FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK



It is not my usual tactic to command parishioners to do anything. To-day I feel compelled to make an exception. Run, don't walk, to the Ruth Asawa: Life's Work exhibit at the Pulitzer Museum. It is one of the most enchanting, delightful collections of art I have ever seen. In fact, the Washington Post art critic described it as "the most beautiful show of 2018." Yep, right here in River City and two blocks from College Church.

The philosophy and aesthetics of beauty are an important part of the Church's tradition. Christians, influenced heavily by the ancient Greeks, believe beauty can help us better understand God and all of creation. Our embrace of painting, architecture, and other artistic expressions have had a powerful impact on the faithful from our beginnings. For instance, the beauty of sacred music has for centuries drawn Christians deeper into relationship with God.

The physical space of College Church is a perfect example of how our prayer is facilitated by our surroundings. I often say (only half-joking) if a parishioner gets bored during my homily, just soak in the beauty all around you. What is delightful and pleasing to the eye can often touch us in ways words cannot.

All that is beautiful is a reflection of God. Even a "secular" exhibit like Ruth Asawa's speaks to the transcendent, and our human desire to encounter it. So go, and go soon as it ends February 16th.

The Love of Christ Impels Us: Becoming an Anti-Racist Parish

What is anti-racism?

Racial prejudice usually means a belief that some racial groups are better or worse than others. Structural racism describes the ways in which our institutions and structures create and maintain racial inequalities. **Anti-racism** goes beyond simply avoiding racism, and is an effort to oppose and dismantle racism and to promote racial equity.

Why is College Church talking about anti-racism?

College Church has a long history of commitment to justice and racial equity. More recently, since 2014 and the Ferguson uprising, we as a parish have been asking ourselves some hard questions about our role in racial inequality. In addition, the USCCB recently released its pastoral letter against racism, which explains how the work of anti-racism is deeply rooted in our Catholic faith.

What anti-racism work has College Church been doing?

Since June, parishioners and staff representatives have been meeting monthly as the College Church Anti-Racism Leadership Team. We hope to create a focused vision and mission for our parish to become an anti-racist institution. That means we want to be working purposefully to oppose racism and create racial equity: within ourselves as individuals, within our parish as a community, and within our city. We are asking: How can College Church increase our commitment to dismantle racism? How can we grow in our understanding of racism and inequality? What would College Church look and feel like if our intentional identity was that of a truly anti-racist institution?

How are we doing this work?

We have connected with Crossroads, an organization based in the Midwest that helps religious communities and secular organizations learn how to do the work of anti-racism. Their vision is that *Racism dehumanizes* us all—Dismantling racism heals us all. Their method is to help organizations transform themselves, thereby transforming their communities. The Leadership Team attended a full-day training with Crossroads and has been using their tools to conduct focus groups within already established commissions and ministries within our Parish.

What is next? The Leadership Team needs to hear from you!

We will conduct focus groups in February throughout our parish community. We hope all members of College Church will participate. We need to hear what you think about the current status of racism in our city and country and why—and how much— it matters that the Church, and College Church in particular, address issues of racial justice. Once we understand our parish's responses to these questions, we can move forward together. **PLEASE SIGN UP TO BE PART OF A FOCUS GROUP IN THE BACK OF**

The sacrament of the anointing of the sick continues the healing ministry of Jesus in offering strength, healing and hope to all who are sick, preparing for surgery, or experiencing the diminishment of old age. It is available individually throughout the year to anyone who is in need. Each fall and spring College Church celebrates it communally.

Next weekend, Feb 9-10, the sacrament will be offered at each mass after the homily to all who wish to receive it. In this sacrament, Christ's love and compassion is expressed in a tangible way; the connection to and support of the Christian community is reaffirmed; and prayer for healing, strength and peace is offered. The community prays for those to be anointed, and then the priests anoint their foreheads and the palms of their hands with the words: *Through this holy anointing may the Lord in his love and mercy help you with the grace of the Holy Spirit. Amen. May the Lord who frees you from sin, save you and raise you up. Amen.*




White House Retreat
