### FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

One of the prominent themes in the Gospels is Jesus the healer. The Evangelists depict again and again Christ's ministry towards the sick and suffering. Even his opponents acknowledged the power he exercised to cure all kinds of infirmities.

Physical ailment in first century Palestine was not simply a matter of being lame or blind. The human person was seen as one, spiritual and physical. Just as important, an individual was intimately embedded into a communal network of relations. Thus, when illness occurs it is a spiritual conflict as well as physical, and it has enormous repercussions for communal ties. Sickness, in whatever form, was a profound experience of separation.

Jesus' power is directed to the whole person, not just fixing the physical problem. Faith is essential to the encounter with Him. The Gospel's stories recount not only the person's restoration to health, but also to the wider community. The person is healed and made whole in every way. That is why the healing Christ brings is so much connected to the inauguration of God's Kingdom. Healing is symbolic of God's definitive in-breaking into all creation through Jesus Christ.

Our celebration of anointing the sick is an expression of this belief. Illness, separation, and suffering are not the last word.

### **Anointing of the Sick**

The Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick will take place this weekend at the 5:30, 8:00 and 10:30 Masses. The special graces of God in the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick can have these effects in those who open their hearts to God's healing power:

- uniting of the sick person to Jesus in his sufferings
- strengthening, peace, and courage to endure the sufferings of illness or old age
- forgiveness of sins if the person has the need
- possible restoration of health
- the loving support and comfort of the community

Following the homily, the assembly prays for those to be anointed. Those who are near them can hold their hand or place a hand on their shoulder during the prayer. The priests will then come down the aisles to anoint those who wish to receive the sacrament. Please stay at your pew. Those who are able should step out into the aisle next to their pew. Those who are unable to stand may remain in their seat and raise a hand as the priest comes down the aisle.

You will be anointed on your forehead and the palms of your hands with the words:

Through this holy anointing may the Lord in his love and mercy help you with the grace of the Holy Spirit.

Res: Amen

May the Lord who frees you from sin, save you and raise you up.

Res: Amen

Blest are they who have not seen

# The Love of Christ Impels Us: Becoming an Anti-Racist Parish

#### What is anti-racism?

Racial prejudice usually means a belief that some racial groups are better or worse than others. Structural racism describes the ways in which our institutions and structures create and maintain racial inequalities. **Anti-racism** goes beyond simply avoiding racism, and is an effort to oppose and dismantle racism and to promote racial equity.

### Why is College Church talking about anti-racism?

College Church has a long history of commitment to justice and racial equity. More recently, since 2014 and the Ferguson uprising, we as a parish have been asking ourselves some hard questions about our role in racial inequality. In addition, the USCCB recently released its pastoral letter against racism, which explains how the work of anti-racism is deeply rooted in our Catholic faith.

### What anti-racism work has College Church been doing?

Since June, parishioners and staff representatives have been meeting monthly as the College Church Anti-Racism Leadership Team. We hope to create a focused vision and mission for our parish to become an anti-racist institution. That means we want to be working purposefully to oppose racism and create racial equity: within ourselves as individuals, within our parish as a community, and within our city. We are asking: How can College Church increase our commitment to dismantle racism? How can we grow in our understanding of racism and inequality? What would College Church look and feel like if our intentional identity was that of a truly anti-racist institution?

### How are we doing this work?

We have connected with Crossroads, an organization based in the Midwest that helps religious communities and secular organizations learn how to do the work of anti-racism. Their vision is that *Racism dehumanizes* us all —Dismantling racism heals us all. Their method is to help organizations transform themselves, thereby transforming their communities. The Leadership Team attended a full-day training with Crossroads and has been using their tools to conduct focus groups within already established commissions and ministries within our Parish.

### What is next? The Leadership Team needs to hear from you!

We will conduct focus groups in February throughout our parish community. We hope all members of College Church will participate. We need to hear what you think about the current status of racism in our city and country and why—and how much— it matters that the Church, and College Church in particular, address issues of racial justice. Our team has been evolving and is still very much in the beginning stages of this work. We acknowledge that our current team lacks gender and racial diversity, as it is mostly female and mostly white. # The Book of JOY

## The Parish Book Choice for Lent is *The Book of Joy*, by the Dalai Lama and Bishop Desmond Tutu.

Nobel Peace Prize Laureates His Holiness the Dalai Lama and Archbishop Desmond Tutu have survived more than fifty years of exile and the soul-crushing violence of oppression. Despite their hardships—or, as they would say, because of them—they are two of the most joyful people on the planet.

In April 2015, Archbishop Tutu traveled to the Dalai Lama's home in Dharamsala, India, to celebrate His Holiness's eightieth birthday and to create what they hoped would be a gift for

others. They looked back on their long lives to answer a single burning question: How do we find joy in the face of life's inevitable suffering?

During a week filled with laughter and tears, they traded intimate stories, teased each other, and shared their spiritual practices. The result is the gift of this book, where these two global heroes, who have stared into the abyss and despair of our times, reveal how they have learned to live a life brimming with joy. The Book of Joy was a unanimous hit with the SFX Lenten Book committee, and we believe it is a spiritual feast that will inspire personal reflection and stimulate lively discussions among the book groups that are formed every year in the parish community during lent.
