase in food insecurity in the parish as a direct result of the pandemic, St. Peter Claver, in conjunction with their emergency food bank, recently established a St. Vincent DePaul Society, which current feeds 100 families per month. St. Peter Claver is also excited to welcome two Sisters of Charity this summer to help with parish ministries. St. Peter Claver's music ministry is also proud to report it has established a Mass Choir, which will be fully active once Covid-19 regulations permit. Parishioners are back to Mass-in-person following pandemic protocols.



Partnership with St. John's College: St. Peter Claver and St. John's Community College (SIC) in Belize City have initiated a collaborative agreement to bring some higher education classes to Punta Gorda and Corazon communities. The goal is not to rely heavily on online courses since many of the parishioners do not have adequate Internet access or access to technology in the home, but to establish satellite campus with in-person education. The long-term goal is to have fully functional satellite campuses in both Punta Gorda and the Village of Corazon.

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Belize Church-State Relationship: St. Peter Claver Parish depends heavily on financial support from Jesuit communities and donors. Because of the pandemic, they have lost over \$200,000 in revenue. Despite this significant loss, St. Peter Claver has worked hard to ensure there would be no layoffs or salary reductions for their 17 parish employees. To the frustration of Fr. Matt, St. Peter Claver primary school has experienced teacher layoffs and pay reductions in an administrative structure that does not provide school staff with health insurance. School administration is the responsibility of the government of Belize, even though





the school is Catholic. Unlike the U.S., there is a partnership between religious organizations and

the State to provide primary education, where the state retains control over school administration. Fr. Matt has put together "a very bright and exuberant committee that is investigating other options to this church-state educational system which quite frankly does not work for us."

Parish primary school children. High Schools in Belize are not supported by the government so high schools charge tuition. Because of this, most students are forced to end their education at 8th grade.

Deadline for sponsoring a sister parish child for high school is Sunday, May 23rd for the 2021-2022 school year. It roughly costs \$225 a year with a 4-year commitment for a high school education in Belize. For more information, contact Lisa DeLorenzo at lisa.c.delorenzo@gmail.com.
