FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK



Friday was the feast of St. Martin of Tours. He is one of my favorite saints so I want to share a bit of his story. Martin was a Roman soldier who became monk and eventually bishop of Tours in the 4th century. He was one of the most popular of the medieval saints because of a famous biography by Sulpicius Severus. Even back then, it helped to have good press.



Martin's most famous story took place while he was still a soldier and catechumen in Gaul. He encountered a poor man in tattered clothing in the midst of winter. He drew his sword and cut his soldiers' cloak in two giving half to the beggar to wear. That night in a dream it was revealed to Martin that the poor man was Christ. The dramatic action of Martin on horseback cutting his cloak in half became one of the favorite subjects of the medieval Church's art. It also is the reason he is the patron saint of tailors!

Catholics believe in the power of symbols. That image echoes down through the centuries because it conveys the truth: the generosity of sharing what one has; the swift, dramatic response the beggar elicits from Martin; the sword, a weapon of war, used instead to preserve life; and the presence of Christ in the poor. It gets to the heart of Gospels in one wondrous story. St. Martin of Tours, pray for us.

COMMEMORATION OF THE FAITHFUL DEPARTED

Each year, the church remembers all who have died and gone before us during the month of November. While there is a book to remember the departed at the shrine of St. Joseph throughout the year, during November it is moved to near the cross on the altar platform, The names of those listed in the book will be remembered in our prayers at the weekend liturgies.

BLESSED STANLEY ROTHER

On September 23, Fr. Stanley Rother, a priest and farmer from Okarche, Oklahoma, was beatified. His name appeared on one of the death lists and he returned to Oklahoma in January of 1981 but found it unbearable to be away from the people. He said that a "shepherd cannot run." He returned to Guatemala. On July 28, 1981, gunmen tried to kidnap him. When he resisted, he was shot. The words of Pope Francis can truly be applied to him. He was a shepherd who smelled like his sheep.

Parishioner Sandy Spencer knew Fr. Rother as she worked in a neighboring parish at the same time. Today, after the 10:30 mass in the ballroom, she will share about Fr Rother and the historical context which led to his murder. Blessed Stanley, Pray for us!

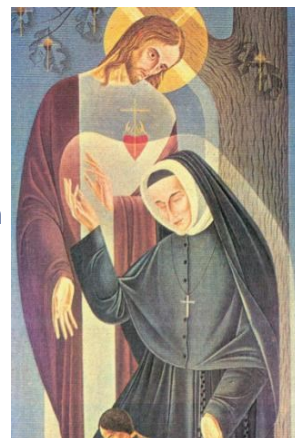


FEAST DAY OF ST. PHILLIPINE DUCHESNE

To celebrate the Feast Day of St. Phillipine Duchesne, The Academy of the Sacred Heart in St. Charles is hosting Eucharistic Adoration in her Shrine. Adoration will begin following the 9:00 am Mass on Friday, November 17 and will conclude at 8:00 am on Saturday, November 18.

In 1818, at age 48, Phillipine Duchesne set out with four other Sacred Heart nuns on a voyage across the Atlantic Ocean and upriver from New Orleans to the tiny village of St. Charles on the Missouri River, 25 miles from St. Louis. There, in a primitive log cabin, Mother Duchesne opened the Academy of the Sacred Heart - the first free school west of the Mississippi, and the first of many Schools of the Sacred Heart in the United States

NOVEMBER IS BLACK CATHOLIC HISTORY MONTH



In 1990 the National Black Catholic Clergy Caucus of the United States designated November as Black Catholic History Month in order to recognize the long history and proud heritage of black Catholics. We are provided an opportunity to reflect on the contributions of many black saints and leaders who served our church from its earliest days. While a more recent history of the Catholic church includes a legacy of slavery and segregation, and our experience is more often one of separation than unity, this month we can celebrate some of the mystics, monastics and martyrs that helped to make our church holy, catholic and apostolic.

Weekly Highlight: St. Charles Lwanga

Charles Lwanga was born in Uganda in the last half of the 19th century. He was introduced to the Catholic faith through the evangelization of the White Fathers, a missionary congregation of priests. He was the chief page in the royal court and dedicated himself to the Christian instruction of the younger boys. When King Mwanga came to rule, Christians were no longer safe. Realizing that their own lives were in danger, Lwanga and some of the other pages went to the White Fathers to receive baptism. Facing execution and asked if they were willing to keep their faith, they answered in unison, "Until death!" When missionaries returned to Uganda after Mwanga's death some years later, they found the Christian community had grown nearly four-fold in secret, encouraged by the witness of these martyrs.

Charles and his companions were beatified in 1920 and canonized by Pope Paul VI in 1964.

Let us pray:

Gracious God, You have made the blood of the martyrs to be the seeds of Christians. May the witness by St. Charles Lwanga and his companions of their loyalty to Christ in the face of death, inspire us to fully live the Christian faith. We ask this through our Lord Jesus Christ. St. Charles Lwanga and Companions, pray for us.

SLU has started a new system in its parking garages. **Folks attending mass at College Church on Saturday afternoon and Sunday will still have free access to the LACLEDE parking garage.** Here are the new parking instructions:

- Saturday evening Mass 5:15 - SLU will issue "no value" tickets at Laclede Garage from 4:30 pm - 5:45 pm. This means that anyone who pulls into Laclede Garage during this timeframe will pull a ticket upon entrance; however, it will be of no value. When they exit, they will put the ticket back in, and the gate will go up - No Charge
- Sunday - Entrance gate will remain down, exit gate will be up from 8:30 am-11:00 pm.
- Spring and Lindell (northeast corner) parking lot will still be available on Sundays.
- Weekday Volunteers - Parking and Card Services will issue complimentary parking pass stickers to the College Church parish center. The volunteer will need to bring their entry ticket into the parish center with them to put a sticker on it. The sticker needs to be placed in the space provided.
