FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

Lent is almost upon us. The origins of the season and its spiritual themes are complicated. There is little agreement, even among liturgical scholars, in regards to how exactly the Church came to celebrate this season.

Most experts trace the beginnings to three different observances in the early Church. Most ancient was a forty day fast begun in Egypt that became the preparation for celebrating the feast of Easter. A bit later the fourth and fifth centuries witnessed the golden age of the catechumenate (the formation period before baptism) that climaxed in the celebration of the sacraments of initiation at the Easter vigil. Lastly, the time before Easter was the final period of penance for those being reconciled formally in the Church.

The mixture of these three distinct practices blended together into the thick gumbo of liturgical themes we know as Lent. What they have in common, however, is Easter. The Resurrection of the Lord is the focal point of these various actions. Lent serves to prepare the Christian people to once more share in the Paschal Mystery, the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ.

Seeking forgiveness, penance and fasting, and the welcoming of new members are how we ready ourselves to encounter the Risen Lord. They are not ends in and of themselves. The forty days of Lent allow our hearts and minds to be formed anew in order to celebrate Christ's new life.

More recently, since 2014 and the Ferguson uprising, we as a parish have been asking ourselves some hard questions about our role in racial inequality. In addition, the USCCB recently released its pastoral letter against racism, which explains how the work of anti-racism is deeply rooted in our Catholic faith.

In February College Church began conducting focus groups throughout our parish community. **We have added one more date: Sunday, March 24th from 9:15-10:20am.** We hope you will participate. We need to hear what you think about the current status of racism in our city and country and why—and how much—it matters that the Church, and College Church in particular, address issues of racial justice. 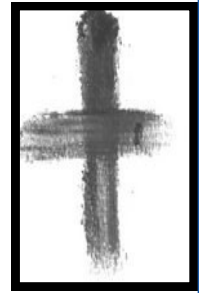

Lenten Directives

Jesus said, "Whoever wishes to be my follower must deny his very self, take up his cross each day and follow in my steps." (Lk 9:23)

The Church has consistently helped us fulfill these words of Jesus by prescribing penitential practices for all Catholics. The American Bishops have called us to **fast and abstain** during Lent.



Fasting is a sign of our complete dependence upon God. God is the source of our life; fasting helps us show our reliance upon God rather than food and ourselves. Ash Wednesday (March 6) and Good Friday (April 19) are days of fasting for those ages 18-59. Fasting means one full meal a day, with two smaller meals and nothing between meals (liquids are permitted). Our common fasting manifests our collective commitment to place God first in our lives.

Abstinence from meat invites us to join the poor of the world in eating simply. As Jesus emptied himself and shared in the poverty of the human condition, we are asked to embrace the poverty of those who have only subsistence diets. **Ash Wednesday and all Fridays in Lent** are days of abstinence. All who are age 14 and older, unless there is a serious health problem, are asked to share in this discipline.

In addition to these shared practices, everyone is encouraged to find ways during Lent to draw closer to God through **prayer and spiritual practices**. Consider being part of one of our Lenten book discussion groups, and embracing the daily practice of praying the Examen as ways to deepen your relationship with God and with others in Christ's Body.

SPOTLIGHT ON STEWARDSHIP

Aimee Wittman and Scott Jarboe and their three children have been parishioners for five years. They have become very involved in the community. Last fall they gave the parish a significant monetary gift to support work that they see as important and to invite other families and parishioners to do the same. Here is a little bit of their story.

What drew you to College Church?

“We connected with the SFX College Church when our oldest child, Luke, was ready to begin his formal religious education experience. Aimee’s parents attended SFX College Church at the time and suggested that we explore the RE program at the College Church. We registered for RE, joined the parish, and soon fell in love with this community. We have now been members of the parish for five years along with our three children (Luke, age 12; Elizabeth, age 6; and Katherine, age 4) who participate in our Religious Education and Catechesis of the Good Shephard programs.”

How have you engaged with this community?

“There are so many wonderful ways to engage with the College Church. When we first joined the parish we spent some time simply attending the beautiful liturgies and participating in RE. Our youngest child, Katherine, was also baptized here by Fr. Dan. Because we have three young children, our initial connection and community grew out of the Religious Education program. Aimee was invited to join the Youth Faith Commission and now serves as the chair of that Commission. Through Religious Education we have participated in many of our cherished RE celebrations including the Class Masses, Service Sunday programs, the RE Family Mass and Picnic, the Christmas Tableau, and the Easter Sunday Mass. We are also fed by the many faith formation experiences available including the Sunday Speaker Series and our many opportunities for prayer and reflection. We also love our annual Gala and Trivia Night events! Finally, and most importantly, we have developed friendships and relationships with many of the wonderful people in this community which has been a great blessing to our family.”

Having worked so closely with the youth faith commission and our RE directors, what have you experienced as the most important values or characteristics of the program?

“Many of you likely know Angie Doerr, our former Director of Religious Education. Angie often said that our primary goal in youth faith formation is to help our children fall in love with God. This has always resonated with us. The leadership of our RE program seeks to reach this goal by designing and delivering a religious education

curriculum that is engaging and dynamic. We want our students to enjoy participating in their Religious Education experience so they have an opportunity to learn, practice, and experience their Catholic faith. Our program also tries to teach to and live out our commitment to social justice through education and participation in service, specifically with our Service Days. This is an exciting time to be engaged with our program as we are also exploring how we can integrate into the religious education program the parish’s anti-racism focus and our identity as a Jesuit parish in the City of St. Louis. Finally, we are also incredibly blessed to have a team of amazing volunteers who serve as our Religious Education catechists and teachers. They are the heart of our program and we are so grateful for their gifts of time and talent in support of this ministry.”

Do you have any words of advice for fellow parishioners about getting involved at SFX?

“We each have an important role to play in living out the work of our parish. Our parish and our community need the unique gifts and talents we all bring to contribute to the good work that is happening at SFX College Church. This is an exciting time to be involved -- there are so many opportunities to engage and participate as our parish continues to grow, evolve, and serve the people of our parish and our greater St. Louis community.”

Invitation to join parish Racism and Reconciliation Committee

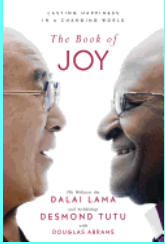
