FROM THE PASTOR’S DESK



Today is the 100th anniversary of the end of World War I. That catastrophic conflict may well be the most significant event of the recent past. The death and destruction of the war was bad enough, but the consequences echoed through much of horrors of the last century. The so-called “War to end all wars” did nothing of the sort.

The observation of Veteran’s Day is linked to November 11th. It is a sobering day for all of us. Not only to honor all those who have served on our behalf, but to consider seriously what it means for us who make the decision to send our young men and women into harm’s way.

Whatever one’s thoughts on last week’s election results, it is clear the pursuit of peace remains peripheral, at best, in the United States. We continue to bluster about toughness, projecting power, national security, protecting American interests, and so on. There is bi-partisan consensus that not only the threat, but the actual use of force is integral to our country’s well-being.

I can think of no greater counter-cultural notion than the belief that violence only begets violence, and hatred is overcome with love. Yet, that is the heart of the Christian faith. Our culture derides those who seek peace as out of touch, naïve, and un-American. Jesus calls peacemakers something else, children of God.

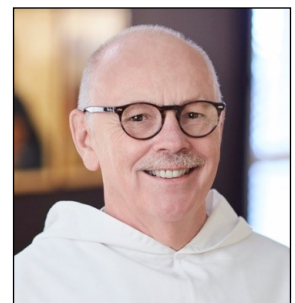
**Health Care, Eschatology

Statistics tell us that the vast majority of us will know that we are dying...sometimes years in advance. While certain practical things – such as legal matters and advance directives – are important, what about the spiritual dimension of death? Is there a way to prepare for death? What would a “happy death”, an idea deeply etched in Catholic spirituality and devotion to St. Joseph, look like in the midst of many high-tech treatment options? Is the Church helping us to die well? What will the next life be like? Can the happy death be an answer to assisted suicide and euthanasia?

Fr. Bouchard will describe some of the history of the happy death and lead a discussion about how to prepare for one today.

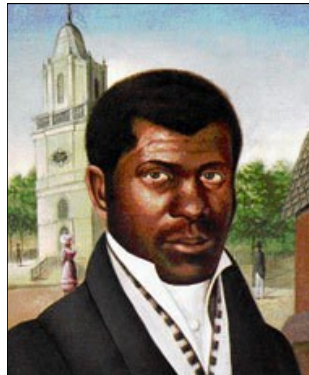
November is Black Catholic History Month

November is Black Catholic History Month



In 1990 the National Black Catholic Clergy Caucus of the United States designated November as Black Catholic History Month to recognize the long history and proud heritage of black Catholics. We are provided an opportunity to reflect on the contributions of many black saints and leaders who served our church from its earliest days. This year, we invite you to consider the lives and contributions of African American Catholics who are currently under consideration for sainthood. Reflect on blessings they shared with their communities and the inspiration they offer to us today.

Venerable Pierre Toussaint



Venerable Pierre Toussaint (1766-1853) was born a slave in Haiti and died a freeman in New York City. He is credited by many with being the father of Catholic Charities in New York. Pierre was instrumental in raising funds for the first Catholic orphanage and began the city's first school for black children. He also helped to provide funds for the Oblate Sisters of Providence, a religious community of black nuns founded in Baltimore and played a vital role in providing resources to erect Old Saint Patrick's Cathedral in Lower Manhattan. During a Yellow Fever epidemic when many of the city's political leaders fled the city in search of healthier rural climates, Pierre Toussaint cared for the sick and the dying. He was a successful entrepreneur, who did not hesitate to share the fruits of his labor with others. In recognition of Pierre Toussaint's virtuous life, the late Cardinal Cooke introduced Pierre's cause for canonization at the Vatican in 1968. In December 1989, the late Cardinal O'Connor had the remains of Pierre Toussaint transferred from Lower Manhattan to St. Patrick's Cathedral in midtown Manhattan where he is buried as the only lay person, alongside the former Cardinal-Archbishops of New York City. On December 17, 1997, Pope John Paul II declared Pierre Toussaint, Venerable, thus placing him firmly on the road to becoming North America's first black saint. Venerable Pierre Toussaint was a man who was proud of his faith, proud of his culture and committed to serving others.

Lord God, source of love and compassion, we praise and honor You for the virtuous and charitable life of our brother in Christ, Venerable Pierre Toussaint.
