FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

A national day of Thanksgiving is the work of two great Americans: one you know and one you should.

Abraham Lincoln in 1863 proclaimed the last Thursday in November to be a national day of giving thanks and seeking God's mercy. However, this event only came about through the tireless efforts of one Sarah J. Hale.



Sarah Hale is one of the remarkable figures of 19th century America. She was an editor, writer, promoter of women's education, and poet. In fact, Sarah Hale wrote "Mary Had a Little Lamb!" She became one of the most influential women in America as editor for forty years of *Godey's Lady Book*. The magazine combined serious literary works (Nathaniel Hawthorne was a contributor), domestic wisdom for women, and advocacy for their education. She used her position to become the arbiter of taste for middle-class women. Sarah Hale has been described as "both the Oprah and Martha Stewart of the 1800's."

Among her many passions was a national Thanksgiving Day. Particular areas of the country, especially New England, had their own but nothing on a nation-wide scale. Sarah Hale petitioned numerous presidents for seventeen long years before Lincoln formally established Thanksgiving Day. It has become now our most beloved holiday, and a day deeply ingrained in our national consciousness. We owe it all to a true American patriot, Sarah Hale.

COMMEMORATION OF THE FAITHFUL DEPARTED

Each year, the church remembers all who have died and gone before us during the month of November. While there is a book to remember the departed at the shrine of St. Joseph throughout the year, during November it is moved to near the cross on the altar platform. The names of those listed in the book will be remembered in our prayers at the weekend liturgies.

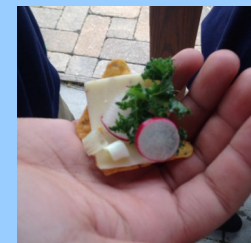

and ask

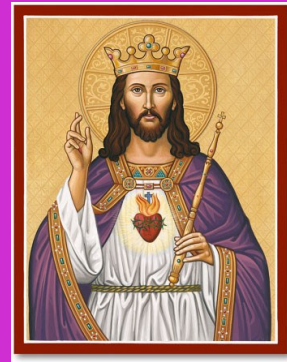
God to continue to bless us.

LITURGICAL CORNER

Next Sunday's Solemnity of Christ the King comes as a fitting climax to the church's liturgical year. It was added to the liturgical calendar by Pius XI in 1925. In an era of nationalism and international turmoil, it serves as a reminder that our allegiance is first and foremost to the King of the Universe, who governs with justice and mercy.



In the coming season of Advent we will recall that Christ came 2000 years ago as a babe, and will return in glory at the end times. But we also remember that he is present with us **now**. Rather than being a king who desires triumphalism and slavish adoration, our king is humble and loving and eternally interested in each one of us. We honor Christ the King best by recognizing and serving him in others. No greater honor can be given him than our loving care and concern for our brothers and sisters, especially the poorest and most oppressed.

Liturgically, since this is a solemnity, we will use **incense** throughout the mass. Incense, through its smoke and fragrance, is a visible sign to us of our prayers arising before our God. Historically it was used to indicate and honor the presence of the Divine. We incense the altar and the gifts, the Gospel book, and the presider, all bearers of divinity. And we also incense the assembly, a powerful acknowledgement that **each of us is a God-bearer, a temple of the Spirit.**

NOVEMBER IS BLACK CATHOLIC HISTORY MONTH



In 1990 the National Black Catholic Clergy Caucus of the United States designated November as Black Catholic History Month in order to recognize the long history and proud heritage of black Catholics. We are provided an opportunity to reflect on the contributions of many black saints and leaders who served our church from its earliest days. While a more recent history of the Catholic church includes a legacy of slavery and segregation, and our experience is more often one of separation than unity, this month we can celebrate some of the mystics, monastics and martyrs that helped to make our church holy, catholic and apostolic.

Weekly Highlight: Sr. Thea Bowman

Born in Yazoo City, Mississippi and raised in the Methodist church, Sr. Thea Bowman became Catholic when she was nine years old. She later went to college and then became the first African American to join the Franciscan Sisters of Perpetual Adoration in Wisconsin. Gifted with a brilliant mind, beautiful voice and a dynamic personality, Sister Thea shared the message of God's love through a teaching career. After 16 years of teaching at the elementary, secondary and university levels, the bishop of Jackson, Mississippi invited her to become the consultant for intercultural awareness. She gave presentations around the country aimed at bridging racial and cultural divisions. She encouraged people to communicate with one another so that they could understand other cultures and races. She combined her gifts of singing and gospel preaching with prayers and storytelling. Sr. Thea Bowman was diagnosed with bone cancer in 1984, yet she continued her work against the evils that drive people apart until her death in 1990. Sr. Thea wrote, *"I found peace in praying for what my folks call "God's perfect will." As it evolved, my prayer has become, "Lord, let me live until I die.: By that I mean I want to live, love, and serve fully until death comes. If that prayer is answered...how long really doesn't matter.*

SLU PARKING UPDATES

SLU has started a new system in its parking garages. **Folks attending mass at College Church on Saturday afternoon and Sunday will still have free access to the LACLEDE parking garage.** Here are the new parking instructions:

- Saturday evening Mass 5:15 - SLU will issue "no value" tickets at Laclede Garage from 4:30 pm - 5:45 pm. This means that anyone who pulls into Laclede Garage during this timeframe will pull a ticket upon entrance; however, it will be of no value. When they exit, they will put the ticket back in, and the gate will go up - No Charge
- Sunday - Entrance gate will remain down, exit gate will be up from 8:30 am-11:00 pm.
- Spring and Lindell (northeast corner) parking lot will still be available on Sundays.
- Weekday Volunteers - Parking and Card Services will issue complimentary parking pass stickers to the College Church parish center. The volunteer will need to bring their entry ticket into the parish center with them to put a sticker on it. The sticker needs to be placed in the space provided.

Attention Missouri Birth Parents and Adoptees!

Missouri adoption law is changing!

On January 1, 2018 adult adoptees (ages 18 and older) will be granted access to their original birth certificate. Birth parents have the right to protect their confidentiality under the new law, but they must act before January 1.
