### FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

St. Patrick is found about 100 feet up on our steeple. He is facing north and is paired with St. Ignatius Loyola, which I think is nice. He is a reminder that College Church was founded to serve the Irish

The great Irish Diaspora is found everywhere in the English-speaking world: Canada, England, Australia, and in the U.S. The Irish fled famine, conflict, wretched poverty, persecution, and bleak prospects. They sought a better future for themselves and their children. In this country, they became cops, politicians, railroad builders, priests and women religious. Some even became farmers like my ancestors in lowa.

They were not welcomed with open arms. The Irish faced discrimination, suspicion, and bigotry. Yet, now it is difficult to imagine this country, and certainly the Church in America, without the presence of the Irish.

Given that history, it seems if there is one group in this country that should appreciate the plight of migrants and refugees it is Irish-Americans. Yes, people of good will can differ on policies. However, it is a cruel irony to celebrate the challenges and triumphs of the Irish in this country while denying that opportunity to others.

Last Sunday Moses told the Israelites that they could enjoy the Promised Land only by remembering what God had done for them. The memory of God's generosity and grace in the past shapes how we are to live today.

# The Parish Book Choice for Lent is *The Book of Joy*, by the Dalai Lama and Bishop Desmond Tutu.

Nobel Peace Prize Laureates His Holiness the Dalai Lama and Archbishop Desmond Tutu have survived more than fifty years of exile and the soul-crushing violence of oppression. Despite their hardships—or, as they would say, because of them—they are two of the most joyful people on the planet.

In April 2015, Archbishop Tutu traveled to the Dalai Lama's home in India, to celebrate His Holiness's eightieth birthday and to create what they hoped would be a gift for others. The result is this book, where these two global heroes, who have stared into the abyss and despair of our times, reveal how they have learned to live a life brimming with joy.

The book will be available after Sunday morning Masses for the next few weeks or copies can be reserved for pickup at other times. The price of the book is \$19.00.

We need to hear what you think about the current status of racism in our city and country and why—and how much— it matters that the Church, and College Church in particular, address issues of racial justice. Once we understand our parish's responses to these questions, we can move forward together. ### Being Mortal—A Pastoral Care Committee Presentation

The film **Being Mortal** (58 minutes) will be shown by the Pastoral Care committee on April 7 after the 10:30 am Mass in the ballroom. It will be followed by comments from a panel and audience participation. Death is something we will all one day face. So why is it so hard for doctors to talk with their patients about dying? How can the medical profession better help people navigate the final chapters of their lives with confidence, direction and purpose? Renowned surgeon Atul Gawande explores the relationships between doctors and patients nearing the end of life, and shows how many doctors struggle to talk honestly and openly with their patients who are dying. **Being Mortal** is an intimate and revealing journey with relevance to all of us. It explores the burgeoning art and science of palliative care and the ways in which having a conversation around the question "What are your priorities if your time is limited?" can empower patients to experience the end stages of life and live their lives fully. The ultimate goal is not a good death but a good life — all the way to the very end.

Our current SMC chair, Christina Ryan, shares her reflections here: "Participation on the Commission has been such a beneficial experience. I have had the opportunity to work with the Director of Social Ministry Christine Dragonette and to be inspired by my fellow parishioners. I currently serve as the Chairperson of the Commission and represent the commission at Pastoral Council meetings, which is another fascinating avenue to learn more about College Church. I have also become a member of the Anti-Racism Leadership Team. These groups and my own reading on social justice topics have opened my eyes to my individual racism and how I'm complicit in systemic racism. Once one knows such truth, it is impossible to unsee it; one must face it, stare it down, and strive and pray to shrink it. As a full-time mom to a busy 4-year-old son and I-year-old daughter, I thoughtfully choose the volunteer opportunities to which I give my time. My partici-



pation in Social Ministry at College Church has been worth every second. It's a cliché to say that I have received more than what I have given, but it's fitting for this situation. It's easy to tell myself I am not doing enough, giving enough, or being enough to help solve enormous problems like racism, but I also frequently turn to this quote: Not all of us can do great things. But we can do small things with great love." Joining the Commission two years ago was a "small thing" that I could do, and I hope some of you will consider joining us in the work, too."

# SPOTLIGHT ON STEWARDSHIP

**Aimee Wittman** and **Scott Jarboe** and their three children have been parishioners for five years. They have become very involved in the community. Last fall they gave the parish a significant monetary gift to support work that they see as important and to invite other families and parishioners to do the same. Here is a little bit of their story.

#### What drew you to College Church?

"We connected with the SFX College Church when our oldest child, Luke, was ready to begin his formal religious education experience. Aimee's parents attended SFX College Church at the time and suggested that we explore the RE program at the College Church. We registered for RE, joined the parish, and soon fell in love with this community. We have now been members of the parish for five years along with our three children (Luke, age 12; Elizabeth, age 6; and Katherine, age 4) who participate in our Religious Education and Catechesis of the Good Shephard programs."

#### How have you engaged with this community?

"There are so many wonderful ways to engage with the College Church. When we first joined the parish we spent some time simply attending the beautiful liturgies and participating in RE. Our youngest child, Katherine, was also baptized here by Fr. Dan. Because we have three young children, our initial connection and community grew out of the Religious Education program. Aimee was invited to join the Youth Faith Commission and now serves as the chair of that Commission. Through Religious Education we have participated in many of our cherished RE celebrations including the Class Masses, Service Sunday programs, the RE Family Mass and Picnic, the Christmas Tableau, and the Easter Sunday Mass. We are also fed by the many faith formation experiences available including the Sunday Speaker Series and our many opportunities for prayer and reflection. We also love our annual Gala and Trivia Night events! Finally, and most importantly, we have developed friendships and relationships with many of the wonderful people in this community which has been a great blessing to our family."

#### Having worked so closely with the youth faith commission and our RE directors, what have you experienced as the most important values or characteristics of the program?

"Many of you likely know Angie Doerr, our former Director of Religious Education. Angie often said that our primary goal in youth faith formation is to help our children fall in love with God. This has always resonated with us. The leadership of our RE program seeks to reach this goal by designing and delivering a religious education curriculum that is engaging and dynamic. We want our students to enjoy participating in their Religious Education experience so they have an opportunity to learn, practice, and experience their Catholic faith. Our program also tries to teach to and live out our commitment to social justice through education and participation in service, specifically with our Service Days. This is an exciting time to be engaged with our program as we are also exploring how we can integrate into the religious education program the parish's anti-racism focus and our identity as a Jesuit parish in the City of St. Louis. Finally, we are also incredibly blessed to have a team of amazing volunteers who serve as our Religious Education catechists and teachers. They are the heart of our program and we are so grateful for their gifts of time and talent in support of this ministry."

#### Do you have any words of advice for fellow parishioners about getting involved at SFX?

"We each have an important role to play in living out the work of our parish. Our parish and our community need the unique gifts and talents we all bring to contribute to the good work that is happening at SFX College Church. This is an exciting time to be involved -- there are so many opportunities to engage and participate as our parish continues to grow, evolve, and serve the people of our parish and our greater St. Louis community."



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
